OTS attempts to rid MSV of vengeful spirits

MSV students were treated to a spectacle over the last few weeks as the Office of Technology Services stepped up its investigation of poor wireless connectivity in the McCormick Student Village residence halls. Citing a look into what were only vaguely referred to as "environmental factors," and frustrated with the failed efforts of self-proclaimed wireless "gurus" at solving the issues, OTS began looking less at problems with frequencies and signal damping, and more at principles such as ley lines, feng shui, and paranormal activity as contributing factors to the wireless issues at MSV.
