

TECH BASKETBALL TEAM WINS FINAL GAME OF SEASON

Defeat Michigan Normal For Ninth Victory Of Season

FINAL SCORE 26-23

Frustrating a furious last minute rally, the Armour Tech cagers defeated Michigan State Normal by a score of 26 to 23 last Friday at the Armory.

The Tech squad was out to avenge a defeat at the hands of the Normal team earlier in the season, and to add another victory to the odd but glorious home victory record, having lost only one game on the home floor.

Both teams played cautiously at the start, Armour having possession of the ball most of the time. Setterberg scored the first points for Armour with a clean field goal. Scoring continued slowly, with Armour keeping the lead, the score at the half being 14 to 12.

In the first few minutes of the second half, the Tech cagers ran up a larger lead and held it for ten minutes. Suddenly the Michigan team put on a spurt which cut down the lead to three points, but with one and one-half minutes to go, Armour scored two points to relieve the suspense, and bring the score to 26-21. Kazluskys of Michigan Normal made two free throws after the game was over on a foul committed just before the whistle blew.

A Successful Season

Armour's basketball team ended a very successful season by winning nine games out of a possible sixteen games played.

Coach Krafft took over the basketball coaching in 1928, and in those four years, his teams have won 27 games while losing 33 games.

This is a very good record because the 1927 team under Coach Milton Romney won 4, while losing 15.

Ten men have completed the season, playing in the majority of the games. Four of these, Captain Rossing, Robin, Setterberg and Carlson, all of the civil engineering department, will graduate this June.

Christoph Leads Scoring

Christoph, sophomore M. E., led the season's scoring with a total of 98 points.

Captain Rossing scoring 78 points was second in the list. In the last three years, he has a total of 263 points to his credit.

Lose One Home Game

The basketball team lost only one game on their home floor this season. Detroit City College, the victor, was also the only team to score two victories against Tech.

Armour lost three of their games to De Kalb, Augustana, and Crane by only three points each.

Armour's swimmers have three more away from home meets. They are: Illinois Wesleyan at Bloomington last Friday; De Pauw at Greencastle, Indiana next Friday; and Morton at Morton on March 12.

The boxers also have three more matches at St. Viator's, Culver, and Valparaiso.

Tech's athletic managers for the 1931-32 season include: J. Owen, basketball; E. W. Colcord, track; H. P. Richter, baseball; F. A. Ustrycki, boxing; J. B. Dirkers, swimming; G. W. Schodde, tennis; and W. M. Trauten, golf.

A meeting of the basketball team will be called this week to elect next year's captain.

Juniors are urged to try out for the position of manager of next year's athletic teams. A heavy black sweater and a gold major A with Mgr. on the bar are awarded in basketball, baseball, and track.

A minor letter and sweater are awarded in boxing, swimming, golf, and tennis.

All men out for athletic teams are given invitations to Tech's annual athletic banquet held the latter part of this semester.

Captain Chuck Jens took third place honors and a bronze medal in the shot put last week at the 124th Field Artillery Armory meet.

Victory No. 4?

Tech tracksters will journey to Naperville next Saturday night to try for their fourth victory.

This year, more men are out for the track team than any other year in the history of Armour.

Tony Montesano, '31, member of last year's boxing team, attended the St. Viator's matches last Friday night.

Tech Trackmen Will Meet North Central

Continuing their campaign in the indoor track and field events, the Armour Tech track team will meet the North Central College team in a dual indoor track meet to be held at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois on Saturday, March fifth at 7:30 P. M.

The Tech tracksters will be out to avenge a defeat at the hands of North Central in a triangular meet last year in which Loyola University, North Central, and Armour were entered. In this meet, North Central won with 47 points, Loyola was second with 45 points, and Armour was third with 15 points. This year, however, the Armour track squad is one of the largest and best in years and should show their heels to the North Central squad. The reason for the above conclusion or forecast is very evident when one considers the outstanding performances turned in lately by George Nelson, in the hurdles, the broad jump, and high jump, Elmer Sademan in the mile, and Captain Jens in the shot put.

Besides the veterans who continue to cop places and points for Armour there are a number of promising freshmen from whom much good work can be expected in this meet and in the future.

Victory number three was recorded for the Armour Tech track team last Saturday at the Sears Roebuck "Y" gym. Despite the fact that the Armour men were handicapped, being unfamiliar with the type of track at the Sears "Y" gym, they placed in every event. The track is only 66 yards long, making 27 laps to the mile, and the sharp curves are steeply banked.

Armour took six out of a possible eight first places, Nelson starring with 15 points, winning the 220 and 880 yard runs, and the high jump.

Twenty-five men came out to compete and the team as a whole proved to be well balanced. The final score was: Armour—42 3/5, Sears Roebuck "Y"—25 2/5.
