

# TECH PLAYS ELEVEN INNING GAME TO DEFEAT WHEATON COLLEGE BY SCORE OF 5-4

Loser to Play Return Game Here Tomorrow; Krafftsmen Hosts to Michigan State Next Friday

## ARMOUR HELD HITLESS UNTIL FIFTH INNING

In another overtime game, 11 innings this time, Armour defeated Wheaton on their own field by a score of 5 to 4 on Tuesday, May 5.

Tech was held hitless until the fifth inning, when Mago singled, and scored when Galvani reached first on an error by Thomas. In the 6th inning Moskowitz and Pepe singled, while Robin hit a three bagger, scoring two runs. Wheaton then bore down, and no more hits were scored that inning.

In the next inning, Galvani reached first on a single stole second, advanced to third on an error, and then crossed the plate on a single by Link. Tech was now leading by four runs, but the lead was cut down during Wheaton's time at bat. Evans their pitcher hit a single, and finally scored. In the ninth inning Wheaton tied the score by making three runs, errors by the Tech team accounting for these. Ray, Parshall, and Samuelson singled and scored, no more hits being made in this or succeeding innings.

In the final inning Link hit a two bagger, stole third, and came in on Pepe's single.

## Fraternity Tennis Matches Under Way

Tournament play in Interfraternity Tennis was started one week ago. The opening matches were played between Sigma Kappa Delta and Delta Tau Delta.

Two single matches were played, the doubles being left for this week because of the short available playing time. The winner of the two out of three matches will play Sigma Alpha Mu, this fraternity (having drawn a bye for first round play).

Streb and Cone represented Delta Tau Delta while F. O'Coner and Timmermans upheld the honor of Sigma Kappa Delta. Streb defeated F. O'Coner while Timmermans emerged victor over Cone. This gives each fraternity one match and the doubles match will decide who will play Sigma Alpha Mu.

Progress in the tennis tournament has been about at a standstill the past week. Inclement weather was the major reason for this.

All men who are entered are urged to play their matches at the earliest possible time. This tournament was started with the avowed intention of selecting men to play on the varsity tennis team. In a short period of time school will be out for the summer vacation and therefore the tournament will be useless unless finished very quickly. If all will cooperate with these men in every way possible, one week should be sufficient time to finish the matches.

Coach Krafft's baseball performers will serve as guests to another pair of menacing opponents this week when Wheaton College and Michigan State Normal make their appearance on Ogden Field.

Wheaton College, victims of an eleven inning battle with Armour on May 5, will form the opposition this Wednesday. They are coupling their invasion with grim determination to offset that earlier loss, and show promise that they will offer Krafft's proteges a good blow of adversity.

### Tech. Favored to Win

Judging from the outcome of the first game between these teams, the game to-morrow should provide all the action and thrill that can possibly be woven into one afternoon of this baseball sport.

There is no chance of seeing a two figure score to-morrow, but a zero is more probable. Armour's hurlers made quite an impressive showing in that first game by turning their opponents down with only two earned runs. Wheaton's ball thrower had displayed his sense of greediness by keeping our men in action in two overtime innings before he finally relinquished the winning run. A good deal of color to the game will no doubt be provided by the opposing hurlers.

Krafft in practically all respects will place the same men in action who have started the season. There is some doubt as to whether Omiecinski's injury will keep him on the bench. During this home run slugger's absence Krafft found a valuable substitute in Gene Galvani. Although Galvani may not be gifted with the prowess to hammer a hit and score a run with one swing of the bat, his fielding performance coupled with a one or two hit contribution will go a long way towards making the season a success.

### Strong Competition Friday

On Friday of this week Michigan State Normal will make its annual appearance at the home grounds. Although Krafft's teams have enjoyed quite successful campaigns against this team in the past they have always faced stubborn competition.

Michigan State falls in line as a team on par with Western State, Wheaton, and Lake Forest. This fact serves as good evidence that Armour fandom will be given an opportunity to see another feature contest.

## Golf Team to Play St. John's of Toledo

St. John's of Toledo will arrive in Chicago tomorrow to clash with the Tech golfers at the Evergreen golf course. Armour's team is out to continue their string of victories over the Toledo aggregation. Two years ago they defeated St. John's twice. Last year they were unable to meet so this year they should be able to chalk up two more. Armour will be able to play the return engagement Saturday, May 23.

On Friday, May 15, the golf team will journey to Valparaiso to meet the Lutheran team. If past victories have anything to do with it Armour should come out the victor. Captain Weis and Johannisson are back to repeat their victories this year.

