

Boosters Upset Senior Chems; Comets, Junior, Senior Mechs Win

Senior Mechs Win Two, Comets Shut Out Junior Chems

Two startling upsets of highly touted teams occurred in this week's softball games. The Davey Boosters upset the Senior Chems 1 to 0, and the Freshman Comets beat the Junior Chems 2 to 0. Both of the Chemical teams had exhibited prodigious power in previous games and were considered potential tourney victors.

Pollack Singles

In their game, the Boosters scored a run in the second inning on a sharp single by Russ Pollack, driving in Wally Gow from second base. Gow had reached second on an error by the Chems. The umpire called him out when he slid into second, but Doctor Davey through the use of his glib tongue forced a reversal of the decision.

Pitchers' Battle Wages

The game then evolved into a pitcher's battle between Jim Fahey of the Chems, who allowed only two hits, and Marius Silla of the Boosters, who allowed but three hits. Although the score was close, the Chems were decisively outplayed by the Boosters who fielded flawlessly while the Seniors were making six errors.

Comets Beat Junior Chems

The Comet-Junior Chem game also appeared to be a pitchers' battle, the game being scoreless after five innings of play. But in the first of the sixth, the Comets broke loose and scored two runs to supply the margin of victory.

Mechs Beat Coops

The favored Senior Mechs overwhelmed the 3B and 2B Coops by scores of 10-2 and 11-6 respectively. The Senior Mechs obtained their runs in clusters by grouping a barrage of hits and taking advantage of the Coops' miscues. The Mechs came through in fine style with timely hitting, fine fielding, and superb work by moundman Epstein. It is becoming evident as each game is played that the team winning the tournament must first topple the Senior Mechs.

Obergfell Hits One

In spite of the poor showing the Junior Mechs won their game with the Senior Fire Protecs by a score of 7-6. In the first inning, the Mechs scored one run by a double by Stoolman. Errors by the Mechs gave the Firemen the lead in the second by three runs. Behrens, after turning the tide with a double into right field, was brought in on a hard single by Stoolman. Obergfell, with the bases loaded and two outs, drove a very hard liner into left field which enabled the Mechs to score two runs.

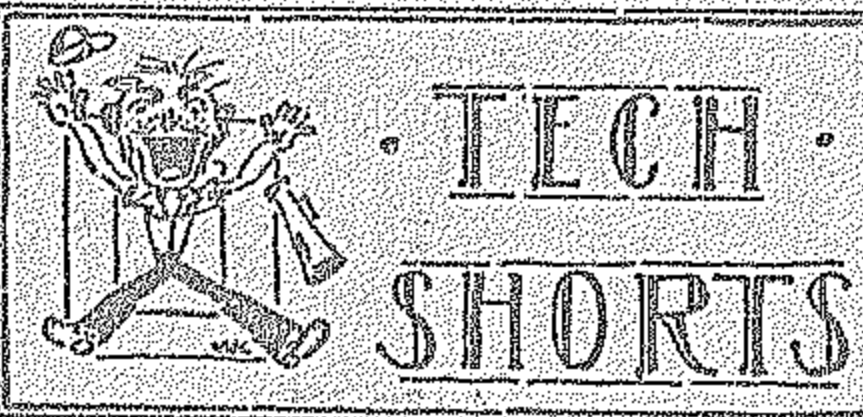
Softballers Drop Opener to De Paul

Armour's softball team dropped its opening game with DePaul, last Friday by a score of 8-1. DePaul coupled thirteen hits with some ragged fielding on the part of the Techawks, to hand Armour its first loss in the college softball tourney. DePaul practically batted around in this half of the first inning, getting four runs on two doubles, a triple, and an error. Armour went out in order in the last of the first, as did DePaul in the first of the second inning.

Wolniak got the first of his two hits in the last of the second and Stimpf followed with another hit, but no score developed as Puhl ended the inning with an infield out. DePaul added a run in each of the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth innings to total the eight runs. Frank Pfeffer, playing right field for the Techmen, batted out two hits, one of them being a home run over the left field fence in the third inning for the lone Armour tally.

In the first extra-inning game of the season, the Armour nine lost a thrilling eleven inning game to the North Central Cardinals by a 3-2 count. The game was played on the Naperville diamond Saturday, April 20.

Two Hits Score Winning Run
North Central scored its winning run on a triple and a single. Shatzer, the pitcher for the Cardinals, cracked one over Krause's head in left center for the three bagger, and Kailer, North Central's lead-off man singled past the shortstop to drive in the winning run.

Armour scored early in the game, getting one run in the first and the other one in the fourth. Captain Leonard crossed the plate with Armour's first tally after getting a walk stealing second and scoring on Rehwaltdt's hit.

Score Tied in Fifth
By sending runners across the plate in the fourth and fifth frame, North Central tied the ball game. For their part of the ninth, the Techawks missed their chance to win the game as Rehwaltdt was tagged out at the plate by the pitcher.

The game was punctuated by a series of misplays and injuries on the part of the Armour nine. Both Bauch and Lukens received finger injuries, and the total of six errors were a big factor in producing North Central's two runs.

