The Alpha Epsilon Chapter of Phi Kappa Sigma is the oldest fraternity chapter on IIT's campus. Since the Chapter was chartered in 1898, it has produced numerous leaders and scholars who have moved on to excel in their fields and in all transactions of life. Among these great men are included members of the House of Representatives, several CEO's, a Secretary of the Air Force and even an Apollo astronaut. Two of our Chapter's alumni actually serve on the executive board of the International Fraternity as the Grand Theta

(supervisor of undergraduate Chapters) and the Grand Alpha (president), along with another alumnus who serves as the Grand Delta (regional supervisor). One of Alpha Epsilon's most notable alumni, Carroll K. Simons, left the Chapter with a generous multi-million dollar endowment, to be used for the betterment of the Chapter, its members and the University itself. This money is used for various reasons, like providing the members with free books and the Carroll K. Simons scholarships, given to active Brothers every year. This past year over one-hundred thousand dollars was given out to members based on both need and merit.

Our Fraternity was founded by Dr. Samuel Wylie Brown Mitchell, along with Charles Hare Hutchinson, Alfred Victor du Pont, Andrew Adams Ripka, James Bayard Hodge, John Thorne Stone, and Duane Williams. These men met together at the University of Pennsylvania, and on August 16th, 1850, they conceived the Phi Kappa Sigma Fraternity.

The Fraternity was then officially founded on October 19th, based on the core values of Trust, Honor, Respect, Knowledge, Wisdom, Responsibility, and Integrity. All active members of Phi Kappa Sigma strive to exhibit these traits in their daily lives.

The Alpha Epsilon Chapter was the first of all of Phi Kappa Sigma Chapters to implement substance-free housing, a move later adopted by the International Fraternity. This was done to preserve the integrity of both our house and our members. By upholding this policy, we continue



to strive toward our fraternal values and principles unhindered by the distractions and risks of alcohol and substance abuse. Because of this, our Chapter has been able to maintain a stable and productive position within the University and International Praternity.

One event that many Alpha Epsilon alums and current members are especially proud of is the Chapter's semiannual alumni event, Smoker. Alpha Epsilon's alumni Smoker is the second oldest tradition on the campus of IIT, second only to graduation. It serves to allow alumni

who have since graduated from IIT to return to the Chapter and see how the current undergraduate Chapter is doing. It also allows for the current members of the Chapter to hear how life in the Chapter and on the University was in years past, and how things have changed.

The Brothers of Alpha Epsilon Chapter are devoted to helping the community they are involved in, and do numerous philanthropy events throughout to help in any way they can. Every year, the Chapter volunteers for Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's Light the Night Event. This event raises awareness of the two diseases and serves as a fundraiser for the society so that cancer research can be continued. This year, the Brothers of Alpha Epsilon Chapter worked hard on the planning of the Chapter's annual SausageFest, in tandem with the Office of Service Learning's Big Event, to benefit education projects for children in Haiti.

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The Alpha Phi chapter of Pi Kappa Phi here at IIT is built on three principles; C.L.A.S.S, diversity, and philanthropy. The brothers of Pi Kappa Phi define themselves as men of C.L.A.S.S., an acronym standing for: character, leadership, academics, sportsmanship, and service. These five objectives are what make PI Kappa Phi an elite fraternity. All members of Pi Kappa Phi strive to be men of C.L.A.S.S at all times.
