If you still have an outstanding bill, please get in touch with the Bursar's Office as soon as possible. If you do not clear your balance, you will not receive your diploma on graduation day!

The purpose of exit counseling is to provide you with important information regarding debt-management strategies and loan repayment, including deferments, grace periods, loan consolidation, and loan default.

The Office of Financial Aid will be conducting a live exit counseling session that will satisfy this federal requirement. The date and time is as follows:

Thursday, April 21, 2011 in Perlstein Hall, Room 131 (Auditorium) from 1:00PM-1:45PM.

Please make sure to bring the name, address and phone number of two references to the exit counseling session. Please note that the references you provide cannot reside at the same address where you reside.

If you are unable to this live session, you must complete your exit counseling online prior to graduation. You may complete your exit counseling online at www. mappingyourfuture.org/OSLC/.

Please note that if you received both Federal Stafford Loans and Federal Graduate PLUS Loans, you will need to complete an exit counseling session for both loans. In addition for all students with any federal loans, you will not be able to receive your transcript or register for any future classes at IIT until you successfully complete exit counseling.

Students speak out about switch to NCAA

Do you think the Scarlet Hawks should remain in the NAIA or move to the NCAA Division 3?

Over the past two weeks, TechNews has been collecting the opinions of students on the potential transition of the university's varsity athletics programs from the NAIA to the NCAA DIII. While an official poll was available on the TechNews website for a quick vote, we also tried to get statements from as many students as possible. What follows is a selection of comments from a number of athletes who responded:

"I feel the move would put more stress on the athletes rather than moving our program to another level. There are advantages with the type of talent we would be playing against, but there are other factors to consider, like scholarships. The scholarships that we have help many athletes, and without them, many of us wouldn't be fortunate enough to attend school and play at IIT."

Roma Mirutenko (SO - Hawthorn Woods, IL.) - Volleyball

"IIT needs to show the student athletes first and foremost that it can support this move and not endanger our level of play, because I certainly would not be able to attend IIT on my academic scholarships alone."

Eric Grunden (SO - Columbus, OH.) - Men's Swimming and Diving "If IIT had been an NCAA DIII school when I was applying to universities, I would never have considered the school to be a valid option. I enjoy beating talented individuals that get more sleep than I do!"

Zach Gates (SO - Columbus, IN.) - Men's Cross Country

"I think it would be a bad idea to make the transition into the NCAA DIII. The number of athletes interested in studying at a tech school, as well as competing in collegiate-level sports are few. Taking away the possibility of receiving scholarships will make it even harder for coaches to find talented athletes willing to come to this school (which is already expensive). It will diminish the athletic quality of the sports teams. What good is it to have a lot of bad teams?

Diana Otero (SO - Westfield, IN.) - Women's Soccer

"I think transitioning into the NCAA DIII is a bad choice and will hurt our school and athletics program. Our teams will suffer because of the loss of scholarship opportunity, not to mention the four years away from post season competition if we make the switch. It would be nice to see our school make a choice for the benefit of the students, and listen to our opinions before they make a decision."

Michael Keane (SO - Edmonds, WA.) - Men's Swimming and Diving

"In what way do competing athletes connect on an intellectual basis? Athletes do not compete to make friends and make connections with people of a similar intellectual level; they do so through a natural desire to win."

Allan Coates (SR - Bangor, Northern Ireland) - Men's Soccer

"The potential of getting an athletic scholarship is the only incentive for athletes to come to our school. Once we can develop strong programs in each sport, it may be safer to switch over to DIII."

Lauren Wissman (JR - Kettering, OH.) - Women's Soccer

"I do not like the idea. Scholarship money is what attracts good athletes. If we cannot give out scholarships, we will not maintain the current quality of the already dwindling athletic program."

Jeffrey Reilly (SO - Elyria, OH) - Men's Swimming and Diving

"If we were to transfer to the NCAA DIII there would be no opportunity to excel. With the university's very high tuition rates and no opportunity to gain athletic scholarships, recruiting international students like myself, and talented athletes in the area, would be extremely difficult.

Jon Celestino (SO - London, Canada) - Baseball

"The idea of switching to Division III is ridiculous. Academics and athletics have never intersected on the field. I have never stepped on a field thinking, "We are better and will beat this team simply because we are academically smarter." DIII is a lower standard of athletic competition."

"Is everything ok?"

"Not exactly....He has been a smoker since he was a teenager, and he needs a lung transplant to survive, but they won't put him on the list for the transplant unless he quits smoking for a minimum of four months. He will die without the transplant, and what if he doesn't make it the full four months?"

