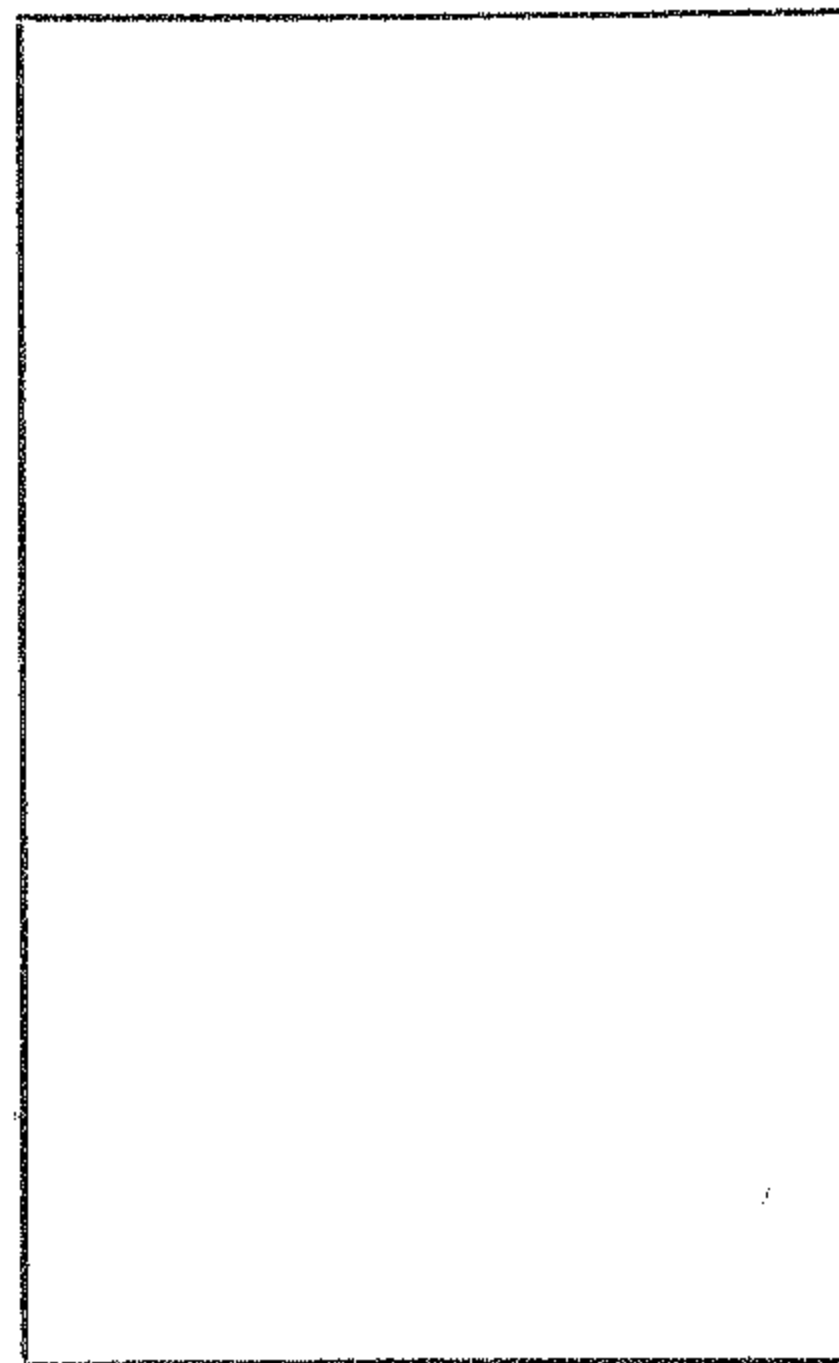

Flash

With the announcement of a completion of work under the new research foundation project, the science of photography has reached a new high. The project sponsored by a gift of \$6,735,000,000 by Elmer Slurp Esq. has just been completed after seven years' intensive study. With the development of new films and the grinding of seventeen new lenses the camera was placed in a light proof building mounted on bed springs with four feather beds as part of the springing. Seven feet of cork placed in 1 1/2 inch layers painted black on both sides were used in the walls and floors of the building. The ceiling was mounted from 17 ton girders and placed by means of free wheeling.

Especially care had to be taken in the lighting. Four synchronous motors ran the generators connected to separate power sources in order to eliminate any possibility of failure. Four hundred and seventy and one thoid photo lamps designed for the occasion were next mounted. The entire equipment was hermetically sealed and packed in ice with 12% salt to secure equilibrium in temperature conditions. Exposure was calculated to 4 hrs. 27 minutes 35.4961 seconds. Exact timing was controlled by means of four tuning forks vibrating in a vacuum.

The results published in THE ARMOUR TECH NEWS by special permission of the Foundation is the first time anything of this sort has been attempted by any periodical.
