

## Delta Tau Delta Wins Annual Sing

Orchestra, Glee Club Take Part in Concert

Junior Week is past, and with it has gone the 33rd annual spring concert of the musical organizations of the Armour Institute of Technology. According to Clarence Clarkson, president of the combined musical clubs, this presentation is notable for the fact that ten per cent of the student body participated in it.

The orchestra opened to a full house with the stirring overture "Light Cavalry" by Suppe. The remainder of the first half of the program consisted of six numbers by the glee club, another selection by the orchestra, a piano solo "The Minute Waltz" by Theodore Walschberger, and a tenor solo by Marshall Nystrom.

Before the fifteen minute intermission, the Inter-Fraternity Sing, a yearly contest among the social fraternities, took place. The judges for this event were Dr. W. E. Hotchkiss, Dean H. T. Heald, and Professor C. W. Leigh, faculty advisor of the musical clubs.

### Award Honor Cycle

Of the nine social fraternities at Armour, six participated in the sing, each singing two numbers in the following order: 1. Phi Kappa Sigma, "The Phi Kappa Sigma Marching Song" and "My Phi Kappa Girl." 2. Triangle, "Triangle Brothers" and "Triangle Love Song." 3. Phi Pi Phi, "The Fight Song" and "The Sweetheart Song." 4. Theta Xi, "Theta Xi Hymn" and "Amici." 5. Delta Tau Delta, "Come Drink a Toast to Delta Tau" and "Delta Shelter." 6. Beta Psi, "Beta Psi March" and "Beta Psi Toast."

At the end of the intermission, Dr. Hotchkiss presented the ten honor cycles to the ten most deserving men of the senior class. These men were selected on the basis of certain standards, set up by the Board of Athletic Control several years ago, and which consider the scholastic and extra-curricular activities of the men.

### Hotchkiss Presents Cup

The first honor edition award man was S. M. Lillis. The other nine were N. E. Colburn Jr., H. W. Davidson, R. A. Fleissner, I. A. Kolve, M. A. Lukas, V. Omiecinski, R. J. Pfum, G. M. Reed, and J. E. Schreiner. Following this, Dr. Hotchkiss announced Delta Tau Delta as the winner of the Sing, and presented the cup to its representative.

Among the audience, the general opinion was that this contest showed improvement over the last one. Upon being interviewed, Dr. Hotchkiss said, "The fraternity sing this year was the closest we ever had, and the music organizations have improved, as evidenced by the more difficult numbers that were presented this evening." Mrs. Hotchkiss seconded her husband's statements. Professor Leigh, who has been at the Institute since 1901, said that this concert was probably the best that the music clubs have ever presented, and that this achievement was undoubtedly secured by the well chosen selections.

### Sophomores Reveal Flag

The concluding half of the program was well filled with six selections by the orchestra, four numbers by the glee club, and four solos. Alexander Kulpak sang the baritone solo in the "Song of the Flame" by Gershwin. Instrumental solos were given by Robert Lowry, trumpet, in Cadman's "At Dawning," by Willis Kraemer on the trombone in "Moonlight Madonna" by Fibish, and by Bertram Heine with a piano-accompanied in Nevin's "Rosary" and "Washington Post March" by Sousa. The quartette sang two numbers, "The Voice in the Old Village Choir" and "Close Harmony."

As the entire assemblage rose to their feet with the first strains of the Alma Mater, a banner, high in the towering hall, symbolic of the undergraduate spirit of friendly rivalry, unfurled itself to reveal the sophomore's final taunt to the freshman class; a red elephant bearing the numeral 36, representing the sophomore class, trampling upon the freshman class as represented by green insects.

the golf team took its first match from Theta Xi, while the baseball team lost to the same house.

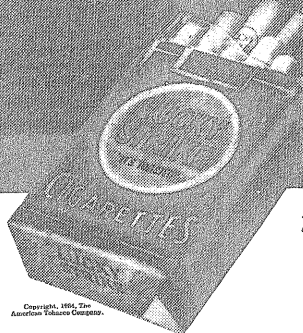
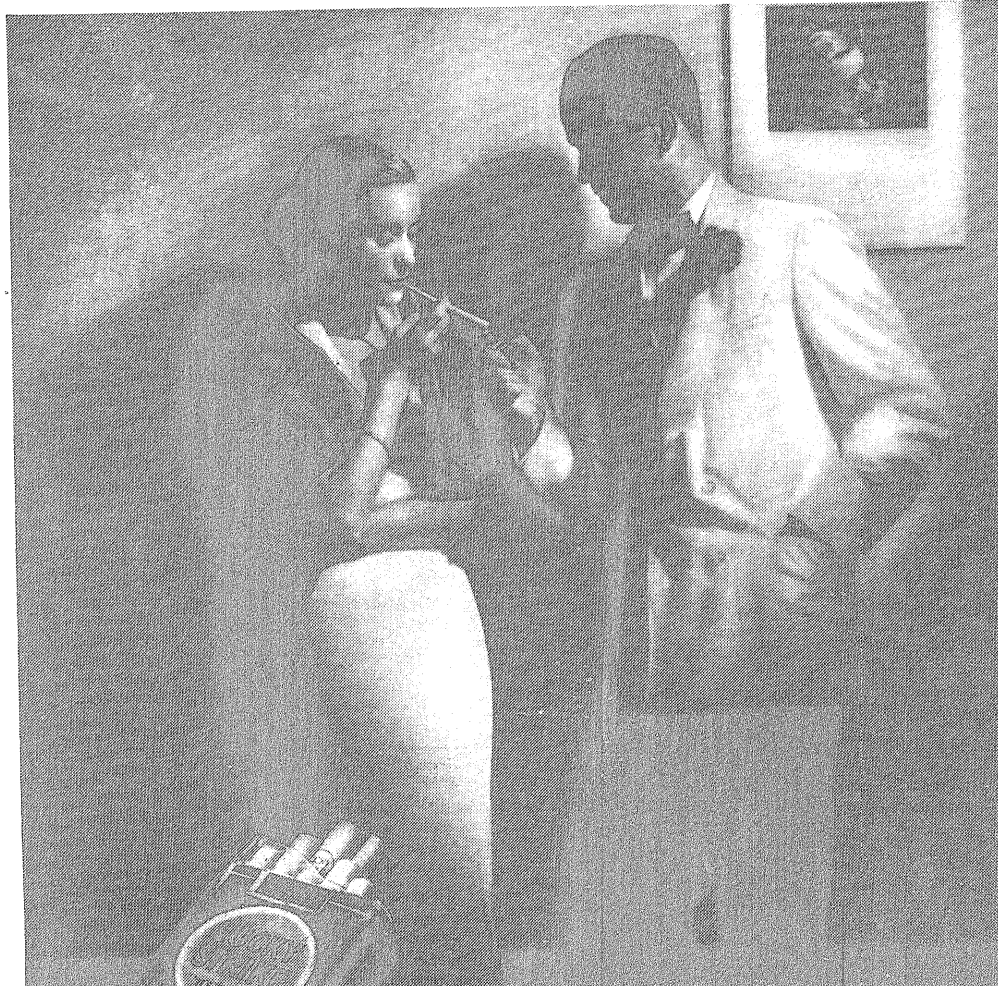
The final match for the ping pong cup will be played Monday night at the Delta Tau Delta house. Good luck fellows.
