

MCHAP occupies IIT's College of Architecture

For College of Architecture students, Wednesday, October 22, was an early morning—and a long day. At 9:30 a.m., Dean Wiel Arets announced the beginning of the Mies Crown Hall Americas Prize (MCHAP) 2000-2013 Symposium and Award Ceremony. Following the Dean's short speech, each of the seven MCHAP inaugural finalists broke off into student-led discussions with the architects and clients about project-specific details.

The Iberê Camargo Foundation breakout session was very well attended, and it seemed like even more people started crowding around to hear the conversation as the session came to a close. Contradicting his aging body and hearing difficulties, Alvaro Siza, the Portuguese architect of the project, captured the imagination of everyone around him. The way he spoke about the foundation built in Porto Alegre, Brazil and the way he conducted himself throughout the session made him feel like a grandfather. Even the men present during the session who worked with Siza on the project radiated with positive energy, laughter, and smiles--one of whom stressed the wonderful "spirit of collaboration" on this "happy project." The same man also said that whenever they reached a tough spot in the project, they always followed their master, Alvaro Siza, and found a way to accomplish what needed to be done in order to maintain the project's integrity. For instance, béton Blanc (white concrete) was never made in Brazil before this foundation. Therefore, those involved with the project found a way to make it work, even though they were forced to invent a whole new way to build

in Brazil.


Another amazing thing about Siza's foundation is how he came up with the form of the building. The taller rectangular mass of the foundation reads as being very stable, yet it also has three angular arms that stretch out from the mass, creating a hole between the mass and the arms where you can stand outside feeling still enveloped in the architecture. Alvaro Siza described the context of the site, with the liveliness of the downtown area in view while looking in the direction of where the arms of the building stretch out. He felt a pull towards downtown himself, and this reflects in how he pulled out the ramps (which is the function of the arms, joining the different floors of the structure) from the tall mass: the architecture itself stretches out towards the city. The taller mass then has a shorter corresponding rectangular mass, and both are connected underground by the service areas located one meter below. Additionally remarkable is how, despite there being very few window perforations in the massive block making up the foundation, Siza claims that the building can operate until 6 p.m. without electrical light. The small windows give such expansive views while also taking in light, which reflects off the white concrete walls to illuminate the entire space.

Obviously, the breakout session with architects and clients was the most interesting part of the entire symposium. The subsequent roundtable client-focused discussion with the entire college, held in Crown Hall's Upper Core, was quite dreadful. By this time, everyone was getting hungry, and it did not help that the roundtable went overtime by an hour, leaving only twenty minutes for lunch. Following lunch was the MCHAP debate with all seven finalists

and the jury at the roundtable. The debate topic, Rethinking Metropolis, was intriguing, because this is basically the slogan of the new dean of the architecture college. Tension was created in Kenneth Frampton's opening words, when he effectively denied that the metropolis could be rethought, that this would be quite a daunting task. On the other hand, he quoted Mies van der Rohe by advocating that we must learn to live in the jungle, in the chaos, since cities have expanded so much lately. This debate felt mostly static after his opening comments, other than one later instance when the person representing the Seattle Central Library spoke out in a cynical manner against architects creating a distinct language and that architects should instead do whatever "turns them on."

The finale of events after the debate included a fancy reception, dinner, and presentation of awards against the elegantlydecorated Crown Hall (this environment enhanced by its lack of architecture students during these events). The candles lining nearly the entire length of the building created an experience like no other while viewing the building from the outside in the surrounding night-time darkness. In the end, both Alvaro Siza and Herzog & de Meuron (for their unique parking garage at 1111 Lincoln Road, Miami, Florida) won a prize, since the jury ended up splitting the original MCHAP 2000-2013 into one for 2000-2008 (presented to Siza) and another for 2009-2013 (given to Herzog & de Meuron). Overall, the entire day of MCHAP transformed Crown Hall into a building worth even more than its previous significance owed to Mies, and it also opened up students' eyes to the real world of architects practicing remarkable architecture around the globe today.

The Illinois Institute of Technology Board of Trustees unanimously selected current provost, Alan W. Cramb, to succeed John L. Anderson as president of the university. This announcement came late on Thursday, October 23 in the form of an email from Bud Wendorf, Chairman of the IIT Board of Trustees.

The selection process for the next president of the university began earlier this year; at the May 2014 meeting of the IIT Board of Trustees, President John Anderson announced his decision to resign from his position on August 1, 2015. A selection committee was then assembled that included representatives from various aspects of the IIT community, including trustees, professors, and a representative from student government. Under direction from the Board of Trustees, the committee met to conduct an evaluation of Provost Alan Cramb for the position of president. The selection committee then reported their findings to the Board of Trustees, and the board then elected Cramb to succeed Anderson.

