This speaker was secured by squad number ten, which is composed of the following members: N. McGuone, C. Peterson, J. Schulz, I. Thunder, and O. Tomei, of the freshman class in social science 102 in connection with their report on "Transportation in Chicago." oxides for the purpose of securing soluble compounds of the metals and separating metals from their ores. Others are working on a more efficient method of nitration, and the transfer of heat in both vertical and horizontal steam-jacketed kettles and tubes.

At this time there is no work under way in the mechanical department in the way of commercial research; however, the senior mechanicals are working industriously on typical problems peculiar to their own field.

This is only a brief resume of the work now being contemplated. We see a much brighter future for this particular type of work that will bring Armour even more to the front.

The chapter is now busy making plans for the Mothers' Tea and Musical which is to be held April 8.

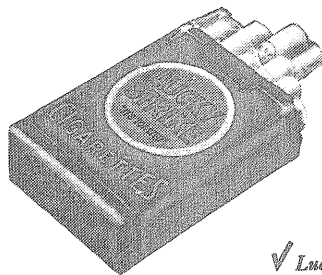
RHO DELTA RHO
