Last night, while everyone was sound asleep, the sisters of Kappa Phi Delta Sorority were busy decorating every inch of campus to kick off Paint IIT Pink! October is National Breast Cancer Month and the sorority is proud to host the 2nd annual all-day event promoting school spirit, raising awareness of the disease, and benefiting The Breast Cancer Research Foundation.

In addition to streamers, balloons, paint, and other pink decorations across campus, the MTCC South Lawn is covered in ribbon stakes recognizing the names of IIT-related survivors and victims of breast cancer. Starting at 11 a.m., the Office of Campus Life will have free yummy cookies and a large ribbon banner to sign while the Student Health

and Wellness Center will be giving self-breast exam demonstrations as well as handing out informational pamphlets on the MTCC Bridge. From 12 p.m. to 2 p.m., Kappa sisters will also be holding a bake sale on the Greek Quad and The Commons will serve delicious pink lemonade during both lunch and dinner. The entire IIT community is encouraged to wear pink and share pictures of the fun with the hashtag #PaintIITPink2014 on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram.

Throughout the day, customized Paint IIT Pink buttons (\$1 each) will be sold, in addition to raffle tickets (\$1 each / \$3 for 5) for a chance to win a 24-inch screen VIZIO 1080p LCD HDTV as well as prizes from various local Bridgeport businesses. The day will end with the Women's Volleyball team playing against Mount Mary College in the Volley for the Cure game at 7 p.m. in Keating, during which raffle winners

will be chosen, Colleges Against Cancer of IIT will host an additional awareness activity, and Scarlet Fever will have giveaways and games for the audience.

All proceeds from sales and donations will benefit The Breast Cancer Research Foundation, with every \$25 turning into 1/2 hour of research to cure a disease projected to kill 40,000 women and 430 men this year in the US alone. Since 1993, the foundation has funded over half a billion dollars of lifesaving research from over 200 of the brightest minds in science and medicine. Donations in any form will be graciously accepted throughout today leading up to the Volley for the Cure game, during which the fundraising results will be announced.

April Wanagas, a fellow Kappa sister, founded the event last year with the help of Scarlet Fever and Office of Campus Life, managing to inspire an entire campus to rally

behind an important cause in a way unique to IIT. In her own words, "Paint IIT Pink is more than just a philanthropic event to me. It is now a representation of all the difference I have realized a small, ambitious group of people can make. It represents the help my mother received during her treatment, and through our efforts, the support and comfort we can help give others facing this disease." Last year, \$1,090 was raised for the Susan G. Komen Passionately Pink Foundation and this year, Kappa hopes to raise over \$1,500 for the Breast Cancer Research Foundation with the support of the entire IIT community. The sisters of the sorority would like to thank Union Board, the Office of Campus Life, Colleges Against Cancer of IIT, and the Student Activity Fund's funding for their invaluable support in hosting an event that impacts the lives of so many in the IIT community and beyond.

OCL hosts Campus Life Excellence Awards

Illinois Tech is home to over one hundred active student organizations for students to participate in with their time outside of classes. Student organizations on campus are responsible for the vast majority of campus events as well as tons of other ways for students to engage in their campus community outside of the classroom.

IIT's Office of Campus Life (OCL) is the department within the university responsible for overseeing all student organizations. The office ensures that student organizations are following all campus regulations, assists organizations with programming events, and also helps student leaders with funding their organizations. This semester, OCL is also enacting an initiative to recognize the efforts of student organizations and their student leaders.

The Campus Life Excellence Awards are a new event coming to IIT each semester, hosted by the Office of Campus Life. A variety

of awards are being presented as part of the Campus Life Excellence Awards. Applications for several of the awards were made available on HawkLink on October 1.

Three awards will be presented to an entire organization; these awards are Outstanding New Student Organization, Outstanding Programming or Event, and Outstanding Community Service Project. Five awards will be presented to individuals who are part of a student organization: Outstanding Student Organization President, Outstanding Student Organization Executive Board Member, Outstanding New Member, Outstanding Senior Member, and Unsung Hero. Finally, two awards are being recognized by the Office of Campus Life; they will present awards for Excellence in Budgeting and Excellence in Event Planning.

Tricia Banach, a coordinator in the Office of Campus Life, is one of the driving forces behind this new OCL tradition. "Our student organizations are doing some amazing things on campus and we wanted to take an opportunity to showcase them," said Banach.

The Campus Life Excellence Awards

offer a way for active members of IIT's campus to be acknowledged for their work. "A lot of the time, I think our student organizations and their members can go unrecognized for going above and beyond in service to their organizations and they deserve to be recognized. It's important that we give students the opportunity to say 'Way to go, you did something awesome and I am thankful for you," said Banach.

