

ARMOUR TANKMEN LOSE TO LOYOLA SWIMMERS 53-27

Tech Swimmers Win Medley Relay Event

GOOD TIMES RECORDED

A strong Loyola tank team submergenced the Armour splashers in a return meet held at the victors' pool last Thursday night by a score of 53 to 27. Despite the one-sided score, every event of the meet was well contested by the Engineers who forced the Loyola stars to extend themselves to the utmost. In the first duel between the two schools, Loyola had rather an easy time of it by taking first in every race, many of which were not even close.

Loyola was thwarted from sweeping the events in this meet by losing to the Techawk medley team of Bernstein, Knaus, and Ahern in the 150 yard relay. Armour scored five second, and five third places besides winning the medley relay for the total of 27 points. The two Loyola stars, Bryndenthal and Ertz, each captured two events, while their able assistants, Kearns and Elwell, took care of the other races.

Loyola Captures 7 Firsts

Loyola jumped into the lead by capturing the 200 yard relay event in the fast time of 1:45.8. The quartet of Boone, Vanderberg, Elwell, and Trick nosed out the Techmen after a close race. Bryndenthal, Loyola natator, negotiated the 100 yards in the breaststroke event in 1:15 to take first place, as per custom. Knaus, and Kolve of Armour came in second and third respectively to make matters somewhat more respectable.

In the 50 yard free style, Ertz of Loyola finished the dash first with Trick, a teammate, close behind. Moore of Armour managed to get a third to complete the field. Elwell boosted the Loyola stock up a few more points by winning the 200 yard free style swim. Davison of Tech and Luce another Armourite placed in second and third.

Bryndenthal Stars for Loyola

Bernstein was nosed out by Bryndenthal in a closely contested back stroke race. The 100 yards was negotiated in the fast time of 1:14.3, clipping about a second off the time made by the winner in a similar race earlier in the season. Ertz repeated in the 100 yard free style swim to take a fast race from Ahern of Armour. Moore placed third in the event.

Kearns put on a sterling show to capture the judges' eye in the fancy diving. The best the Hawks could manage was a third.

The Armour medley team proved to be too much for the home boys in the 150 yard relay race. The Tech threesome of Bernstein, Knaus, and Ahern was clocked in 1:36.2.

Tech Wrestlers Defeat "Y" Team

Armour Overcomes Lincoln-Belmont Team 24-20

The Armour matmen won six out of the ten eight-minute bouts from the Lincoln-Belmont wrestlers last Friday at the Y. M. C. A. gym to win the meet.

The first three matches were losses for Armour. Schilling pinned Marslek easily in 2 minutes 45 seconds. Wolniak of Armour put up a better fight but was overcome by Tipescu of the "Y" team. Berquist lost his bout by a bare 15 seconds; pinning Sweitzer in 3 minutes while Sweitzer took 2 minutes 45 seconds to pin him.

In the fourth bout, Sumner won an easy victory over Greenberg of the Y. M. C. A. team in 4 minutes 25 seconds. Sumner was constantly in the lead throughout the fight and the Y. M. C. A. man took a great deal of punishment. Roy Kercher of Armour, wrestling against Direnzo, a wrestler of no mean ability, had a little difficulty in subduing his scrappy opponent. After an evenly matched battle for the first part of the bout, Kercher succeeded in pinning his man with a crotch hold and a half-nelson in 4 minutes 45 seconds.

Schmidt Scores Easy Victory

In the beginning of the sixth bout it looked like a sure victory for Schoenbrod of the Y. M. C. A. team, because of his muscular ability. However, the bout proved to be a matter of brains against brawn and Schmidt of Armour scored an easy

victory over the muscle man with a 7 minute time advantage after allowing his opponent to tire himself out.

One of the most evenly matched bouts of the meet was Bow Patterson of Armour, versus Danders of the Y. M. C. A. team in the 145 pound class. Although both men were equally matched physically, Patterson succeeded in getting the advantage and keeping it for the duration of the bout. His time advantage was 6 minutes 35 seconds.

The eighth bout was a straight win for Armour, Johnny Larson had his opponent, Pelola, at a disadvantage throughout the match. He came close to pinning his man several times and finally succeeded in getting the winning fall after 7 minutes 50 seconds.

Fastest Bout of Meet

The fastest bout of the meet was between Boherg of Armour, and Schultz of the Y. M. C. A. team. During the first part of the bout, each man was trying to see how much energy he could expend to no advantage. As the bout progressed, however, the Techman got the advantage and kept it easily because his opponent appeared to be stalling. He won the bout with a 5 minute 45 second time advantage.

The final bout was a surprising loss for Armour, Bock pinning Peterson in 1 minute 16 seconds.

The Armour wrestlers will attempt to repeat their performance in another meet against the North sides later in the season.

Permanent installation in this laboratory for exact gas analysis, for calibration of temperature measuring devices, and for measuring hydrogen ion concentration is contemplated.
