Spathelf sank a pretty shot from the corner of the floor to send Wayne into a momentary lead 3-2. Ray Pflum sank a penalty toss which was nullified a moment later by Maiers' charity shot.

The engineers at this point began to click and four baskets were regis-tered in short order before the De-troiters could counter. Lauchiskis started things by pushing in a re-bound. Capt. Pflum on a spectacular play stole the ball from one of his opponents and raced the length of the court to sink another basket.
"Dolly" chalked up another by find-ing the hoop with his specialty shot.
Al continued the good work with another basket from short range.

Most of these baskets were made most of these naskets were made possible by the shiftiness of the Techawk offense that continually drew the Wayne defense out of po-sition. McKnight broke the ice with a one-hander to conclude the visi-tors' scoring in the first half. The rout was well under way again with Al sinking two more buckets and Christoph bouncing in another as the

half ended with the score 17 to 7 in favor of the home team.

In looking over the results com-piled by the Techawk basketball piled by the Techawk basketball team in the last two years of compe-tition we find that Armour has been defeated at home just three times. Two of these setbacks were admin-istered by the renowned jinx team, North Central, while the third went to Crane College. 
As has been the custom for the past few years there will be two divisions, namely, the university and college. This is done so that the competition in the Relays will be more even.
