NORTH CENTRAL GAME

Losing by a score of 7-2, Coach Kraft flashed the victory sign and the fighting Tech baseball team pounded across seven runs to defeat North Central, the "big red jinx" from Naperville, by a score of 9 to 8 in 10 innings at Ogden Field last Wednesday afternoon. This victory not only broke the dreaded North Central jinx which had manifested itself in basketball and track during the past season, but also gave the Techawks a fifty-fifty average in the Northern Interscholastic Conference thus far.

North Central Jumps Into Big Lead

Lefty Mayer started on the mound for Armour, but it was not just his day, for the Naperville team got to George in the third inning to tally five times. Four hits, two of which were doubles, plus a walk mixed in with three Tech errors, with nine North Central men participating boosted their stock up five points. The Armour strategy board sent Buehne in the next inning to do the tossing.

Schum, North Central star pitcher, who defeated the Tech nine twice last year, seemed to be breezing through to another victory with a 7 to 3 advantage up to the seventh inning, when the Techawks staged a big rally. Buehne started the "lucky seventh" off with a clean single to right center. Biegler joined the parade by bouncing a single off the right field fence, sending Buehne to second. V. Omiecinski then took a toe-hold and poled a terrific home run over the iron fence, into 33rd Street, to score two runs ahead of him, to put Armour back in the ball game.

Techawks Tie Score in Ninth

In the last half of the ninth inning with one out and the Engineers still at the short end of a 7 to 6 score, Reed slashed a single to right and stole second. Lillis came through and promptly scored his teammate with the tying run on a base hit to the same spot. Tad Omiecinski kept things going by coaxing Massier, who pitched for North Central after Vic Omiecinski's four base wallop, for a pass, but Adamec struck out and Lukas fled out to right field to end the inning.

The Naperville team scored a run

in their half of the tenth frame to go into a last minute lead, when Berry, who strolled to start the inning, scored on a hard double over the right field fence by Sturgeon.

In a do or die spirit the Techawks went into the last inning and quickly got men to second and third by virtue of an error and a walk to Buehne and Galvani respectively. When V. Omiecinski struck out, for the second out of the inning, groans went up from the Tech bench. Oesterle, visitor catcher then threw the ball into left field, trying to pick off Buehne who scored the tying run. Passes were given to Reed and Lillis to load the bags. With the responsibility resting on his shoulder, T. Omiecinski slashed a liner down the third base line to score the ninth and winning run.

TECH TRACKSTERS ARE VICTORIOUS AT LAKE FOREST

Win Despite Weather and Opponents Early Lead

FINAL SCORE 70 TO 56

A real comeback was staged last Saturday at Lake Forest by the Techhawk cinder men, when they found themselves at the short end of a 30-15 score after five events of the meet were completed. Eleven of the Armour techs were contributed by Captain Sademan's second places in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, and by Nelson's first in the high hurdles.

Tech Men Rally

From then on, prospects looked much brighter. Loy Callen started the pickup by taking the two mile easily at the finish, after being pushed hard throughout the race by his Lake Forest opponent, and Hanson ran third. Nelson and Oberbeck took similar places in the low hurdles event and cut down the lead to nine points.

At the close of the next event, the half mile, the 'Hawks were not to be stopped. Patterson, new freshman half-milers ran first with Sademan right behind him for eight more points. Then Armour went into the lead when the "old reliable" triplets Bejeck, Kulpak and Nelson tied for first in the high jump to sweep the event.

Nelson Wins Broad Jump

Nelson came right back, and with the aid of a slight wind, won the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 4 1/2 inches.

In the field events, the Roberts family put on a special competition. Johnny Roberts, Armour sophomore star, ran up against his brother, who is matriculating at Lake Forest, and who won the discus and pole vault, and took third in the shot put. Johnny retaliated with a first in the javelin and seconds in the discus and pole vault. Each scored eleven points.

De Paul Golfers Trim Techawks

Armour Tech was defeated last Friday in a golf match with De Paul by a score of 12 1/2 to 5 1/2. The match was played on the Kildeer Country Club golf links in Prairie View, Illinois.

Captain Johannisson and Davidson paired together against the two De Paul men, McKay and McInerney, in a best ball match. In this match De Paul won two points and Armour one. Weldon and Ahern played against Thomas and Carney of De Paul in the second best ball match and were only able to gain 1/2 point after losing a two up lead on the last few holes. The morning matches ended 4 1/2 to 1 1/2 in favor of De Paul.

