

TECH CAGERS BEAT WAYNE UNIVERSITY BY 36-15 SCORE

Hawks Rout Visitors in Return Game at Armour

DE PAUL NEXT!

A greatly bewildered and thoroughly clawed up Wayne University basketball team was sent home bearing the burden of a 36 to 15 blistering received during a short invasion of the Armour, lair of the fighting Techawk, last Friday afternoon.

Coach Bill Krafft's boys pulled off some genuine surprises, in exposing to the public for the first time, a new bag of tricks, containing mainly a brand new man-to-man defense that had the Detroiters bottled up all afternoon, and an unknown supply of "shock troops." Play in the first half was rather slow and listless, due to the fact that the visitors seemed unable to cope with the smooth functioning Armour defense, which was, nevertheless, somewhat spotty at times.

Tech Defense Strong

The green clad quintet seemed to be totally unstrung and decidedly off in their shooting. After a few minutes of play, the score was never in doubt, Tech holding a 17 to 7 advantage at halftime. Starting the second half, the Hawks set such a terrific pace that the game quickly turned into a rout that had the Wayne five on the verge of nervous prostration.

At this stage of the game the entrance was set for the timely appearance of a steady stream of "shock troops" (Techawk's second and third teams). The new comers came in with a "do-or-die" spirit that held the tired and disgruntled Wayne team to just one free throw for the remaining time of the game. It seemed that everybody but the water-boy participated in that last half of the game. The game became furiously fast and wildly exciting just before the final whistle.

The offensive star of the game was Al Lauchiskis, who again led his teammates in scoring with a collection of six field goals, and played a bang-up game at center, constantly outjumping his rival, Christoph, with his deadly over-head shot within the near vicinity of the basket and general control of the back-board, was another shining light. Carl Pfum, Dollenmaier and Warner in the guard positions played brilliantly. Their bewildering feints, pivots and passes generally resulted in scores. McKnight, center, and Spatthelf, at guard, performed well for the Detroiters.

Armour Leads at Half 17-7

Armour jumped into a short lead at the start of the game when Dollenmaier sank a short shot on an out-of-bounds play behind the basket. On an even exchange of penalties, Spatthelf converted for the visitors while Lauchiskis failed. The Tech defensive began to have its effect which showed up the game considerably and forced the invaders to take long shots. Spatthelf sank a pretty shot from the corner of the floor to send Wayne into a momentary lead 3-2. Ray Pfum sank a peppy toss which was nullified a moment later by Maier's charity shot.

The engineers at this point began to click and four baskets were registered in short order before the Detroiters could counter. Lauchiskis started things by pushing in a rebound. Capt. Pfum on a spectacular play stole the ball from one of his opponents and raced the length of the court to sink another basket. "Dolly" chalked up another by finding the hoop with his specialty shot. Al continued the good work with another basket from short range.

Most of these baskets were made possible by the shiftiness of the Techawk offense that continually drove the Wayne defense out of position. McKnight took the lead with a one-hander to conclude the visitors' scoring in the first half. The rout was well under way again with Al sinking two more buckets and Christoph bouncing in another as the

half ended with the score 17 to 7 in favor of the home team. In looking over the results compiled by the Techawk basketball team in the last two years of competition we find that Armour has been defeated at home just three times. Two of these setbacks were administered by the renowned jinx team, North Central, while the third went to Crane College. It seems that the squad possesses the same spirit that abides in other Chicago sport teams, namely the Chicago Cubs, Bears and Blackhawks. Based on this fact there is hope that the Blue Demons from De Paul will not increase the number of losses.

De Feet De Paul!

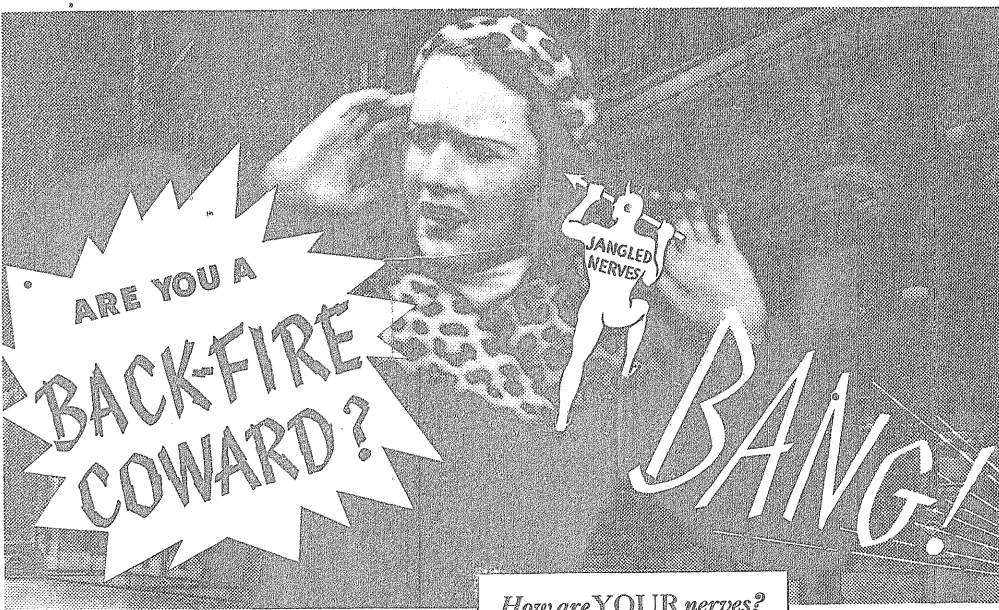

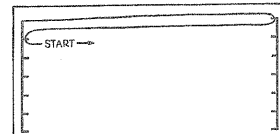

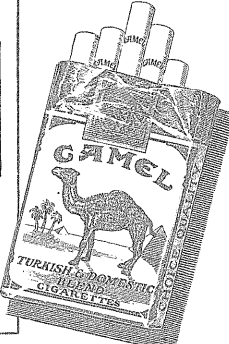
How are YOUR nerves?
