

TECH NINE WHIPS LAKE FOREST BY THE SCORE OF 6-1

Mayer Pitches a Two-Hit
Game; Strikes Out
16 Batters

Lake Forest, May 9, 1934.—Lake Forest College, proud possessors of a first place and an unblemished record of three straight victories in league competition, proved to be just another baseball team to the fast-stepping Armour Engineers here today. After the dust of battle and that due to the high wind velocities had blown over, the visiting Kraftmen were on the long end of a 6 to 1 count, and George Mayer had pitched himself a swell ball game.

Lefty Mayer, pitching one of the finest games of his young career, turned back the home team's potential hitters to such an extent that during the course of the game only two hits were gleamed off his southpaw slants. Sixteen Lake Forest batters trudged glumly back to the bench with their war clubs on their shoulders—all victims via the strike-out route.

First Inning

A.—Drakeman on the mound for Lake Forest. Reed popped to Gruendel. Adams popped to Fuchs. V. Omieciniski reached first after being hit in the left arm by Drakeman. T. Omieciniski also popped to Gruendel.

L. F.—Fuchs walked. Parsons sacrificed. Bartusek to T. Omieciniski. Bade fanned. Dohr also struck out.

Second Inning

A.—Loveton gobbled up Olson's pop-up. This was the fourth consecutive pop-up to the infield. Lauchiskis missed a third strike. Mayer reached first on Gruendel's error. Lillis in dodging a "bean ball" accidentally hit a slow roller to Dohr who beat him to the bag.

L. F.—Lake drew a pass. Loveton was called out on strikes. Mayer trapped Lake off first on a quick throw and was finally run down. V. Omieciniski making the putout. Gruendel almost caught a cold slashing in vain at Mayer's fire-ball.

Third Inning

A.—Bartusek grounded out to Loveton. Reed walked. While Adams was grounding out to Loveton, Reed traveled all the way to third. Reed was nailed trying to steal home. Drakeman to Parsons.

Seventh Inning

A.—T. Omieciniski dribbled out weakly to Drakeman. Olson singled through short. Lauchiskis took a toe hold and plastered a long triple over Emery's head scoring Olson with the initial run of the ball game. On a

poor relay throw, Lauchiskis continued on home and scored run No. 2. Mayer popped to Dohr. Lillis grounded out to Drakeman.

L. F.—Dohr on the first ball pitched tripled to deep right center. Shroeder batting for Lake struck out. Loveton grounded to Lauchiskis who threw the ball over T. Omieciniski's head for a two base error, and Dohr scoring on the misplay. Gruendel struck out. Loveton took third on a passed ball. Emery was tossed out by Mayer.

Eighth Inning

Omieciniski on the skin infield. Aiker, pinch hitting for Emery struck out. This was strike out No. 16 for George Mayer.
