

FOUR TECH RELAY RECORDS SMASHED IN ANNUAL CLASSIC

yield anticipated interest through unexpected sources. Metcalf, who is the foremost "almost" of the Relays, was again a disappointment to the fans because of an injury to his valuable legs, but one Randall Freeman put his Carlton College on the front page when he broke on the home with an 07.1 victory in the University event. Herman, who cracked ten seconds for the century as an Oak Park prepster, rubbed a tenth of a second from the two year record of McCormick of Notre Dame.

The University two mile relay, although it saw no broken record, was the most spectacular feature of the evening. Crossman, Purdue senior, and Pongrauer, last man on the defending Michigan State team, raced neck and neck for the last half mile to finish a foot apart with the State man holding the narrow margin to gain a deserved victory.

Armour Takes Third in Mile Relay

Armour's hopes were brightest in the college mile relay, but here the Techhawk found opposition plentiful. Neal opened with a beautiful race and a lead at the end of the first quarter, which Kirkpatrick, foot freshman, fought to hold. However, Michigan Normal, which set a 3:25.9 record and Illinois State Normal, defending a 3:31.1 mark, closed with a rush that the Armour endmen, Ray Kibler and

Captain Nelson, could not meet. Nevertheless, a close third in such a field is very satisfactory.

The same quartet that won the mile event, grabbed the mile medley relay. Walton, Kibler, and Hirshy gave Michigan Normal full claim to a lion's share of the college relay honors.

Carlton Wins with Hurdle Events

Carlton of Kalamazoo, who won both college hurdle events, was the only double individual winner of the meet. The hurdles saw Armour's point total boosted by Johnny Roberts, taking the third place medal in the highs and twos. Nelson, a fifth in the lows.

Clark of Wisconsin equalled the 08.8 high hurdle mark in the final, but finished second to Sandbach, Purdue star, in the final. Sandbach, who holds the low hurdle 1' record, could do no better than a third in that event, finishing behind Fleming, Northwestern Pitt native star, and Knappenberg, who gave the Kansas Aggies a second place.

Pitt Lowers Mark for Meet Feature

Fleming, Northwestern, middle distance ace, won the half mile easily, yards ahead of Popoway, Purdue. Ollie Duggins, also from Evanston, took the 140 yard run. Keller of Pitt, a sure threat for honors in the quarter mile, did not enter this event, but saved himself for the University one mile relay, which Pittsburgh won in record time; 3:22.9. Kiger, MacDonald, Connolly, and Keller are a powerful group, and their mark looks equally potent.

The field events were a disappointment as far as record breaking was concerned, but the victors' best efforts were mighty close to

former marks.

Tech took home six places, the most notable of which was Roberts' third in the college high hurdles. This race was a blanket finish for second place with any of the place men getting the judges' decision.

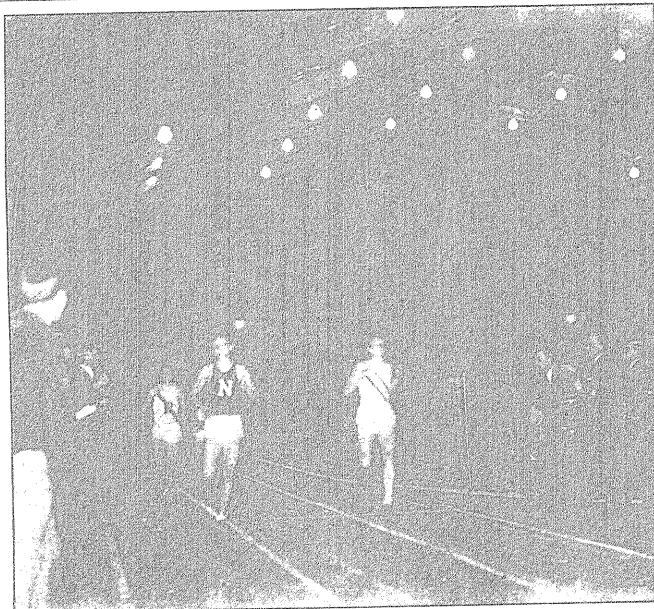
Records were broken in everything but attendance. Old man weather did his damndest to keep every one home. Regardless of the inconvenience almost 2,000 were in the stands.

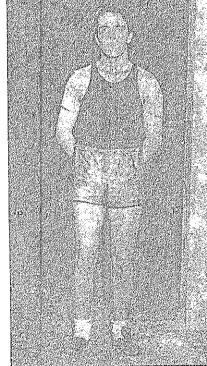
DUGGINS of Northwestern noses out Jessel, Marquette sprinter, for a first in the University 440.



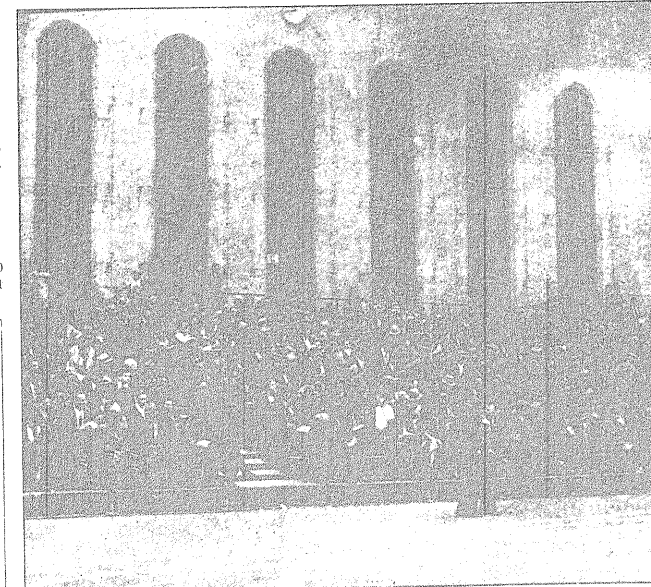
A VIEW of the crowd of 2,000 that watched track stars of mid-west battle for relay medals.



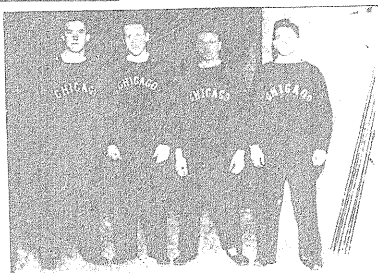