Award applications can be found under the "Campus Links" tab on the homepage of HawkLink. Applications for the Campus Life Excellence Awards close at midnight on November 4.

After the award applications are submitted, staff from the Office of Campus Life and Division of Student Affairs will review them. Banach adds that she hopes to have the nominations publicly available in the OCL suite for students to read. "I think we can all learn a lot from each other and from these awards and it will be a great sharing opportunity when it comes to programming ideas and to see what other organization leadership is doing to motivate their members," she added.

The Campus Life Excellence Awards culminate with an award ceremony being held on November 18 from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. in the MTCC Ballroom. Banach says that all students are welcome to join the award ceremony regardless of whether they've been nominated for an award or whether they're involved in student organizations. She does add that students interested in attending should RSVP to the event on HawkLink.

The Office of Campus Life looks forward to hosting the awards and seeing the nomination submissions. "Students at IIT are doing great things through their student organizations and are bringing vibrancy to this campus. They deserve to be recognized and celebrated and we are hoping that everyone takes the time to be thoughtful with their nominations," said Banach. "You can also nominate multiple people and organizations for things! If you have any questions about the awards, please reach out to your OCL liaison. 

The Student Center for Diversity and Inclusion, the Office of Campus Life, and IIT Dining Services recognized the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Queer/Question (LGBTQ) History Month at a special Sharing Table on Thursday, October 2, 2014, in the Mc-Cormick Tribune Campus Center Commons. The Sharing Table is held on the first Thursday of every month during the academic term. It is a special program that helps foster personal interaction between undergraduate students, graduate students, and faculty. You can engage

yourself in spirited conversation about hobbies, culture, sports, or current events while dining at The Commons. A small group of students are given a chance to learn a great deal about their instructors in this type of social setting.

LGBTQ History Month is a monthlong annual observance of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) history, and the history of the gay rights and related civil rights movements. Many students, faculty members and staff attended this event.

A number of colleges and universities, as well as some law schools, have implemented Safe Space programs to provide resources and support for individuals who

identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender, as well as persons who might have questions about their sexuality or concerns about a friend or loved one who is LGBT.

IIT is a safe zone university and they make sure that everyone is treated equally. This month is celebrated with the same enthusiasm like any other event of the year. There are many other events following up in the celebration of this month.

One of the interesting events is Safe on Campus LGBT Ally Training, which is organized by The Office of Campus Life. It will facilitate a two-hour ally training session for interested students from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Tuesday, October 7, 2014 in Siegel Hall, Room 203. This workshop is intended to educate the campus community on the history of LGBTQ persons and help identify terms and experiences through engaging activities.

3D printers arrive in Galvin Library

If you were to walk by the group study suite on the first floor of our very own Galvin Library, you would see the newly set up "Exploration Space" which houses two 3D printers meant exclusively for IIT students. They can be used to print anything from anime figurines to a working model of an engine. It would be hard to miss the brightly colored AirWolf artistically sculpting a model of the Willis Tower, the timing carriage moving over the printer bed from one side to another.

Upon speaking to Pattie Piotrowski, Assistant Dean of Public Services, the motivation behind the project became clear. She says that the idea to make 3D printing an accessible service for students is twofold. Firstly, numerous students have been finding it hard to print their models for coursework (primarily architecture and material science majors) at the 3D printer over at the Idea Shop, which at times involved a long waiting period. Secondly, the whole idea of acquiring a printer at the library was the brainchild of the Dean of IIT Libraries,

Sharon Bostick, who has been considering this project for quite some time now. Peer libraries have been providing opportunities for students to explore and learn, such as North Carolina State University's Hunt Library and others. Piotrowski, while observing that IIT has always been a breeding ground for technology, said, "IIT students are very unique," being both creative and technology-minded.


In recent times, the library has evolved to more than just a place for books and studying. It is a union of creativity and learning in all aspects, with the Exploration Space being proof of this. Piotrowski said, "We believe that the library continues to be an innovative space, and it's both experimental and experiential." She says that our students deserve the right to be creative in any form of learning, be it studying on their own, as a group in one of the library's group study suites or getting creative in any way they choose. The library recognizes that IIT students are creative and inventive, irrespective of their majors. The Exploration Space is meant to foster creativity and develop learning with play, which has always appealed to the millennial generation.

We can expect to see a lot more technological equipment in the Exploration Space and the library environment in general. The library is looking into acquiring state-of-theart gadgets like Google Glass, GoPro cameras, Arduino Robotics kits and media editing software. These would propel hands-on learning and give IIT students a chance to be as creative as possible. The number of projects is unlimited and exploring and inventing will be every student's favorite thing to do in the library. However, buying all the gadgets with the allocated budget will be a task. Budget management is always a tricky thing but once the decision is made, library staff tries to find the money.

