North Central of Naperville Takes Second Place With 60 Points; Taylor, Knox, Wins 100 and 220 Dashes

CAPTAIN DON PAUL WINS SHOT PUT

Athletes representing the University of Chicago ran off with Armour Tech's first annual outdoor invitation track meet held at Stagg Field Saturday afternoon. Chicago scored a total of 132 points to win first place by a wide margin from North Central College which gathered 60 points for second place. Loyola took third with 52 points; Lake Forest was in fourth place with 48 points; Knox and Milwaukee Teachers tied for fifth place with 44 points. Armour registered 28 points for seventh place in a standing which included 13 schools.

100 Goes in 9.7 Seconds

The outstanding performance of the meet was the sprinting of the Knox flash, Taylor. In the finals of the 100, Taylor hoofed the distance in 9.7 seconds to nose out East of the University of Chicago. The trial heats in the 100 were run in 10.1 seconds or better. The 220 final proved to be a thriller when this same lad Taylor beat Captain Norman Root of Chicago. 