"Alan has been instrumental in moving the university to a new level of academic excellence over the past six years," said Wendorf. "His leadership has helped IIT increase its undergraduate enrollment to record levels, strengthen its financial position, and attract eminent scholars to our colleges. He also understands the challenges facing higher education. The Board of Trustees believes that he will be an outstanding president and looks forward to working with him in the years ahead."

Cramb has served the university as Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs since 2008. As provost, Cramb is responsible for overseeing all educational activities within the university. He also worked closely with President Anderson to implement the university's new strategic plan.

Following the selection of Alan Cramb as our next university president, the IIT Board of Trustees has announced that a national search for a new university provost will begin in the near future.



Nobel Prize Winner Malala Yousafzai

Malala Yousafzai and India's Kailash Satyarthi were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for their work in promoting children's rights on Friday, October 10. Yousafzai became the youngest recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize. She is the first Pakistani to become a Nobel laureate since Abdus Salam who also shared the prize in 1979 with U.S. nominee Steven Weinberg for Physics.

What makes the event more thoughtful, though, is that she passed the two-year anniversary of the horrid event that tossed her and her cause onto the world stage just a day prior to the announcement.

Yousafzai was riding home from school on Tuesday, October 9, 2012. Gunmen halted the van she was in and demanded that other girls in the vehicle identify her. She was pointed out. At least one gunman opened fire, wounding three girls. Two suffered nonlethal injuries, but bullets struck Yousafzai in the head and neck. She was left in critical condition. Fortunately, she received proper treatment in time and survived.

Soon, Yousafzai became a global symbol for the fight to allow girls everywhere access to an education. She founded "The Ma-

lala Fund," which invests in local educational initiatives for girls in Pakistan, Nigeria, Kenya, and Jordan, where it focuses on Syrian refugees. She continued to advocate around the world for a girl's right to an education, speaking before the U.N.

The Norwegian Nobel Committee awarded the prize, stating that peaceful global development can only come about if children and the young are respected. "The Norwegian Nobel Committee has decided that the Nobel Peace Prize for 2014 is to be awarded to Kailash Satyarthi and Malala Yousafzai for their struggle against the suppression of children and young people and for the right of all children to education," the jury said.

For me, Yousafzai is a real life super hero who is ready to give up everything for the sake of education, not only for herself but for every individual in our country. Being a Pakistani girl and coming from a remote area of Pakistan just like Yousafzai, she has a very especial place in my heart. Not just for what she is doing, but for how she is doing it.

A citizen is awarded the highest moral award of our civilization. In the words of a former committee chairman, this is a symbol "of goodwill and purity of heart all over the world". This is the Nobel Peace Prize after all, and it's about the glory of the human ideal, and I think Yousafzai can be the perfect example

for struggle and determination for a noble cause. But then it all goes wrong; A local paper screams "not to provoke the (...) people by rewarding this traitor to the nation." Parts of the press call our hero a 'puppet' and 'an insult' to the country. Our local laureate is feted abroad and unwanted at home. Yes, the sane voices sigh, we haven't heard this one before.

It really hurts me to see how she is being criticized by my fellow countrymen for getting this award. They say there are "candidates more deserving." It should have been Abdul Sattar Edhi, an unsung angel they mention once a year (whenever Yousafzai might win another award). But an award for Yousafzai isn't one less for Edhi because both of them are not in opposition to one another. If nothing else, her win leaves the door open for 2015, 2016, and any other year we'd want to spend making ad hominem arguments instead of volunteering at the Edhi Foundation. Instead of criticizing her, we should all be happy that she is presenting Pakistan on an international level. She is the one who is standing tall in front of the world, bearing the criticism and searching for positivity in every negative comment she gets. She is the one who is still not quitting, but moving forward to bring a change in the world. I just hope and pray that sanity prevails and we learn to love and accept our own people.

Siemens attends IEEE Second General Body Meeting

The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers at IIT (IEEE) held their second general body meeting on Wednesday, October 22 at the Engineering 1 building auditorium (E1 104). The guest speakers for the event were Salim Vahabudeen, Aaron Miller, and George Williams from Siemens Healthcare. Williams, who currently works as a hardware engineer at Siemens Healthcare is an alumnus of IIT who was selected by the company at one of IIT's career fairs.

The meeting was commenced by the Vice President of IEEE IIT, Sankesh Jain, who spoke about the IEEE sponsored projects, company tours and also announced the new Programs chair for the organization. Raed Tawil, Industry Relations Chair spoke about potential career opportunities from IEEE IIT, pointing out their connection with companies such as Siemens, Google, and Epic systems.

