A second game between Armour's A team and Bradley Tech was called off because the temperature hovered around 20 F. This match was postponed until May 9 at which time the Southmoor Golf Club will be the field of battle.

While the four man A team was carrying Armour's banners afield the B team, also four men, trounced Wright Jr. College 13 to 0 at home on the Southmoor golf course.

Loyola Next Victim

Sunday, April 20th, Armour's six-man team took Loyola University's team to camp by a score of 22 1/2 to 4 1/2, Armour's first defeat of Loyola in several years. Adam Jemsek turned in the low score of 79, Ralph Schmal shot an 80 and Don Sunde shot an 82. These scores were turned in on a day when it took a real golfer to shoot even an 85 for there was a strong wind to tempt the balls from their true flight.

One of the hardest fights of the season was the match with Wayne University. The golf team considers this meet to be a real test of their skill. The Armour Techs had their chance Saturday April 27th to display their prowess. Despite an excellent performance by Schmal, who turned in an 80, Bredlau with an 81, Korrell with an 81, and Sunde with an 82, the Armourites lost their first game of the season by a close score of 10 to 8. Latus of Wayne had the lowest score, a 76, and Weks, another Wayne man had 81.

Netmen Defeat Chicago Teachers 5-2 in Second Win

The netmen came through with their second win Friday, April 26, when they defeated Chicago Teachers College, 5-2, and then made it three wins in a row when they shut out De Kalb, 6-0, a week ago today.

Nick Wins

In the Chicago Teachers game, the Techs won all but one of the singles matches, and split the two doubles matches to take the meet. Nick Natinchek, playing No. 1, got his first victory of the season when he downed Fitch of Chicago Teachers in straight sets, 6-1, 6-4. Bob Lange lost his third match in a row when he lost to Hartl, the teacher's No. 2 man, 1-6, 6-3, 4-6.

Captain Ralph Wagner, at the No. 3 spot, beat Gottfried, 6-4, 6-4. Mike Schultz had an easy time with Schwartz, winning in two sets, 6-1, 6-1, while Dunworth defeated Rubin, 6-0, 6-4 to finish the singles play.

No. 1 Doubles Lose

Dunworth teamed up with Lange for the Techawk No. 1 doubles, but they succumbed to Fitch and Schwartz, 6-4, 8-6. Wagner and Schultz again proved to be a winning combination as the No. 2 doubles. They won the first set, 9-7, against Hartl and Gottfried, and leading 5-0 in the second set, on set point, Schultz smashed a hard drive which hit Hartl in the eye, breaking his glasses. Consequently, play was stopped at that point, and this match given to Armour on default.

The Techawks made a clean sweep of the De Kalb meet, with only one singles and one of the doubles matches going to three sets.

DeKalb Blasted in Singles

Natinchek lost his first set to Cohen, 3-6, and then went on to win the next two sets, 6-1, 7-5. Bob Lange finally came into the win column, when he trimmed DeKalb's No. 2 man, Gilbertson, 6-0, 6-1. Captain Wagner continued his winning streak by beating Henne in two straight sets, 6-3, 6-1, and Schultz completed the singles matches with a 6-3, 6-0 win over Taxman.

The No. 1 doubles combination of Lange and Natinchek finally chalked up a win when they beat Cohen and Henne, after losing the first set 7-5, and then winning the next two, 12-10, 6-1. Wagner and Schultz again showed their doubles ability with a 6-0, 6-3 win over Gilbertson and Taxman, DeKalb's No. 2 doubles team.

Netmen Now on Southern Jaunt

The wins over Chicago Teachers and DeKalb made it three wins against one loss so far this season. The loss was the first meet of the season to the University of Chicago, while the other win was over George Williams. This week the tennis team travels to Indiana for three meets in three days. Today, the netmen take on Purdue, tomorrow, Indiana State Teachers College, and on Thursday they travel to Indianapolis for a meet with Butler University. Last year, the Techawks beat Indiana State, but lost to Butler and Purdue.

Better Than Last Year

As things look now, the tennis team should better their record of last year, which consisted of six wins, five losses, and a tie. Natinchek, after dropping his first two matches, is now the proud possessor of two straight victories. Lange is well on the start of a victory string as was shown by his decisive win in the De Kalb meet. A No. 2 doubles combination has finally been discovered which really seems to click. The steady playing of the Wagner and Schultz doubles team has already accounted for three straight wins, and if the No. 1 doubles team can start to chalk up some more wins, the netmen will end the season well over the .500 mark.

Playing with such former Armour "greats" as Seidenberg, Dunne, Wagner, and Kruse, "Lenny" found himself in the line-up as a left fielder. Out in that part of the garden the future captain looked like a natural, for his ability to snare flies and his fast and accurate peg were very much a part in the ball game.

Sloppy Fielding Proves Downfall; Tech Loses 9-0

Spotty fielding and untimely errors once more proved to be the downfall of Stenger's men in Saturday's game at the Chicago Teachers College. An error after two were out in the first paved the way for three runs. The Techmen showed a bit of the brilliant fielding that they are capable of as they pulled a flashy double play in the third inning. However, another costly error in the fourth after two were out allowed three more runs to trickle in.

Techawks Hit Ball Hard

Despite their lack of safe bingos, the Techmen really lambasted the ball, but it was just one of those days when everything they hit went right into the hands of a fielder. The Colonels got to Yursis, Armour's ace, for three runs in the first, three in the fourth, two in the fifth and one in the sixth, while O'Brien, the Colonels' chucker, kept the Techmen well under control, giving only four hits and not allowing one man to get past second base. Player, Armour's frosh lefty, once more showed great possibilities for the future when he replaced Yursis on the mound in the seventh. Player faced seven men, struck out one, walked one, and allowed no hits.

Colonels Get Three in First

In the first, the Techawks went out in order. Jacobsen, the Colonel's third baseman started the fireworks with a line drive double to left field. Yursis made King pop-up to Krause for the second out, and then Player dropped what would have been the third out, and let Jacobson score. Newby did likewise on Burke's fly to Carrier. The Colonel's ninth and last run was scored by Konrad who reached first on Leonard's error, stole second, and scored on King's single.

The final score was 9-0, the Colonels got nine runs on nine hits and they made one error. The Techmen scored no runs on four hits, and they committed seven errors.
