NORTH CENTRAL GAME

Losing by a score of 7-2, Coach Kraft flashed the victory sign and the fighting Tech baseball team pounded across seven runs to defeat North Central, the "big red jinx" from Naperville, by a score of 9 to 8 in 10 innings at Ogden Field last Wednesday afternoon. This victory not only broke the dreaded North Central jinx which had manifested itself in basketball and track during the past season, but also gave the Techawks a fifty-fifty average in the Northern Intercollegiate Conference thus far.

North Central Jumps Into Big Lead

Lefty Mayer started on the mound for Armour, but it was not just his day, for the Naperville team got to George in the third inning to tally five times. Four hits, two of which were doubles, plus a walk mixed in with three Tech errors, with nine North Central men participating boosted their stock up five points. The Armour strategy board sent Buehne in the next inning to do the tossing.

Schum, North Central star pitcher, who defeated the Tech nine twice last year, seemed to be breezing through to another victory with a 7 to 3 advantage up to the seventh inning, when the Techawks staged a big rally. Buehne started the "lucky seventh" off with a clean single to right center. Biegler joined the parade by bouncing a single off the right field fence, sending Buehne to second. V. Omiecinski then took a toe-hold and poled a terrific home run over the iron fence, into 33rd Street, to score two runs ahead of him, to put Armour back in the ball game.

Techawks Tie Score in Ninth

In the last half of the ninth inning with one out and the Engineers still at the short end of a 7 to 6 score, Reed slashed a single to right and stole second. Lillis came through and promptly scored his teammate with the tying run on a base hit to the same spot. Tad Omiecinski kept things going by coaxing Massier, who pitched for North Central after Vic Omiecinski's four base walkoff, for a pass, but Adamec struck out and Lukas fled out to right field to end the inning.

The Naperville team scored a run

in their half of the tenth frame to go into a last minute lead, when Berry, who strolled to start the inning, scored on a hard double over the right field fence by Sturgeon.

In a do or die spirit the Techawks went into the last inning and quickly got men to second and third by virtue of an error and a walk to Buehne and Galvani respectively. When V. Omiecinski struck out, for the second out of the inning, groans went up from the Tech bench. Oesterle, visitor catcher then threw the ball into left field, trying to pick off Buehne who scored the tying run. Passes were given to Reed and Lillis to load the bags. With the responsibility resting on his shoulder, T. Omiecinski slashed a liner down the third base line to score the ninth and winning run.