In the afternoon the single matches were played. Davidson and McKay played a hard fought match that ended even—1 1/2 for Davidson and 1 1/2 for McKay. Johannisson defeated McInerney and added 2 1/2 points to the Armour score.

The Davidson-McKay match was the hardest fought of all the single matches and it was not decided until the final putt on the eighteenth green.

Weldon lost his match to Thomas who shot the best score of the day when he carded a 72 which was one over par. Carney of De Paul defeated the fourth Tech golfer, Ahern, to make the final score DePaul 12 1/2 and Armour 5 1/2.

In the single matches the medal scores for the Armour men were as follows: Johannisson 79; Davidson 81; Weldon 83; Ahern 85.

Although Armour was defeated the team showed great improvement since its last match with Northwestern. De Paul offered tougher competition than the Tech men have seen in any of their recent matches. Two of the De Paul men, Thomas and McKay are former city amateur champions and together with the other two men form a strong combination.

Armour meets the University of Chicago today at Olympia Fields in the fourth golf match of the year.

The point system of grading has been abolished at Depauw University.

ARMOUR NETMEN DEFEAT LOYOLA; LOSE TO PURPLE

After losing the first meet of the current season to the strong Northwestern University team, the Tech tennis squad travelled to Loyola last Thursday and took the Ramblers to the tune of 7-2.

The Techawks swept the three doubles matches after rallying in the singles games to take the last four of the six individual matches. Lou Streb put up a hard fight before losing his match to O'Connor of Loyola, the first set going twenty-eight games. Paine lost to Frisch for Loyola's remaining score as Armsbury's victory over Schramm of Loyola, began the Tech winning streak, which was not stopped until the meet was concluded. Large Tournament Entry