"I'm really sorry to hear that. They probably have that rule to make sure that the lung won't go to waste, because if the patient continues smoking after the surgery, he or she will end up needing another transplant. If they give the lung to a nonsmoker, the individual will be less likely to need another transplant in the future."

"True, but what about patients like my grandpa who started smoking a long time

ago? When he started smoking all the advertisements said that smoking was good for you, and that even doctors smoked. Now research has come out saying that it is in fact bad for you, but by the time that information was available he was already addicted."

"That is a really good point. But quitting smoking would be very good for his health.

It will be hard, but it will have a lot of

positive effects. In fact, quitting smoking will make him more likely to live through the surgery. Smoking decreases circulation and increases an individual's likelihood of getting heart disease, which can make it risky for them to go through the surgery and more difficult for them to recover. plants, can be really risky, and the surgeon wants to make sure that the patient has the best possible chance of survival."

"Really? I didn't know that. How come they don't have this rule in other situations, then? For example, why doesn't an overweight person have to lose weight in order to get a heart transplant?"

"Hmmmm.... I don't know, but those are definitely good questions. It is a really interesting issue."

Idea Shop positive in theory, but still a work in progress

The Idea Shop is a space that opened last fall in a corner of ITT's campus. It is home to projectors named after Star Wars characters – Yoda, Chewie, R2D2, and others. It was opened using only money the school already had, a 3-year free lease of the space, and donated items that may have included the 3-D printers and laser cutters (according to an earlier TechNews article by Elnaz Moshfeghian). Just as Star Wars was about technologies too far away in time for us, this area is for innovation for the future. It was without a doubt worth the small price tag, but can be an even greater asset with a few minor changes.

The Idea Shop is an invaluable resource for IPROs. IPRO 362, M.O.R.E. (Mobile Operating Room Engineering), is a prime example of this. I have witnessed this course use many features, such as the wide space on the east side of the shop to hold the tent and wall designs, the laser cutter to make numerous prototypes, cameras and tripods for documentation, the projector screens to present research or competition material, and even the professors that are often in the Idea shop – their feedback and enthusiasm are as helpful as any other feature.

The use of prototypes is essential for design. Linda Pulik, the Institute of Design professor in charge of M.O.R.E., has stressed this many times in her course. To have and hold a prototype is to understand a product. One can see design flaws and generate ideas. Without the Idea Shop, this IPRO would not have had the necessities to advance the idea with professional quality. Students can now make precise prototypes with the materials and machines in the Idea Shop. Prototypes no longer have to be

only of the final product; one can be made for every step of the way.

However, it could be expanded even further, which is no doubt in the plans of the tireless staff, who often stay much later than their scheduled hours to help students. 24-hour access to certain areas would be amazingly helpful, as many IPRO students know that working irregular and long hours is normal, especially when prototyping a physical product. This could even create a new student position by hiring someone to scan IDs and watch over the area. More students in general should have more access to this location. Entrepreneurial students would value this, but many are not certain if they can use the shop and whether or not it is free. It's free for all students, and this should be publicized. Many would benefit from the resources, not just IPRO students.

These last few are minute but highly important details – there must be new printers and vending machines. The vending machines do not accept TechCash (who carries cash all the time?) and sometimes only accept change, but food is necessary for working hard and, you know, life. However, this is not controlled by ITT.

Further, there are no printers that use student printing accounts in the Idea Shop, which has no doubt hindered many people who needed to print something quickly during a class or presentation. Small details can escape planning, but not the student or faculty eye.

The Idea Shop was well worth its implementation, as it has easily changed many things about the IPRO process. The shop has already proven its worth – but could it open its doors even wider? Could it offer even more things that the Institute of Design offers, or change the way entrepreneurs could work? Stay tuned!

Student survey reveals pros, cons of on-campus technology

The seventh annual IIT Student Technology Survey has come to a close. In comparison to 2010, this year's results show a fairly consistent student opinion on technology services. However, some aspects exhibit a mixed response.

Just over 1,270 Main Campus, Stuart School of Business, Chicago Kent and Rice Campus students took the 2011 survey, which is a 15% response rate. This response was slightly lower than last year, but it was sent to a larger student group and reflects what students think of technology at IIT.

The percentages reported here are based on the five-point scale that was offered in response to many of the questions on the survey (ranging from 'strongly disagree' to 'strongly agree'). The 'strongly agree' and 'agree' responses were tallied as an indication of student satisfaction with various services. 'Neutral' replies were not omitted from the overall pool of responses, but they were not counted toward student satisfaction or student dissatisfaction, thereby lowering the overall affirmative or dissenting response.

