TECH CAGERS BOW TO DE PAUL IN AN OVERTIME RATTLE

Capt. Ray Pflum Leads Team in Hectic Encounter

DePaul's Thirteenth Win

Free throws by Barskis and Lins Free throws by Barskis and Linskey in the last thirty seconds of an overtime basketball game gave the Blue Demons from DePaul a 43 to 41 victory over the Armour quintet last Wednesday afternoon on the Tech home floor. It was the hardest fought and most evenly matched game experienced by either team during the current season. By vir-tue of this triumph De Paul annexed their thirteenth straight victory to keep their record unblem-

DePaul held a deciding edge in the play during the first half, holding a commanding lead of 29 to 19 at the halftime. In the second half, Armour led by Capt. Pflum and Heike, outplayed and outscored the Heike, outplayed and outscored the Blue Demons to such an extent that the Techawks held a 38 to 37 ad-vantage a few seconds before the finish. Adams, DePaul guard then tied the score at 38 all with a free throw just as the whistle blew.

Ray Pflum Is High Point Man

Ray Pflum, star Tech guard, played the finest game of his career on offense as well as defense. His collection of seven baskets and two free throws was largely responsible for the Hawk rally and he was ably assisted by his teammate Gene Heike, who scored six field goals and a penalty toss for a total of thirteen points. The DePaul scoring was rather evenly balanced between Barskis, Gorsky, Weston, and Adams, the edge going to Barskis with a total of thirteen points.

DePaul drew first blood after the opening tipoff when Capt. Weston pushed in a rebound off the backboard. Play started off on an unusually fast clip, each team relying on a fast breaking offensive to maneuver the ball within the free-throw zone. On limit such a play Markey zone. On just such a play Heike knotted the count with a one-hander from the side of the court. Gene added another point for the Tech cause with a penalty shot. Ray Pflum connected with the hoop a moment later on a long shot and Lukas sank a free throw for good measure. Big Pete Barskis retaliated for the visitors with a pivot shot and a free throw to make the score 6 to 5 in favor of Armour.

DePaul Takes the Lead

Heike and Pflum rang up two buckets to continue the onslaught. DePaul would not be denied, baskets being chalked up by Weston, Adams, and Barskis before the Engineers and parkis before the Engineers could retaliate. Warner and Pflum added two points via the free throw route and then Barskis, with a short shot and Weston with a longer one. countered a moment later to send

countered a moment later to send DePaul into the lead. The free scoring on both sides continued when Gorsky sank a fol-low-up shot and Pflum hit the net with another long one. Gorsky again boosted the DePaul stock, with a one-handed, successful attempt, Ray one-nanded, successful attempt, hay Pflum then sank a spectacular over-head shot which was followed by baskets by Barskis and Adams. Several free throws concluded the scoring in the first half with the score standing 29 to 19 in favor of the Blue Demons.

Second Defeat by DePaul

As in the previous game netween the two teams, the Techawks rallied, but to a greater extent. Lauchiskis started the uprising by batting the ball into the net during a wild scramble under the basket. Warner added a field goal and Dollenmajer sank a free throw to continue the rally. Heike and Al Lauchiskis pro-duced to bring the score up to 29-28 before DePaul could score. Krause sank a free throw for DePaul's first score of the second half. A collabora-tion of baskets by Heike and Pflum for a total of 10 points brought the score to 38-37 in favor of Armour a score to 38-37 in favor of Armour a few seconds before the end but De-Paul tied the score shortly before it would have been too late and the teams then had a few seconds rest before starting the overtime play. Tech's hopes looked bright as they jumped in the lead in the overtime
