

## TECH ATHLETES LOSE TO DEKALB TEACHERS SQUAD

Armour Track Stars  
Gain Six First  
Places

FINAL SCORE 70-56

In a closely contested meet last Saturday, De Kalb Teachers Squad overcame the zealous Armour squad after a number of exciting and closely fought battles. Cordes scored a brilliant victory in the javelin throw by breaking the existing Armour record with a toss of 166 feet. Incidentally this is also a good deal better than the present De Kalb record.

The 220 yard low hurdles went to Nelson of Armour for the asking. He romped in thirty feet ahead of the nearest man. A closely contested battle for second place resulted in Frateschi of De Kalb, and Fleig, of Armour getting second and third places respectively.

**Roberts and Nelson Place**  
In the 100 yard high hurdles, Roberts and Nelson of Armour scored a decisive victory by leading the rest of the field to the finish line.

The two mile run, the most strenuous event of the meet, was won by Callen, of Armour, who gave an excellent exhibition of physical endurance. He was followed in by Miller and Hutton of De Kalb.

The 440 yard dash went to De Kalb but not until it was challenged by Neal, of Armour, who took second place in the event. The race was very close; Neal being nosed out near the finish line by Hein of the De Kalb squad.

In the 100 yard dash Neal, of Armour, had the lead, but lost ground and, after a strenuous battle with Trakas and Nori of De Kalb, of Armour, took second place in the 220 yard dash after being topped by Trakas, who appeared to be in danger of losing his lead throughout the race.

Fleissner, of Armour, ran a good race to finish third in the half mile run. He held his own very well in one of the closest fought races of the meet.

**Armour Wins High Jump**  
All high jumping laurels went to Armour; Hevredje, Nelson, and Bejeck, outclassing the De Kalb men. The Armour men tied for first place at the height of 5 feet 6 inches.

The shot put was won by Frateschi, of Armour after a closely fought duel with Cowen, the muscle man of the De Kalb squad. Frateschi heaved the pill 39 feet 3 inches.