Computer Labs and Printing Services

As illustrated by the OTS Computer Labs and Printing Services graph, the hours of the OTS computer labs were met with greater approval, with 65% of students stating their satisfaction.

This is largely due to the OTS Night Owl Lab moving into Galvin Library where students have an all-night dedicated study space that meets their technology needs.

This year, students expressed a slightly lower level of satisfaction with the number of PCs and software available in OTS computer labs. 72% of students are satisfied with the number of computers available. Additionally, 75% of students expressed that the software in the computer labs met their academic needs.

Student satisfaction with the quality of printing in the computer labs was met with a slight increase from last year, with 69% of students expressing satisfaction. Given that available software and printing services continue to be the main reasons that students are drawn to the computer labs, this is an important improvement in satisfaction to note.

Computer Labs and Printing Services Enhancements

The summer before the 2010-2011 school year, OTS enhanced some of the software available in the computer labs in response last year's Student Technology Survey. The Adobe suite software in all of the labs has been upgraded to Adobe CS4. Additionally, Mathematica is now available in all OTS labs on campus, and students can download a free version to their personal computer (for more information, visit the OTS Downloads channel under the Training and Support tab in myIIT).

Beginning summer 2011, OTS and Housing & Residential Services will be adding Remote Printing Stations in SSV and Gunsaulus Hall that will be available 24/7 for residents with access to these buildings. Additionally, eight new computers will be installed in the MSV lounge area for use by residents. With the addition of these resources, and due to limited

use and access to the OTS computer lab in the basement of MSV East, the lab will be closed beginning summer 2011. However, the remote printing station in MSV, near the vending area on the main level, will remain available.

Blackboard

Out of the students who have used Blackboard, 72% were satisfied with the system, which is the same satisfaction rate as last year. 72% of students would like to see Blackboard utilized for more courses, down from 75% in 2010.

Blackboard Enhancements

For the 2010-2011 school year, OTS and the Offices of the Provost and Undergraduate Studies, introduced Blackboard Mobile Learn, providing IIT classes with a Blackboard mobile web page. This application brings the Blackboard teaching and learning tools to a mobile device, giving students and faculty access to their courses wherever they are. Students can view their class announcements and grades and use collaborative tools such as blogs, journals and discussion boards. Blackboard's unique two-way teaching and learning system also allows faculty to view and update their course content remotely.

Email

Regarding email storage space, OTS has seen a steady decline in satisfaction over the past two years. This year, 41% of students indicated satisfaction with the current IIT email storage capacity, down from 43% in 2010.

OTS is taking this and past years' feedback regarding email capacity into consideration for modifications that will be implemented during summer 2011 as detailed below.

Email Enhancements

OTS, in collaboration with the Student Government Association is pleased to announce that IIT student email will be moving to the Gmail platform. This will allow for increased utility and compatibility with other Google services as well as significantly increased email storage space. This upgrade will take place during summer 2011 and the new platform will be available through the myIIT portal by fall 2011.

IIT Network

Student responses appear to have declined across the board with regard to the IIT wireless network. Student satisfaction with the reliability of the IIT network on Main Campus decreased from last year, with a 39% satisfaction rate.

Similarly, satisfaction with the speed of the wireless network has declined, with 40% satisfied.

Student satisfaction with regard to the IIT's Main Campus wireless network coverage decreased to 43% expressing satisfaction. Oncampus resident satisfaction with the IIT network is slightly lower than last year, with 36% indicating that the network in their residence is sufficient for their needs.

IIT Network Enhancements

During summer 2010, OTS upgraded certain areas within Main Campus from Wireless G to Wireless N to offer improved wireless service to the IIT community. OTS recognizes that the upgrade has not been a smooth transition and will ensure that wireless service is sufficient in the Residence Halls before further expanding to additional academic buildings and the rest of the campus.

Active Minds helps to eliminate mental health stigmas

"That keg-stand was the craziest thing I've done on a Saturday night ever! I partied with the most bizarre dudes."

How often do you hear these words: "crazy," "bizarre," "schizophrenic" or "insane"? Most people hear at least one of these words on a daily basis. However, how many of us pause to think about the impact that such words might have. How can we know if they negatively impact anybody?