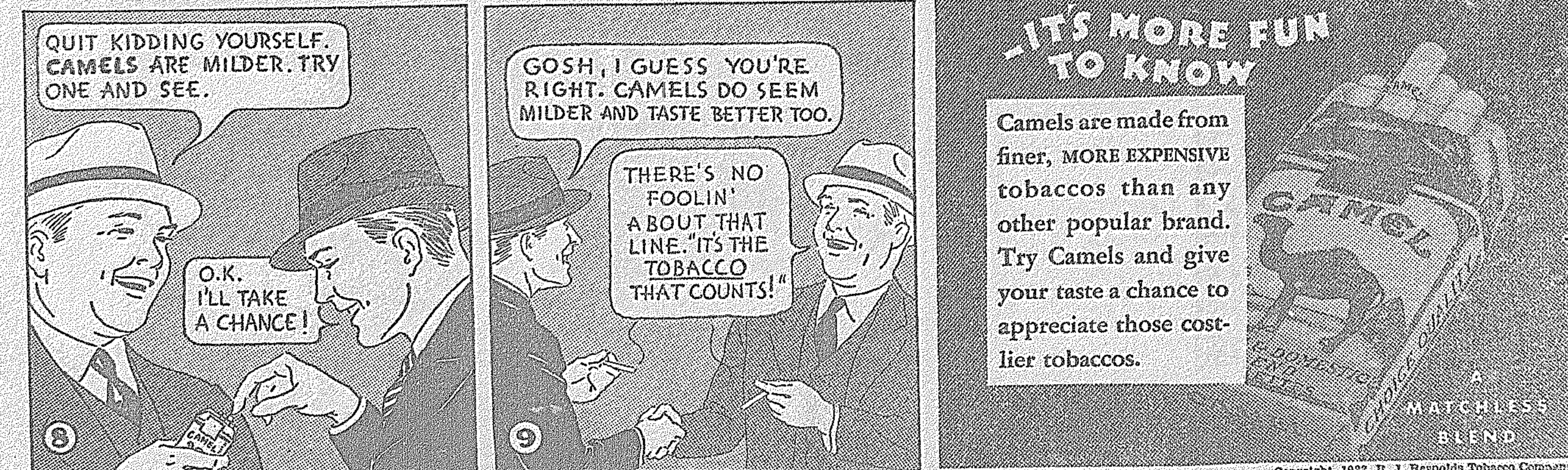
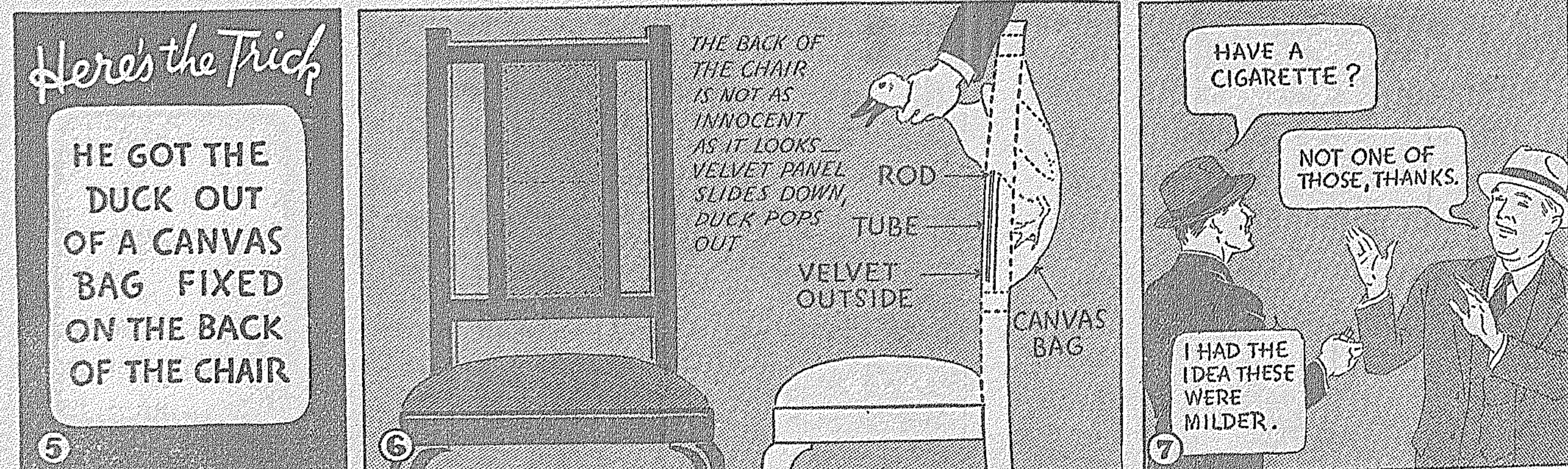
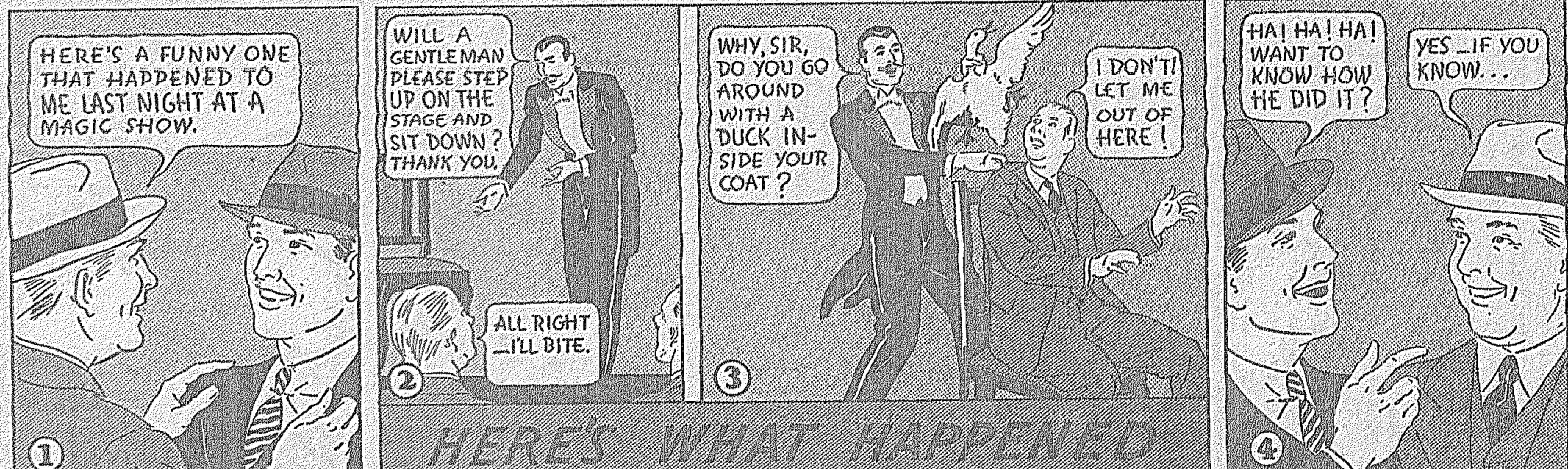
