

ARMOUR BASKETBALL TEAM LOSES HARD FOUGHT GAME TO NORTH CENTRAL COLLEGE

Tech Basketeers Trounce Y.M.C.A. College by Score of 55-32; Lose to Crane Junior College and North Central

TWO WINS AND THREE LOSSES TO DATE

The Tech basketball five suffered its third defeat of the season last Friday evening in the Armory when North Central College of Naperville won a return game with the Armour men by a score of 29 to 23.

North Central started at the beginning of the game to build up a lead and maintain it and with the exception of a few minutes in the early part of the second half were always safely in the lead by four or five points. Both teams missed numerous chances from the field to score but the margin between victory and defeat was decided at the free throw line where the North Central team converted thirteen chances and the Armour team made only nine.

North Central Leads

North Central jumped into a lead of four to nothing before Armour scored their first point. "Pop" Warner registered Tech's first point when he sank a free throw. Armour did not score again until the Naperville team had rushed into the lead by a score of 9 to 1. Al Lauchickis then scored the first Tech field goal of the game and Beemsterboer added a free throw to bring the score to 9 to 4. Just before the half ended North Central increased their total to 12 points and Ray Pflum brought Armour's total to 8 with two very pretty baskets.

Armour went into the second half trailing by a score of 12 to 8 and immediately started their best offensive drive of the game. Good work by Pflum, Beemsterboer, and Warner brought Armour to within one point of North Central, the score being 13 to 12. This was the nearest the Armour five came to the North Central team, for the North Central basketeers again pulled away from the Armour team and held a safe lead to the end of the game.

Thirty-two Fouls Called

The game did not seem exceptionally rough to the casual observer, yet during the course of the game a total of thirty-two fouls was called on both teams, and as a result the game was slowed up considerably. The Armour Tech basketeers and North Central met once before this season on the basketball court. North Central won this game by overcoming a ten point Armour lead in the last few minutes of the game by an exciting rally which netted them fourteen points.

In the game last Friday, Ray Pflum was again high point man for Armour with 10 points. Beemsterboer and Lauchickis each made five points. "Beem" made all of his from the free throw line and Lauchickis made his in the form of two field goals and one free throw. The outstanding players of the Naperville aggregation were Yuknis and Massier who accounted for 12 points and 10 points, respectively. Following is a complete box score of the contest:

During the week preceding the Christmas vacation, the varsity basketball team was kept busy with two games, one with the "Y" College and one with Crane Junior College. The game with the "Y" College, which was played on Tuesday, December 13, at the Armory, was won by the varsity by a wide margin. The final score was 55 to 32. Crane College, however, presented a strong lineup and turned the tables on the Tech basketeers, winning by 38 to 24.

Tech Sweeps "Y"

In the "Y" game, the Armour five did not get started until the Y. M. C. A. team, had scored eight points. When the varsity swung into action with their offense through this lead was quickly overcome and with Beemsterboer and Pflum scoring frequently the Tech team assumed a commanding lead at the half.

The last half of the game was a near rout because Pflum and Beemsterboer could not be stopped by the "Y" College defense. Lauchickis and Warner also contributed their share of points to Armour's total. Tech used their height to good advantage and played an excellent brand of basketball. "Beem" Beemsterboer collected twenty-three points during the game to lead the varsity success and Ray Pflum was not far behind with seventeen points.

Strong Crane Team Wins

Crane College, with one of the strongest lines they have had for several years, continued their winning streak at the expense of the Armour varsity in a hard fought contest which they finally won by a score of 38 to 24. During most of the game not more than four or five points separated either team. Both teams used a fast breaking offense.

At the end of the first half Crane was leading by 21 to 13, but soon after the second half began Armour pushed into the lead and for the only time in the game led the Crane team. The score at this time was 23 to 21. Beckman, Crane's star, however put the Crane team back in the lead with some "hook" shots from the side of the court, and the Tech aggregation could not get into the lead again.

For the varsity, Captain Beemsterboer was again high point man with thirteen points and Dollenmayer, featherman guard was second with nine points. Beckman, Freeman, and Barnett played well for Crane. The complete box scores of the games follow.

Interfraternity Cage Teams Play

Phi Pi Phi still remains in the running for their fifteenth consecutive interfraternity basketball crown as the teams prepare to eliminate each other starting this afternoon.

Starting this afternoon, Rho Delta Rho will play Beta Psi, for their initial appearance in the tournament. The second game will be a special attraction when the Triangles, an easy victor over Theta Xi, will endeavor to break the fourteen year winning streak of the champion Phi Pi Phi team who won by virtue of a forfeit over the Kappa Deltas.

Final Game Friday

Tomorrow, Phi Kappa Sigma will play the winner of the Triangle-Phi Pi Phi game. Phi Kappa Sigma won their opening game 24-5 over the Sigma Alpha Mu fraternity. The other game of the afternoon will be furnished by the winner of this afternoon's contest between Rho Delta Rho and Beta Psi and the Delta Tau Delta team. The Deltas won their initial game 24-7 over Sigma Kappa Delta. The final game for the championship will be played Friday.

Each year the name of the winning team is put on a loving cup. The team to have this honor must win the championship three times in succession in order to gain permanent possession of the trophy. Thus far, the Phi Pi's have two legs on the fifth cup which has been offered since their winning streak started. This is an added incentive to every team in the tournament to break this winning streak.

Boxing Finals to Be Held Friday Evening

Final matches of the boxing tournament which were postponed because of the holidays will be held this Friday evening in the Tech Gymnasium. The school as a whole is invited to see the final bouts which promise to be worth seeing. Organization and training of the squad will begin immediately upon termination of the tournament.

There is a tentative boxing and wrestling meet with Hyde Park "Y" while Morton Junior College and "Y" College are attempting to schedule wrestling meets only. Then there is a tentative meet scheduled with the Lincoln-Belmont "Y" which includes both boxing and wrestling. Last Friday the Tech squad lost another tough game to North Central in the return game of the season. After a slow start, the Naperville team took an 8 point lead, but the engineers rallied to keep the score a close affair until the few closing plays.

The interfraternity basketball tourney will be resumed when the Triangles meet the Phi Pi Phi's January 10, and on the same day Beta Psi will battle Rho Delta Rho.

Special events will be 70-yard dash, low and high hurdles; 440, 880 yard, and one mile runs; high jump; broad jump; pole vault; and shot put.
