

**TECH PUBLICATION BOARD PRESENTS ANNUAL SMOKER**

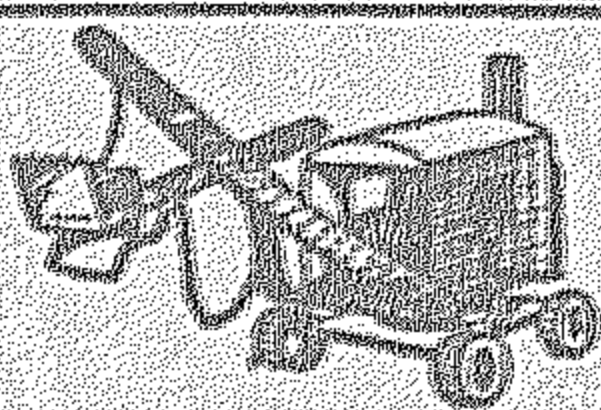
