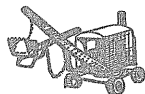


## THE STEAM SHOVEL

## Urey Is Recipient of Willard Gibbs Medal

Th. Willard Gibbs Medal award which was founded and endorsed by William A. Converse for distinguished work in chemical research, will be presented to Dr. Harold C. Urey at the presentation banquet to be held Friday, April 27, at the Stevens hotel. Dr. Urey will receive this medal for his research work on the isotope of hydrogen, deuterium, whose atom has a mass of 2. Some of its properties are very much like those of ordinary hydrogen, while others differ considerably.

The chief interest of the general public in deuterium is that it forms "heavy water," in which tobacco seeds will not germinate, nor small fish live.

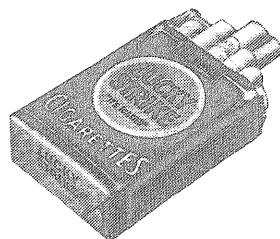
Its chief interest to chemists, however, is the fact that it makes possible a whole new list of organic compounds, releasing the organic chemist from a mere half million compounds to millions or even billions of combinations.



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
