

Weissman Gets Record Turnout For Wrestling, Boxing; 92 Report

New System Installed For Wrestlers

Friday, September 29 marked an event of the uppermost significance in the athletic history of Armour Tech. This date featured the largest turnout of men for athletic competition in the many years of the school's sporting activity. Ninety-two men reported for the wrestling and boxing teams at a meeting held in the gymnasium.

Coach Sonny Weissman expects the total to swell to over one-hundred and twenty during the season. Competition will naturally be keener than in past years, and consequently the caliber of the squads is expected to be improved.

Tough on Wrestlers

This season major letters will be awarded in wrestling as was the case during the past semester. Boxing has not reached the status of a major sport and will not be honored with major awards. Much greater interest has been displayed in wrestling, over two-thirds of the candidates having reported for this sport. The following rules will hold for the awarding of major letters in wrestling:

- 1) A major letter shall be awarded to any team member who participates in every meet during the season.
- 2) A major letter will be awarded to any team member who wins a majority of the meets in which he participates, said number of meets to be determined by the coach.
- 3) A major letter shall be awarded to any team member who in the opinion of the coach has participated in a sufficient number of matches and displayed some winning form and winning spirit.

Challenge System Installed

All candidates for positions on the wrestling team will be rated by coach Weissman according to weight and ability. If any candidate desires to raise his rating he may do so by challenging the men in the position above his and fighting a bout under notice to the coach or manager. These bouts must be with advance notice and must be fought at least three days before any scheduled meet.

A great majority of the regular team is back for competition this year. Among those who have graduated are Co-captain Tullgren and McDaniels. No number one man's position is assured as yet, but the returning men will probably be favored for the posts.

Prospects Good

The new crop includes a high school state champion and a runner up. Most of the boys have competed in high school or with neighborhood clubs.

Boxers will be given special attention so that a school team will be formed which is capable of competing with other school squads. The best boxers will be given an opportunity to compete in the Golden Gloves and other citywide tourneys.

McGillivray Starts Men On Swimming Practice

As a sign that the swimming season is not far off, the first meeting of McGillivray's boys for the '39-'40 season was held last Monday. The conclave was conducted by the team's manager, Fred DeMoney.

About thirty men were present, some twenty being new men and the rest lettermen. The fact that many of the new men have had team experience makes this season's outlook seem very bright. Among the newcomers are Pearson, a Lane Tech teammate of Otto Jarretz, and Sanders, transfer student from Oklahoma A. & M. The former does the 100 yard free style in about :56, while the latter swam two years varsity as a backstroke in the 150 yard event.

Although no meets have been definitely scheduled, practice will start this week in Bartlett pool at U. of Chicago. Under the expert guidance of coach McGillivray, the men will take their daily workouts from two to five o'clock every afternoon. The first meet will probably be held in the first part of January.

Basketball Card Released; Sixteen Games Scheduled

Although going into the season with the smallest Armour team in late years, Coach Stenger has carded the longest as well as the most appropriate Armour schedule in some time. Fifteen games have already been scheduled and another is planned to complete a well balanced program.

In contrast to other years when teams far superior and well as far inferior were met, this schedule contains only two games that might fall in this category. Chicago may be classed in the former and George Williams in the latter.

Trip to Grand Rapids, Detroit

In all other games the Techawks will be playing teams they stand a good chance of beating. Detroit University and DeSales University of Toledo have been supplanted on the schedule by Grand Rapids U. and Lawrence Tech of Detroit. These teams will be faced on the annual trip which this year will be taken from February 1 to 4.

Regulars on the schedule are Arkansas State, Lake Forest, De Kalb, Chicago, Elmhurst, and North Central, while Beloit is returning after a year's absence. Elmhurst and North Central will be played twice instead of the usual once this year.

Practise is scheduled to start on or about the first of November.

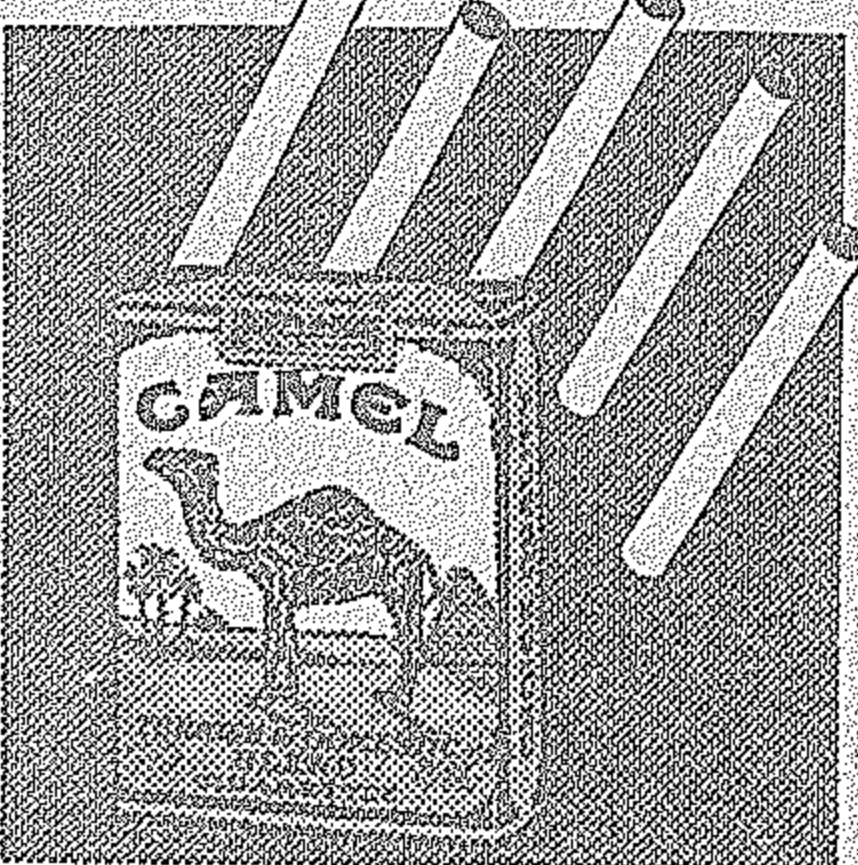