Some words are taboo - you rarely hear them uttered, but when you do hear them, the world seems to pause for a moment. For example, the "N-word" is a word that as a society we have forbidden. The "N-word" is not used in everyday language, because it is a derogatory word, which promotes prejudice against people based on the color of their skin. The United States Constitution prohibits prejudice and discrimination. Thus, the decision to eliminate certain ethnic slurs is to promote a higher quality social atmosphere for all residents. We want a high quality social atmosphere without prejudice and discrimination. We want respect. We expect to be included and not judged. We would not accept Nazi Germany and their discrimination against Jewish people.

Our united stance is to prohibit discrimination and protect vulnerable populations. For example, we do not tolerate discrimination against people based on sexual orientation in our society. We protect them under the U.S. Constitution and legally punish violations of these laws. To that end, people who commit hate crimes face intense legal penalties.

As a society, we decided to protect vulnerable populations. One such group includes people with physical disabilities. Until recently, the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) was

not equipped with elevators or seating areas to allow people in wheelchairs access to train travel. This meant that people in wheelchairs could not use the train system. Social psychologists refer to this as structural discrimination, which means that the buildings or facilities discriminate against a minority group and are the barrier to the person. However, now that elevators exist in CTA facilities, a person in a wheelchair can use the train system to go to the airport, go to the grocery store, go to work, and visit friends. Just like you and me, they are now given access to travel inexpensively. Believe it or not, this opens many doors to new opportunities previously not afforded to people who use wheelchairs. They are now able to accomplish their daily travel activities more autonomously. This is tremendously empowering for people with disabilities.

Another vulnerable population is comprised of those with bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, severe anxiety, and/or severe depression. Did you quiver a bit? That's because of the stigma attached to those words. The reality is that mental illness is not a rare phenomenon.

In fact, 25% of all Americans will experience a mental disorder in their lifetime. Recent research suggests that about 50% of college students have qualified as depressed at some time during their college experience. Research also demonstrates that about 40-50% of people who need help for a mental disorder never seek treatment. Such individuals continue to struggle with problems like depression, anxiety, hallucinations, phobias, and/or nightmares. Even test anxiety can be very debilitating and prevent a person from academic success.

However, there are mental health resources that can help a person overcome these problems. Almost all mental health disorders are treatable, despite the fact that people do not seek treatment. Unfortunately, a large social

problem that prevents seeking mental health care is the stigma of mental illness. We do not want to be called crazy! That is the stigma of mental health care; you are "crazy" if you visit a psychologist, psychiatrist, or other mental health care professional.

For many people, the stigma of mental illness is the biggest reason to avoid treatment. They may think, "If I do not go to see a mental health care professional, then I can't get labeled as 'crazy." Phew, you've escaped the stigma of mental illness. Now, how are you planning to deal with the problems you're experiencing without support or outside resources? People who use mental health services will tell you that once they overcame the stigma and got treatment, they were able to feel much better. They were able to recover. They were able to perform better academically. They succeeded after they worked with a mental health care professional for the duration of treatment. Some people could finally focus on their life goals and future - they are in recovery from their mental illness.

A unique human trait is language. Just as we do not choose to use the "N-Word," we also have the ability to choose the words we do use. Many people with mental illnesses very much dislike hearing the words "crazy," "bizarre," "schizophrenic," "insanity." They feel judged and stigmatized, even despite their use of treatments to try to cure their mental illness. As college-educated adults who want to drive innovation and progress in our world, we must be cognizant of our choices. We must watch our conversations and choose to use words that do not offend people. Instead of saying "crazy" or "insane," use "wild." If you do not know what "bizarre" or "schizophrenic" means, look them up for you own personal edification.

"Changing the Conversation about Mental Health" is the mission of Active Minds. This

student organization's goal is to highlight the fact that all people have mental health and that we all must remain mentally healthy. It's a daily choice to ensure that you have great mental health. Further, we seek to raise awareness of mental health issues in our academic community. That is the reason that the College of Psychology, Active Minds, the Association of American Rehabilitation Counselors and Psi Alpha have all partnered together to bring a very powerful and free theater event to the Herman Hall Auditorium on Monday, April 25, 2011 at 6:00 p.m. This \$4000 production is a professional theater show that runs 90 minutes long and will introduce attendees to mental health issues and explain why we must fight the stigma of mental illness and the problems of prejudice and discrimination. Some psychology instructors are offering extra credit for attending the event. Ask your instructor if they are providing extra credit. The theater holds over 800 attendees. All students, faculty, and staff are welcome to attend for free. Come expand your mind and learn about mental health. You never know who in your life might need a supportive and caring friend. This can provide you with the insight to be sensitive and helpful to their needs.
