

North Central Helps Techawks In Debut on Home Field Today

Team Goes to Lake Forest Saturday

If the weatherman permits, the Armour Techawks will make their home debut today with the Cardinals from North Central furnishing the opposition. This will be the first of two games on the Institute schedule this week. Saturday the team will travel to Lake Forest to meet the Foresters.

In hopes of avenging last year's record against the Naperville team, Coach Stenger will pit his ace moundman, Captain Willie Kruse against Tiefenthal, Cardinal star. Last year these hurlers opposed each other at Naperville with the latter winning out when the Redbirds scored eight runs in the eighth and three in the ninth to cop a 13-12 decision. In the other meeting of the teams on Ogden Field, the Cardinals abused the Techawks 11-0 while Tiefenthal held the home club to two hits, both singles.

Entire New Team

The team the Armour students will watch today will hardly bring back thoughts of last year's outfit since only three regulars were present for roll call this spring. However despite the inexperience of the men, both the coach and captain expect a favorable year even though the schedule is dotted with tough opposition.

When the team goes to Lake Forest Saturday, there'll be but one thought in the minds of each player, to make the Foresters pay and pay dearly for their work of last year when they snapped a fourteen game winning streak with a 7-0 fourteen inning victory.

Kruse's Glad Boyle's Gone

In that game which broke the team completely, Kruse went the route and would have won easily if it weren't for the Forester's third sacker Boyle who had a glorious time against Willie with a homer, a double and four singles in seven times at bat. Boyle has graduated so Willie isn't expecting the trouble he had last year.

Although the Lake Forest team has lost Boyle and a few others, they still have Bob Stiekies who won that thriller last year as well as Joe Hein who started the game. Which one of these two will draw the opening assignment is unknown although both may give way to "El" Maiman.

Intramural Meet Commences Today

Armour's annual softball tournament will get moving at the noon hour today when the Senior Chems, paced by Harvey Rothenberg, meet the Senior Fire Protects led by "Big Stoop" Swanson. The game will be played on Ogden Field.

Due to late entries, Tom Clark, intramural manager, has agreed to extend the entrance deadline to Wednesday noon, after which time no team will be allowed to enter. The present enrollment calls for twenty teams, but this is expected to grow due to the time extension.

Sophs Play Game of the Week

The best game of the week will be played Friday at 12:20 when the Soph Chems meet their hated rivals, the Soph Mechs. In a practice game the Mechs took a beating, but they don't expect to do that again.

At 10:30 on Friday, the much discussed Junior Chemteals will take the field against "Buss" Tullgren and his Civils. The Chems have set themselves up as favorites and with Jesse Kremer as manager expect to whip right through the tourney without a loss.

Fresh Expose Team

The first freshman team to get into action will be the Aces, who will meet the Sophomore Fire Protects on Thursday. As in the past, the freshmen are expected to come up with at least one good team, but which one it is remains to be seen until all have had action. Two years ago the freshmen won the championship and last year they reached the semi-finals.

The other game of the week will pit the Junior Fire Protects against the Junior Co-ops. Neither team is expected to go anywhere in the tournament, but the Co-ops might cause trouble for the teams they play.

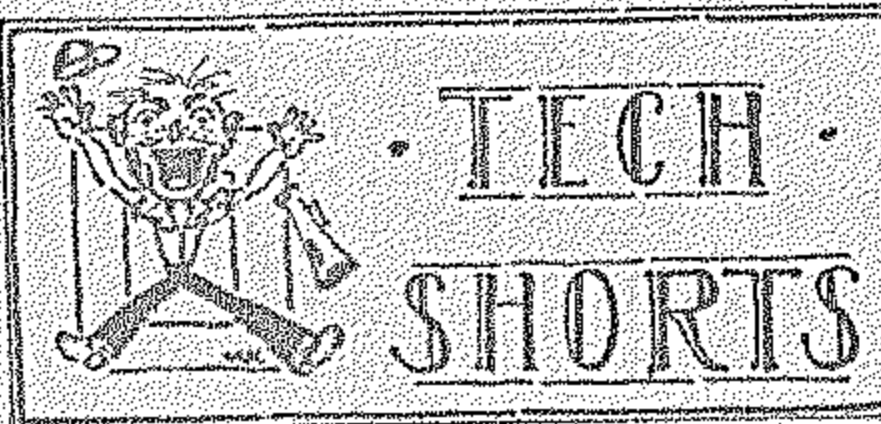
Chicago Normal Opens Armour's Tennis Schedule
