

Techawks Win Two; Close Year With Lake Forest, Mich. State

Yursis Hurls Four Hit Shutout; Thodos Stars As Batter

Armour's ballmen added another game to their win column for the season by downing Augustana's baseballers 6-0 for the second time this season at Ogden Field last Friday. Yursis repeated his first win over the Rock Island lads by going the route and chalking up win number two over the wearers of the Blue and Gold. The Armour men came to life with their bats by pounding out fourteen safeties while Yursis was limiting the visitors to four well-scattered hits and striking out 12. The game was loosely played and some poor base running was in evidence.

After Augie had banged out a safety in their half of the first, Armour came back with two hits and assumed a 1-0 lead. Mueller and Leonard were easy outs, but Kruse started the rally with a single. Krause doubled, driving in Kruse with the initial run of the game.

Gibson doubled with one out in visitors' half of the second, but Yursis struck out Carlstrom and A. Aronson to end the inning. Armour put together a single, a hit batsman, and an error to score in the second frame. With two outs again, Theodos was hit with a pitched ball. Achenakin was safe on C. Aronson's error, and Mueller singled scoring Thodos. With Mueller on first and Achenakin on third, the engineers tried a double steal, but the pitcher cut off the catcher's throw and threw to third to catch Achenakin off the bag.

Bauch Drives in Run

Armour scored a lone tally in the third when Kruse walked, Lyckberg was safe on Metz's error, and Bauch singled driving in Kruse. Thodos led off in the fifth with a single but got no further than third.

The Techawks brought the score up to 4-0 on Lyckberg's single, Yursis' double, and Thodos's single. Mueller's triple was of no avail in the sixth, and successive singles by Yursis, Thodos, and Rehwaldt were not productive of any runs in the seventh.

With one out in the ninth, Kruse got his third walk of the game, but was forced out at second on Krause's roller to short. Krause stole second and then scored on C. Aronson's two-base error on Lyckberg's grounder. Bauch singled driving in Lyckberg with the sixth and final tally of the game. Yursis pitched airtight ball after the third, allowing only one hit in the last six innings.

Hits by the lower half of the Armour batting order restored these runs but the Teachers were to be denied so they scored again in their half of the second.

In the fifth inning, Leonard tied the score with a home run and Bauch sent the team ahead with a similar blow the following inning. DeKalb came back and with Jarvi supplying the power, tied the score.

Carrier Lets Loose

The score remained the same until the eighth inning. Then Carrier, possessing two singles and a double, caught Young's fast ball and sent it far enough away to insure himself a free passage around the bases.

Kruse continued to pitch good ball and protected his one run lead.

Lake Forest Tomorrow

This week the Techawks will close their season and also the college careers of two of its finest players, Captain Willie Kruse and Berndt Lyckberg. Lake Forest furnishes the opposition tomorrow while Michigan State will come down from Lansing for a battle next Saturday.

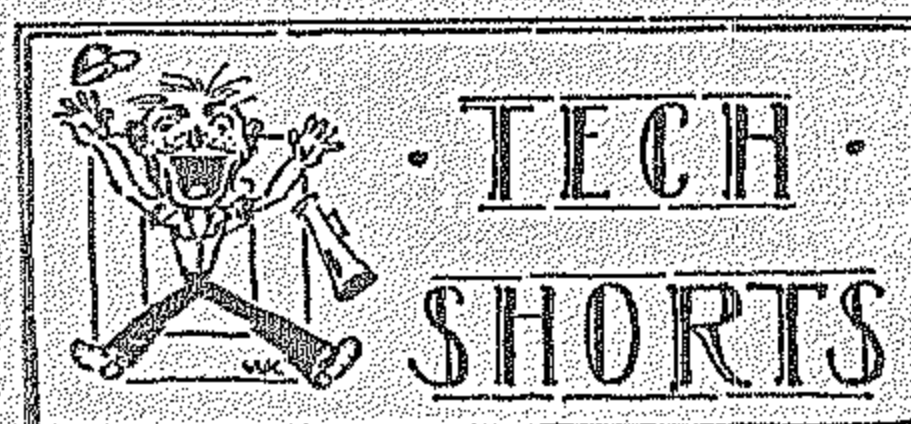

Nick Natinchek won his first match this season against George Williams. Playing No. 2 man, Nick trounced Gangell 6-1, 6-1. The only matches the "Y" men were able to win were in the singles. Biddle and Wagner both succumbed to a strong service and forehand. Winning for Armour in the other singles were Swanson and Lange. Swanson whipped Berens 6-2, 7-5, while three sets were used by Lange before he finally conquered Schaeffer, 6-0, 7-5, 6-4. Both doubles were won, Natinchek and Swanson playing the No. 1 team and Lange and Biddle winning at No. 2.