Crane College will be the final opponent for the Tech team on the home grounds, the Evergreen Golf Course, May 16. This promises to be one of the closest contests of the season. Crane has a surprisingly good team this year and our men will have to go some to make the score come out in our favor.

Armour's baseballers will at last have one easy game after sojourning under pressure during the greater part of this season when they face the alumni next Monday.

There is some probability that King Simpson, Armour's demon pitching ace of '29, will do the hurling. In case King does decide to shoulder the job, victory may not be attained as easily as is anticipated at present.

Just now, Krafft feels confident that his youngsters will run circles all over the ancient performers, and to prove that the 1931 team is as good as any that he has had he is willing to spot the alumni as many runs as they desire.

Last year's game terminated in an upset as Armour's regulars lost. John Yount, '28, teamed with graduates of '26 and others, turned the regulars down in a seven inning contest.

The surprising feature of an alumni game is that many of the graduates, who have abandoned baseball for a number of years are able to turn in some A-1 performances. Otto Kuehn's hitting in last season's game had outtraveled the hitting of the undergraduates' despite the fact that Mr. Kuehn plays but one game of baseball per year.

An Armour-Alumni game has always commanded a great deal of attention in the past, and will undoubtedly attract a large audience this Monday.

## TRACK TEAM WILL HAVE THREE MORE MEETS THIS YEAR

In the next few days the Armour track team will bring to an end the outdoor season of 1931. Tomorrow the speedsters will engage Lake Forest in a dual meet on the Northsider's stamping grounds. Next Saturday, May 16, the team will travel to Milwaukee to match strides with the cohorts of the Wisconsin State Teacher's College. Saturday, May 23, will find the entire team entered in the SearsRoebuck Y. M. C. A. Invitational Meet.

The outdoor season to date has brought about all that could be desired in the way of victories. To start the season Chicago Normal College was buried under an avalanche of first, second and third places. In this meet it will be remembered Armour scored 12 first places and slammed several events.

### Three Victories to Date

Later in the same week Crane was defeated in Ogden Field by a comfortable margin. Then came the Drake Relays, where the team did not fare so well. Y. M. C. A. College was defeated on their own track by a large score.

Last week Armour was host to several hundred athletes at the Annual Outdoor Invitational Meet. Although Armour failed to win the meet, several of the men turned in some very good times. On the showings of the various teams in this meet Armour should stand a good chance of winning the remaining meets on the schedule with the possible exception of the Sears Y Invitational. In this meet are expected to be many of the same teams which competed in the Armour Invitational a week ago.

### Lake Forest Strong Opponents

Lake Forest, which won the Invitational Meet a week ago, will probably furnish the strongest competition. However, this team is very largely a one man affair and should not be nearly so difficult in a meet where places do not count for as many points as in a large Invitational Meet.

Jens should bring home victories in both dashes and Nelson should get at least a first and second out of the two hurdle races.

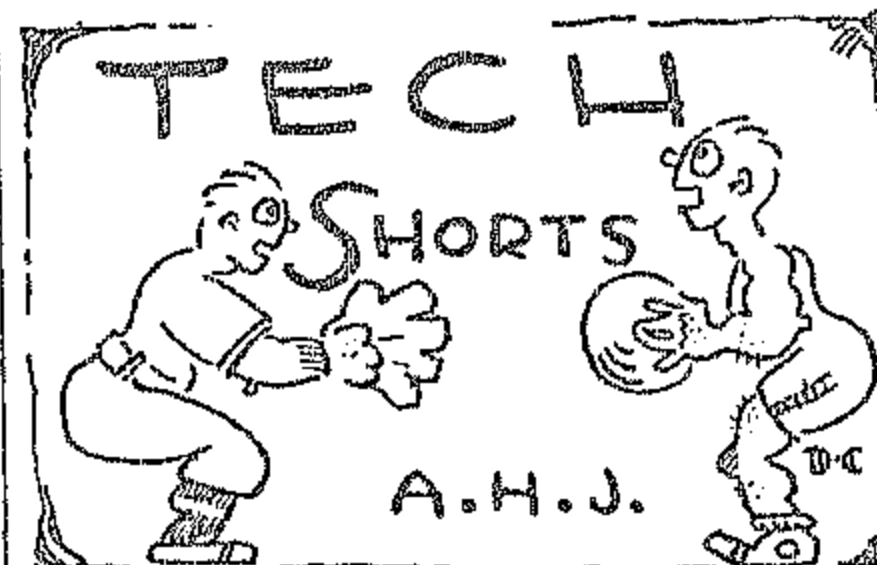