The 3D printers have been operational for a little over two weeks now. They work on a first-come, first-serve basis. Students can submit print jobs by going online and submitting print requests in the required format. An email with an estimated cost is then sent to the student, but the charges for printing are very nominal and are meant only to recover the cost of the filament. The current printing cost is ten cents for one gram, which

would mean roughly \$5 to \$10 for most small objects like models or phone cases. Softwares such as MatterControl and NetFabb are used to modify the files and eventually print them. The printers are currently operational Monday to Saturday. In the future, it is expected that a specialist will be available to help students out with designing customized models on a consultation and appointment basis.

Apart from the 3D printers, the Exploration Space also has badge/button makers which students can use for any purpose they see fit. Student organizations can make the most out of this for their school events and campaigning. Recently, a student organization made badges for the "Paint IIT Pink" campaign and other clubs can make use of this nominally priced service. 3D printing and badge/button making are intended for personal purposes and for fundraising as a student group, but should not be used for commercial purposes. The energy on the bridge was inde-




They will represent the entire IIT community and make library services available for everyone. If you are not on board and still have any questions then please email Jennifer




new member ideas. Students involved in LIFE and HACE have access to networking events, one on one career mentoring, and discounts (if not free) for conference events that happen outside of Chicago.

Which Wich Restaurant Review

Over the summer in San Diego, I discovered the best sub sandwich chain restaurant. I had never seen one of those in Illinois, so I assumed it was a regional specific restaurant, like White Castle is to the Midwest. Once back in Illinois, my craving for a sub sparked my curiosity. After some quick searching, I found that they do exist outside of the West Coast. My newly found favorite sub sandwich chain is Which Wich.

After a quick ride on the Green Line and hopping on the Red Line to stop at Lake, I found the Chicago Which Wich, right at the exit from the basement of shopping center Block Thirty Seven. Some people might know the place better for the Disney store right next door.

At Which Wich, the customer decides what ingredients go on their sandwich, but in a non-traditional way. Instead of telling the employee what to put on the sub, the hungry customer fills out an extensive checklist of ingredients and options that they want on the sub. This checklist is completed on a brown paper bag with all the options printed on it. Instead of telling the employees what to put on the sub, there is a table with markers to fill out the bag, which once completed is given to the cashier. Upon the order being fulfilled, the bag then doubles as a sub sleeve to carry around the sandwich.

There are the standard ingredients like lettuce, tomatoes, and pickles, but then there are unusual options, like dried cranber-

ries, house chips, and candied walnuts. Along with that there are 10 types of cheeses to pick from, 9 sauce, 4 mustard, 4 mayo, and 6 dressing varieties, 3 onion types, 7 oils and spices, and the option for double meat, bacon, sliced egg, and avocado. There is an option for every possible customization that could be thought of and more.

On top of all these choices, there is still the meat choice, or lack thereof. There are 10 standard different varieties of meat to choose from, each with their own bag, and on each bag, there are sub-choices of different combinations of meat to pick from. Plus, there is a Sub of the Month bag, usually featuring an exotic sub based on some international food. However, this sub has limited options, sometimes none at all. For small children, a regular sub might not be appetizing, so they offer a PB & J sandwich.

Other than the obvious advantage where the sub is ultra-customizable, this checklist method minimizes possible miscommunication between the customer and employee. Plus, the process is very speedy, because the sub maker does not have to keep asking what to put on the sub. However, speed is not the emphasis, so for those with a fast paced lifestyle, Jimmy Johns would probably be better.

Compared to subway, these subs are bigger, include more meat, and have more flavors. However, Which Wich does not have as many choices of bread, featuring only white and wheat. The extra ingredients easily make up for the fewer types of bread, but if you cannot live without Italian Herbs & Cheese then Which Wich is not for you.

For drinks, they have a refrigerator with some specialty beverages, plus a soda machine for unlimited refills. If you want something a bit more filling to drink, they also offer milkshakes, that—in the spirit of Which Wich—are customizable. For dessert, they offer cookies, Wich krispies (rice crispy treats), brownies, and ice cream cookie sandwiches.


While the food is amazing, the atmosphere of Which Wich is surprisingly nice. They all feature a good selection of music that they call Which Wich radio. The interior is modern styled without looking industrial, with glass, stainless steel, white, black, and yellow. Plus there is an art wall where customers can hang their sketches done on the back of the checklist brown paper bags.

There is one downside to Which Wich, which only applies to the Chicago franchise. The ones in California all had a friendly staff and quick service, but the Chicago one was understaffed with sluggish workers. They did not mess up anything on my order, but they were preoccupied with something else so it took a while to get on my order even though I was the only person ordering anything.

If you want a filling sub, and don't mind paying a bit more than \$5, then Which Wich is worth trying. There are so many options that whatever mood for food you are in, Which Wich has you covered.
