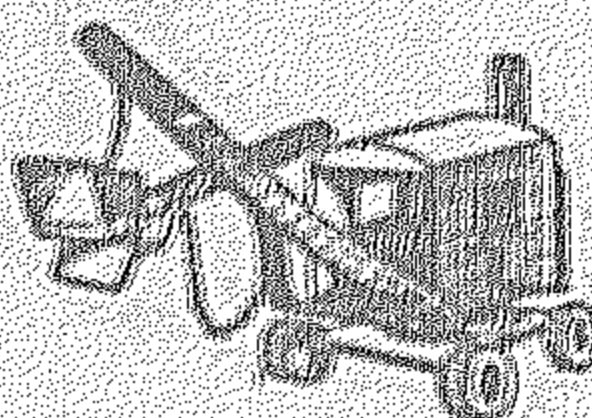
In the above data the following numerical values were given to the letter grades:

- A—97.5%
- B—90.0%
- C—80.0%
- D—67.5%
- E—50.0%
- Cr—80.0%

I—incomplete and was not included.

These averages constitute the scholastic standing of the members of the freshmen, sophomore, junior, and senior classes in the College of Engineering and Architecture, who were in attendance during the second semester of the school year 1931-1932. Grades in Physical Training were omitted. A credit (Cr.), either for work at Armour Institute of Technology or for work elsewhere, was considered equivalent to a grade of "C".
