

## Tech Beaten in Two Cage Games On the Annual Trip to Michigan

With the mid-year fading into the past and all thoughts concentrated on basketball, the Armour Tech experts took their annual trip to Detroit during the week-end between semesters. However, they returned to Chicago with considerably less "pepper" and with two more defeats added to the season's total.

Besides a fair (?) crowd of Detroiters, the audience included a group of Tech alumni, mainly fire-protection workers in Detroit and vicinity, who assemble annually to keep up their school spirit. This bunch made more noise than all the rest put together, except toward the end of the game when the excitement ran to a high pitch. ### Lose to Wayne University

In the first tilt of the two game, out-of-town schedule, the Techawks battled a fast Wayne University (formerly Detroit City College) quintet to a hard finish, with the Detroiters ahead by two points at the close on a basket by Berent in the last ten seconds of play. The Tech experts followed the terrific starting pace set by the home team stride for stride, and both teams slowed up before the first half was over. Some fast breaks and several clean "sleeper" plays netted the engineers enough baskets for a two-point lead at the intermission, the score standing 19-17.

### Score Tied Repeatedly

The start of the second half found the Hawks still going strong, although they never were ahead by more than six points. A climax was reached, however, when Captain Ray Pfum was ousted on foul, and a few minutes later, with Armour still ahead by two points, "Pop" Warner also reached the limit of four personals.

Then a Detroit man was fouled as he was shooting, and the score was tied when he made both free throws. The teams then waited for the conventional break, Lady Luck choosing to favor the Tech five. A determined offense cut through the Wayne guard, Dollenmaier coming in to take one of his favorite shots. The nearest opponent brought down his hand across Harry's arms and spoiled the result, but the foul was not called. This play should have ended the game, most probably with a one or two point margin on the Tech side, as Harry can be counted on in a pinch. As it was, however, the ball came down in the opponents possession, was carried past the middle of the floor, from where Berent made the last of several beautiful long shots. The whistle blew before another toss-up could be called.

The Tech swimmers lost to Northwestern "B" team by a 43 to 32 score last Thursday when they visited the Purple in Patten pool. Northwestern splashed their way into the lead by taking the first event, the 100 yard relay, a second in the breast stroke and first in the next three events. To insure their lead they captured a first in diving and the 100 yard free style.

### Knaus Wins Breast Stroke

Armour captured a first in the breast stroke when Knaus jumped in the lead on the first lap and maintained his lead. Kolbe managed to win the third in this event.

For the remainder of the meet with the exception of the 100 yard medley which the Techmen captured, the Purple garnered the firsts and Armour had to be contented with seconds and thirds. Bernstein, Knaus, and Ahern composed the winning combination that won the final event, the 160 yard medley.
