

## NORTHWESTERN B NATATORS DEFEAT ARMOUR TANKMEN

### Tech Loses for Second Time This Season to Purple

#### NORTHWESTERN WINS 42-28

The Tech swimmers traveled to Evanston last week for the second time this season, and for the second time they encountered defeat at the hands of the Northwestern "B" team. Although the score, 42-28, was rather one sided, every event was closely contested by a fighting Armour team. As in the first meeting between the two schools, Armour was only able to win two events, but the Techs took their share of seconds and thirds.

#### N. U. Wins 6 Out of 8 Events

Northwestern splashed their superiority in the form of Knaus, who won the 100 yard breast stroke, and Reed, who won the fancy diving. Knaus displayed his usual form in winning from Hotz of Northwestern in a close race. In the diving, Reed was pushed but showed good form to defeat Himel of the home team. The Northwestern men were able to cop the rest of the events, including the two relays.

#### Knaus Wins Breast Stroke

The Purple team jumped into the lead by swimming away with the first event, the 100 yard relay. However, Knaus retaliated for Armour by barely nosing out Hotz of N. U. and Kolve of Armour. In the third event, the 40 yard free style, Marlowe of the "B" team managed to edge in ahead of Moore and Reed of Armour in the closest race of the meet. Northwestern then won the next three events before the Techmen could again hit their stride. Bernstein gave Kramer of Northwestern a close fight to take second in the 100 yard back stroke.

#### Reed Captures Diving Event

Reed then began cleaving the water in the approved fashion and rolled up 84.1 points to beat Himel of the Purple squad in the fancy diving. Kolve of Armour helped the cause by taking a third in the event. In the last event of the evening, the 180 yard medley relay, the Northwestern team managed to nose out the Techhawk team in a close finish. Kramer gained a fair lead over Bernstein of Armour in the backstroke, but Knaus, swimming breast stroke, overcame the Purple advantage. The Northwestern anchor man, with a sudden burst of speed, was able to nose out Dworsky for the winning margin.

Last year the Tech tankmen traveled north and captured a meet from Northwestern. Since then, in the return match last season and the two engagements this year, the Purple has improved its "B" team; as a result—wins for Northwestern; losses for Armour.