Winning all but one match, local netmen emerged victorious last Thursday after a very short and sweet exchange of volleys with the Teachers. Swanson was the only man to go down in defeat wearing the Black and Yellow. "Swanny" took a severe licking from Glasol to the tune of 6-1, 6-0. The other matches were decided by Armour, all matches being two sets in length. Natinchek counted two love sets on Kinney to win his second singles match of the year. Lange, Biddle, and Wagner all won their singles matches, and the doubles teams of Swanson and Natinchek, Lange and Umbrecht were equally successful.

Trackmen Meet Sole Defeat of Season in Finale with Loyola U.

Chicago 'B' Team Noses Out Netmen In Final Match 4-3

Coming surprisingly close to upsetting a highly respected University of Chicago "B" team, the Tech squad dropped the final doubles match and lost 4-3 last Friday afternoon on the Midway courts.

Last year the "B" team wiped the clay courts up with Armour netmen while blanking them 7-0. This year a different story was told. Swanson and Captain Natinchek, playing No. 1 and No. 2 respectively, trounced their opponents in three sets. "Swanny" dropped the first set 3-6 but came back strong in the next two to beat Norian, 7-5, 6-3.

Nick Wins Third

Winning his third match in as many meets, Natinchek smashed his way to a second and third set win of 6-2, 6-2 after losing the first one 3-6 to Hill. Here the parade of Armour victories was delayed, for Lange, Biddle, and Wagner lost their matches. Reynolds stopped Lange 6-4, 3-6, 6-1; Biddle suffered a 3-6, 3-6 defeat at the hands of Stevens; and Wagner lost 6-4, 2-6, 6-4 to Daniels.

Tying the score at three all, Natinchek and Swanson disposed of Hill and Kogan in short order. It took only two sets of 6-1, 6-2 to do the work. Then came the deciding match. Lange and Wagner won the first set 6-2, dropped the second one by a love count, and had a 2-0 lead over their opponents in the third set. However, Stevens and Daniels of Chicago stopped the rally and went on to win the set 6-4 and consequently the meet.

Meet North Central

Only three more meets remain in the 1939 schedule of the tennis team. Yesterday the Natinchek troups were to have played Wheaton on the suburb's courts. A win was expected. This afternoon on the Midway courts the Techawks will meet North Central. On a previous date, the two schools played a 3-3 tie, but today the Colvert stooges will be out to break the tie and win. Wednesday is the last day that former captain Ed Swanson will be wearing an Armour Tech athletic uniform. The tennis match with Loyola will be the last attempt by Swanson to engage in intercollegiate competition. So far this season, playing alternately No. 1 and 2, Ed has been one of the team's most consistent winners, both in the singles and in the doubles. Ed and Nick Natinchek will be out on the courts tomorrow, leading the team in an uprising against the strong Loyola squad.

Softballers Drop

Two to Central Y

Defeat and demoralization hit the Armour softball twice on the same day last week when the Federalists lost a double header to an inferior Central Y.M.C.A. team in Grant Park. The games were played last Thursday and marked the fourth and fifth defeats for the Techawks as against one victory.

The first game was a free hitting affair with the Institute helping the opposition with several errors. Going into the last half of the sixth, Fahey held a one run lead, but after getting two men out, let a man get on by means of an error. This break was followed by a single and a home run and the downtowners won the game 13-12. Standing out for the Armour team was Eddie O'Connor, who drove in six runs.

In the second game, the first Central batter walloped a home run to put the "Y" ahead but the Techawks got it back in their half only to see the Centralites go ahead 2-1 in the third. Another run in the fifth for each team made it 3-2 before the eventual victors tallied twice in the sixth to cinch the victory, 5-2.

To date, the Techawks have split games with Wright and have lost to De Paul, American College of Physical Education, and twice to Central Y.M.C.A. Remaining on the schedule are road games with De Paul and American College.

Ramblers Take Eight Events To Win 67 1/3 - 58 2/3

VANDEKIEFT TOP SCORER

Although building up a 41% to 12 1/3 lead in the field events, Armour's track team failed to hold the lead and the Techawks lost a very close meet to the strong Loyola outfit 67 1/3 to 58 2/3. It marked the first defeat for the outdoor track squad this year.

Despite the fact that they only scored 17 points in running events, the Techawks dropped the meet through points lost in field events. An injury to Miller, previous to the meet, shelved him and cost the Armour team valuable points.

Lenover Sets Record

In looking for someone to blame for their loss, the Techawks could take picks at both Max Lenover and Elson. Lenover, current mile sensation, dropped down to the half mile distance and set a new record for Loyola men of 1:57.4. In addition to this, the Canadian freshman sprinted home first in the quarter. Elson won both sprint events.

Armour, as usual, was led by Captain Vandekieft, who tallied eleven points while Rothenberg and Clark each ran up ten points. Van's victories were in the discus and shot, Harv's in the 120 high hurdles, and Clark's in the javelin and broad-jump.

Armour Sweeps Two Events

In the field, the Techawks swept two events, took all but 1/3 of a point in another, and eight points in a fourth. Loyola, on the other hand, monopolized only one event, the two mile run, but got eight points in five others.
