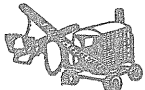


THE STEAM SHOVEL

them. One student is cleaning and repairing all the cases in the laboratory and another worker is assisting in the radio department by assembling and checking equipment. Later the men will collect and organize data and information concerning the new type of Physics Examinations recently adopted.

Eight Work in M. E. Department
In the Department of Mechanical Engineering, under Professor Gebhardt, eight men are employed. One man is making a survey of the lighting distribution in all the buildings, determining the number of lamps and total illuminating wattage used in the institute. Two men, under Professor Roesch, are determining flywheel constants for airplane, automobiles, and stationary engines, and for flywheels on various engines in the automotive laboratory.

A collection of sprinkler heads in the office of Professor J. B. Finnegan, head of the Department of Fire Protection Engineering, is being mounted in a more suitable manner for display. The group has considerable historic interest.

Prepare Plan of Mission
Several men are working on athletics under Professor Schommer. Two architects are preparing drawings of the Mission Building, a project long desired. An accurate check is kept on the hours of work done by Institute employees, and an account is made to the government. A time card is kept by each employee and one member of every group of workers acts as timekeeper for his group. The funds for paying the workers will be transferred by the government to Armour Institute and the men will be paid by Armour. It is expected that the employees will be