Vahabudeen, who is a manager at Siemens Healthcare, then spoke about the kinds of medical devices that are being developed at their company and how they are used to save lives. They offer products and solution for the entire range of patient care from prevention and early detection to diagnosis, and onto treatment and aftercare. Siemens has been in this field for decades and have also been a pioneer in health care devices.

Siemens has always been in the forefront of innovation, with their divisions in energy, industry, and also infrastructure. Vahabudeen also explained imaging and therapy, which form an integral part of the Siemens Healthcare division. The imaging and therapy systems include Angiography, Interventional X-ray, Computed Tomography, Radiation Oncology, Magnetic Resonance, Molecular Imaging, and Refurbished Systems. They also provide solutions for clinical products and diagnostics. He also spoke about syngo or Imaging IT (SY) which is a major business unit within the Healthcare division.

He enumerated a number of reasons why imaging plays a major role in guiding treatment for ailments. Imaging is used to capture and analyze, in detail, the body parts which need treatment, and Siemens works on making this possible. They host a vast range of highly accurate imaging systems, which are named the Artis family of imaging devices. Sensis is a recording system that is used to speed up with smart diagnostic tools, link up to Artis and HIS devices, and scale up to use multi-lab connectivity.

Siemens currently has two students from IIT working as interns and is expecting further relations with the IIT student community by providing opportunities within their health care division.

Students Speak Survey to Change IIT

At the request of the President and Provost, IIT students once again launched the Students Speak survey to solicit input for improving the quality of services provided to IIT students. This initiative is focused on soliciting feedback from students about how to improve various service areas. This program is in line with President John L. Anderson's and Provost Alan Cramb's commitment to advancing student satisfaction and the quality of various services (e.g., 'Public Safety, Office of Technology Services (OTS), Academic Resource Center (ARC)) IIT provides to students.

"Students Speak" reflects a philosophy that the student is the customer, who needs to have his/her needs, concerns and ideas, understood in a better way. It is rooted in a belief that IIT can do better by its students. The added perspective of "if it isn't working, it can and will be changed" makes this plan very ambitious.

"Students Speak" is a student committee that includes representatives from Student Government Association (SGA), International Student Organization (ISO), the Greek Community, Camras Scholars, Leadership Academy, Varsity Teams, and several other graduate student organizations has developed "Students Speak". The student committee has developed objectives, a project plan, and a time frame for the "Students Speak" effort. The goals of "Students Speak" are to help the administration establish benchmarks of performance for services to students, identify priorities for improvement, create action plans for change, chart progress, and instill accountability for make the necessary changes needed to ensure student satisfaction with administrative services. The ideas they will present will be drawn from survey findings and additional input



improvements.

The Students Speak committee will present the results from Students Speak to the President and Provost in January; departments and service areas will receive feedback shortly after. Student committee members will also submit specific recommendations for how to from members of their student organizations.

The challenge of this project is to obtain a high level of student feedback via the survey for which the response from the student has traditionally been poor. One of the ways this is being combated is by offering incentives to survey respondents; there will be a lottery for those who respond to the survey with the chance to win money and prizes. Of course, the most important incentives are having students' voice on multiple issues documented and to contribute toward making a positive difference in the future of IIT. This is a chance to truly let senior administration listen to student concerns and chart a new course for the future of the university; one that is student and customer focused.

President Anderson has asked that George Langlois, the Director for the Center of Research and Service (College of Psychology) and the Leadership Academy, support students in this process. Dr. Langlois is an Industrial/ Organizational psychologist who conducts the annual faculty survey and works with numerous clients outside of IIT. He has many years of experience in survey design and analysis, and his role in this project is to work with the students by providing his expertise and experience. Dr. Langlois is an alumnus of IIT, where he received his PhD in Industrial/Organizational Psychology. He wants to help the university make a change in the student experience at

The Commuter Student Association is hosting a contest for IIT students. Illinois Tech students take home top prizes in ComEd Student Innovation Contest

Commonwealth Edison, most commonly referred to as ComEd, is the largest electric utility company in the state of Illinois. ComEd serves electricity service to the Chicago area and other parts of northern Illinois.

On May 27, 2014, ComEd officially announced the launch of its new Student Innovation Challenge, a contest that challenged students within ComEd's service area to create innovative products or services that would help low-income customers better manage their electricity consumption in order to save money. The solutions had to relate to ComEd's new smart meter technology, digital electric meters that collect energy usage information and sent it to ComEd at regular intervals, allowing customers to attempt to better understand their energy usage.

