

SENIORS AND FRESHMEN PLAY TO DEADLOCK IN FINAL INTERCLASS GAME

Juniors Lose to Seniors and Freshmen Whip Sophomores In Initial Tilts of Baseball Series

PLAYOFF FOR CHAMPIONSHIP TOMORROW

Charles Sommer's pitching and George Beemsterboer's home run paved the way for a senior victory over the juniors last Wednesday, winning the game by a score of 4-0.

The seniors won the toss and took the field with Sommer on the mound. Reed, the first man, reached second safely on errors by Buchne and Beemsterboer. Mayer followed with a pop fly to Buchne. Sommer then walked Lillis and T. Omiecinski to fill the bases. Bowersdorf struck out and Reed was doubled at third on a quick throw from Galvani to Buchne, ending the inning.

Seniors Collect 3 Runs In First

Galvani, the first man up for the seniors, was hit by a pitched ball and went to second on a wild pitch. Sommer hit a clean single to left scoring Galvani with the first run of the game. Buchne sacrificed from Chester to Mayer. Beemsterboer swung at a high ball and hit it through the left field fence for a home run, scoring Sommer ahead of him. McWilliams and Booth struck out to end the inning, with the seniors three runs to the good.

Pflum popped to Sommer, who dropped the ball and then threw wild to first allowing Pflum to reach second. Come was given a pass, and Chester struck out. Morelli grounded to Welder and Come was out. Welder to Donnellan. While Morelli bent the throw to first, Pflum took third. Reed was out. Buchne to Beemsterboer.

In the senior half of the inning the side was retired in order.

The juniors, unable to break into the scoring column throughout the game, finally succumbed to Sommer and the seniors 4-0.

GRIDIRON QUERIES

Question 5. The man carrying the ball on an end run is forced to run backwards, by an opposing line-man, until he is in his own goal. He turns around and throws a pass into the field of play. The ball lands in the hands of a man of the opposing team. What play is called?

Answer. Intercepted pass, as long as right man receives it.

Question 6. When can a tackle on offense receive a pass?

Answer. When he is playing the end of the line or else 5 yards back of the line of scrimmage.

Question 7. If a man makes a flying tackle at the ball carrier, but misses him, is there any penalty?

Answer. The penalty is five yards, whether the ball carrier is touched or not.

Question 8. A kicker is trying for a point after touchdown. He kicks the ball so that it hits a player's body and bounces up over the bar. Does the point count?

Answer. Yes, as long as the ball does not touch the ground.

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Boxing And Wrestling Squads Show Up Well

The boxing and wrestling teams are swinging into practice with full vigor, and the squad has not diminished to any extent. Question 9. How many men are required to be in the front line of the offensive team on the kickoff, and why?

Answer. There must be five men in the front line to reduce the possibilities of the formation of a wedge play.

Question 10. A backfield man is plowing through the line, when he trips and falls on one knee. Can he arise and advance the ball farther?

Answer. No. When any part of a ball carrier's body, except his hands or feet, touches the ground, the ball is declared dead and cannot be advanced any farther.
