Dr. Preston Hoff, director of reearch of the Dupont Rayon Company, Buffalo, N. Y, recently paid a visit to Armour to view the equipment and type of experiments used in the chemical engineering laboratory work. He expressed surprise at the variety of experiments offered.

Increased activity has been prevalent for quite some time in the chemical department. The comple-tion of the "furniture and fixtures" in the laboratory for physical chemistry has been followed by the purchase of additional experimental equipment for this course. Permanent installation in this laboratory for exact gas analysis, for calibration of temperature measuring devices, and for measuring hydrogen ion concentration is contemplated.