The contest received entries from over 60 students at 11 different colleges and universities; the top five finalists were selected to present their ideas at a judging and award ceremony for a share of a \$10,000 prize. These top five finalists included three proposals designed by IIT students.

On October 23, on the 57th floor

of the Chase Building downtown, the judging and awards ceremony began with a brief introduction from several ComEd representatives. ComEd's President and CEO, Anne Pramaggiore, led the evening with a few opening remarks. "We knew this competition was no small task, but we were also confident that our local talent in our local universities were a tremendous resource that we need to tap into," said Pramaggiore. "The contest submissions this evening were envisioned by the bright minds of tomorrow's innovators, and they are superb."

Each proposal then presented their ideas to a panel of four judges, including Jason Blumberg, the CEO and Managing Director of Energy Foundry, Emile Cambry, Jr., professor at North Park University's Kellogg School of Management and founder of entrepreneurship incubator BLUE1647, Karen Weigert, Chief Sustainability Officer for the City of Chicago, and Andrea Zopp, CEO and President of Chicago Urban League.

The first proposal to present was by Christina Noonan, a master's degree candidate at Illinois Institute of Technology's Institute of Design. Her idea focuses on modifying customer behavior by using networked energy monitors that allow customers to know how

they are using their energy and how they can change their habits to save money on electricity.

The next proposal was presented by Xinli Lin and Szu Ying Ching, also master's degree students at IIT's Institute of Design. Their proposal is a prepaid electricity program where customers can buy a prepaid card at local retailers, link that value with their ComEd account, then monitor the money and energy that they spend as time goes on, allowing them to keep track of their account balance in real time as well as offering energy-saving tips and rewards for low energy consumption.



His app also offers several features such as goal-setting and publishing achievements to social media.


The next proposal was presented by Peter Graff, Hamsel de la Cruz, and Steve Krejcik, all students at University of Illinois -Chicago. Their team's solution is an object that looks very similar to a household light dimmer that is paired with ComEd's smart meter, allowing customers to have an easy-to-reach visual representative of the electricity usage in their household without needing internet ac-

The final proposal came from Abiodun Iwayemi, another IIT student. His idea is to use custom-manufactured electrons to help customers identify and monitor their energy consumption and present that data on smartphones and tablets.

After over an hour of presentations and time for the judges to deliberate, the final results were in. The fifth place prize went to Noonan from IIT, the fourth place prize went to Graff, de la Cruz, and Krejcik from UIC, the third place prize went to Reichelt from Midwestern University, the second place prize went to Iwayemi from IIT, and the first place prize was awarded to IIT students Lin and Ching for their proposal.

All of the student competitors presented interesting and innovative solutions that can benefit energy customers in the city, and each team shared part of the prize money awarded by ComEd. Illinois Tech is certainly home to great minds of innovation that will be shaping the lives of people in the future.





Food truck flash mob hits main campus

Food trucks are a staple of the Chicago culinary experience, however, it is rare to see them south of The Loop; the density of downtown provides abundant business for such establishments. On Tuesday, October 21, however, three well-known food trucks parked on 33rd Street between SSV and MTCC to sell their goods to hungry IIT students over lunch time.

The three food trucks present showcased a wide spectrum of food. Haute Sausage,

which operates a physical location at 335 South Franklin in Chicago, offered several premium sausage options. A popular choice from Haute Sausage was their 'bacon guacamole', a huge bacon sausage covered with poblano and grilled corn guacamole and cheddar cheese.

Another food truck, La Cocinita, also joined IIT's campus for lunch. La Cocinita serves food with a variety of Latin American influences. The truck offered a few options for build-your-own meals as well as a few specials, including their Caribbean Bowl, which included pork, cabbage, plantains, rice, and black beans.

The third food truck on the scene was that of Bridgeport Pasty, which also operates a physical location about a mile west of IIT at 3142 South Morgan Street. Bridgeport Pasty, a neighborhood favorite for the many IIT students who reside in Bridgeport, offers several varieties of pasty, best described as a small handheld pot pie.

All of the food trucks on campus offered affordably-priced meal solutions to students, but one addition made the situation even more favorable. All three food trucks were giving out limited quantities of free gift cards through Giftie, a relatively new mobile application that allows merchants to release limited quantities of gift cards to users. The application normally comes with an annual subscription rate, but all three food trucks offered introductory \$5 gift cards for their food, adding up to a total of \$15 of free food for students who acted early.

All three food trucks offered some delicious offerings for lunch at a price that couldn't be beat, and the three mobile restaurants surely gained some new fans among the IIT student body.


