

ARMOUR DEFEATS ELMHURST 7 TO 6 IN LEAGUE OPENER

**Vic. Omiecinski Drives
In Winning Run
In Tenth**

VICTORY NO. 1

Vic. Omiecinski, captain of the Armour baseball team, stepped up to the plate in the last half of the tenth inning and doubled sharply over third base to drive home the winning run of the ball game, defeating Elmhurst, first league opponent, by the score of 7 to 6.

Ed Baume, advocate of the under-hand ball, started on the mound for the Engineers with Phillips behind the plate. Baume hurled good ball for eight innings but was constantly forced into trouble by the fielding blunders of the Tech infield. Lefty Mayer relieved Ed in the eighth inning with the score tied at six all, and held the Elmhurst batters in check in the ninth and tenth frames to finally get credit for the victory. Bloesch pitched all the way for the visitors and did a fine job of it. Although ten Armour batters went out by the strike out route, ten solid hits, four of them being doubles were garnered off Bloesch's delivery in 9 1/2 innings.

Tech Scores First

Armour started the scoring business with three runs in the last of the third. Phillips led off with a high fly to left center which the Elmhurst outfielders let drop in between them for a single. Baume reached first on a fielders choice, Phillips going to second on the misplay. Biegler, loaded the bases failed to cover the bag on an infield tap toward first. Reed grounded out to the shortstop, Boak, Phillips scoring on the play. An error and another infield out allowed two more runs to score before the side was retired.

With the score standing 6 to 4 in favor of the Techwaks at the beginning of the eighth, two errors by the Tech infield mixed in with a single jammed the bases for Elmhurst after two were out. Anderson batting for Aldrich swung late on a wide pitch and lifted the ball over the fence for a double to score two runs and knot the count again. In the last half of the tenth, Adams rammed a hard hit over the right field fence for two bases to provide the setting for Vic. Omiecinski's winning wallop. For Vic missed the first pitch, but lined the second pitch to left field just inside the foul line to score Adams from second with the winning run.

SECOND WIN FOR MAYER AS ARMOUR DEFEATS N. U., 5-3

For the second time within a week the Armour Tech nine whipped a highly rated Big Ten team, and for the second time it was George Mayer, veteran Techwack pitcher, who turned the trick. First he held the Chicago Maroons to four hits to give Armour her first victory of the season, and then on Monday, April 16, at Ogden field, he stopped Northwestern's slugging Wildcats with five scattered hits in paving the way for an Armour victory, 5-3. In turning back Northwestern, Mayer received excellent support, both afield and at bat.

Northwestern Scores

Northwestern pushed two runs across the plate in the first inning. These two markers proved very insufficient because Lefty was complete master of the situation during the last eight innings. His control over the opposing batsmen was so complete, in fact, that only three of them reached third base after the first inning.

Armour Takes Lead

Armour grabbed the lead in the fifth inning by means of a couple of hits, a walk, and a hit batsman. Bartusek started the inning by walking and Mayer was hit by one of Kimbell's pitches. Biegler hunted and the throw to third was too late to get Bartusek, leaving the bases full. Reed sent a slow roller down the third baseline and beat it out for a hit. Bartusek scoring. Adams produced the first out by striking out. Then Vic Omiecinski singled to right for

his second hit, scoring Mayer and Biegler, and sending Reed to third. Tidric replaced Kimbell on the mound for Northwestern. Tad Omiecinski grounded out, Tidric to Kennedy. Reed scoring on the play. Lauchickis ended the inning by flying out to Sullivan.

Northwestern threatened in the seventh inning, but Mayer tightened up to hold them to one run. Wollgast started the inning with a walk and went to second while Biegler threw out Tidric. Sullivan singled to right, putting Northwestern runners on first and third. McGinnis forced Sullivan at second. Wollgast scoring. Gansauer walked but Augustan struck out to end the inning. Mayer then held the Wildcat batters at bay for the rest of the game.