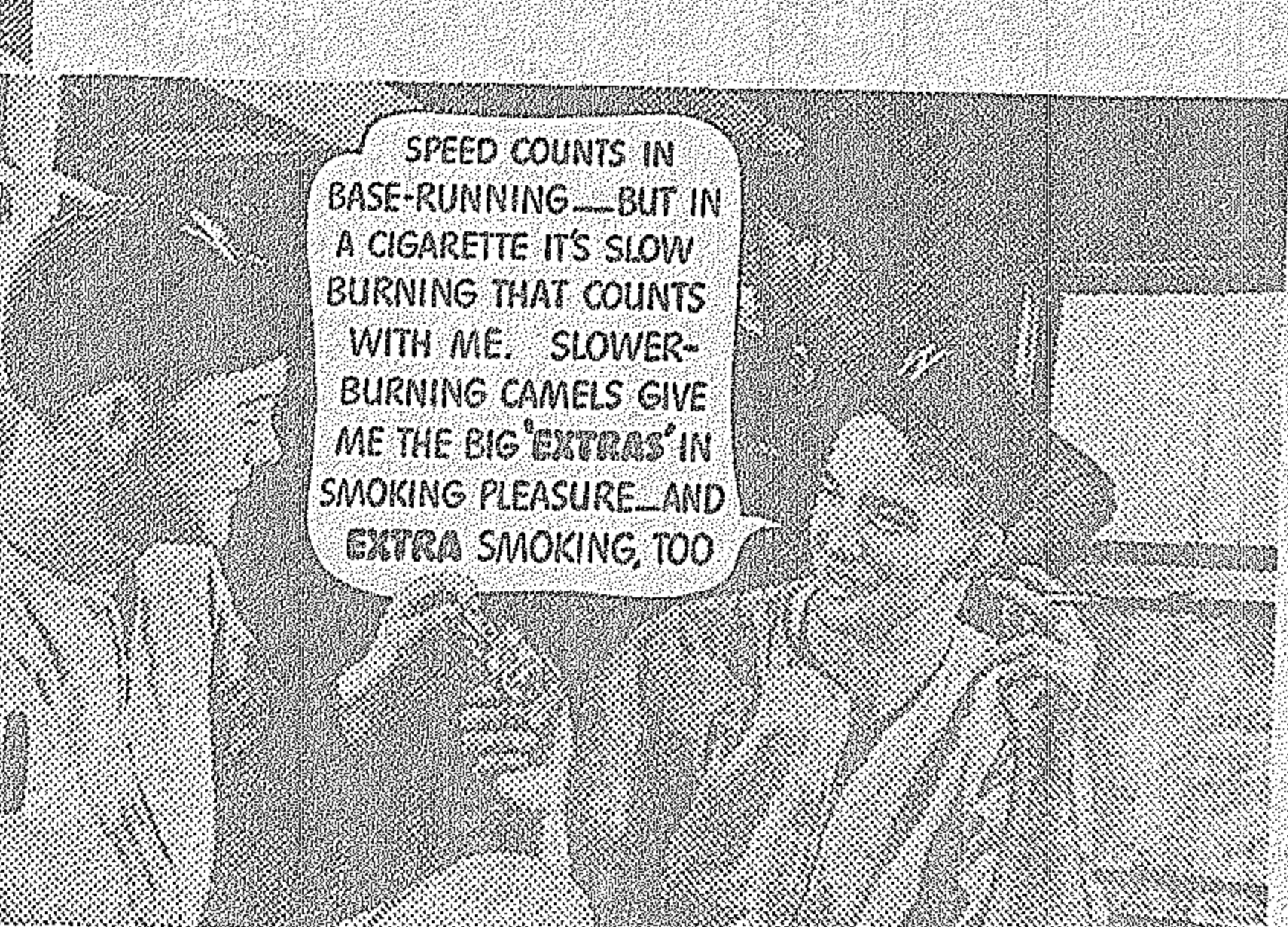
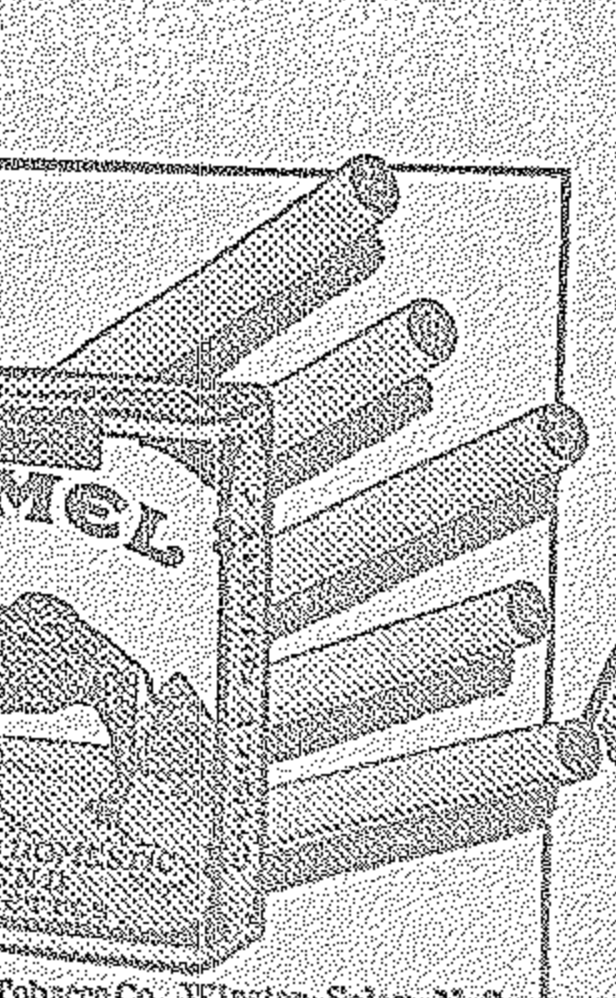
