

TEDxIIT inspires students to 'gain momentum'

Victor Hugo once said "There is one thing more powerful than all the armies in the world. It's an idea whose time has come." That's what TED conferences are about: ideas that stretch the dimensions of the human mind. Each TED speaker has about 20 minutes to present an 'idea worth spreading'. Speakers on the TED website have ranged from Google founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin, to a young man living in a remote village in Malawi who—at the age of 14— built a windmill for his family, using an old textbook.

A group of passionate IIT undergraduates are organizing a TEDx

conference at IIT's Downtown Campus in March. TEDx events are independently organized TED events – students have the license from TED to use their logo and access their organizational material, and TEDx events are structured in a similar way to actual TED conferences – except, of course, for their independent organization. Putting together a successful TEDx event is a deeply fulfilling experience, simply because of the exposure received to some phenomenal brains and the larger-than-life feeling that always accompanies a TED conference.

The idea for TEDxIIT was inspired by the organizing students' motivation to give the members of the IIT community—students, faculty, and alumni—a place to share their

ideas with each other and the world. The inaugural TEDxIIT was organized around the theme "Break Through," and building up on that, organizers are looking to revolve the next conference around the theme of "Gaining Momentum." Speakers at last year's events included Michael Hettwer, photographer with National Geographic and Leonard Reiffel, a widely recognized scientist, educator, and inventor/entrepreneur.

Preparations for TEDxIIT 2012 are currently underway! March may seem far away, but an event of this scale needs a lot of work behind it. If you are interested in helping out, the TEDx team is looking for committee members. Weekly meetings will occur every Friday between 2 and 3 p.m. in the MTCC. So,

regardless of how much or however little you feel you can contribute, feel free to take part in this endeavor. You will not be obligated to attend every meeting. The organizers just want you to help out in your own ways with whatever time you feel you can commit to the event.

Becoming a member on the TED.com website is free, and gives access to hundreds of complete TED Talks. Mobile Apps are also available.

Engineers work to redesign plastic bottles

IIT's Armour College of Engineering kicked off the Armour Distinguished Alumni Lecture Series on Tuesday, September 13, when they welcomed Gautam Mahajan (MS MEC '70), an expert in strategy, general management, and globalization, who presented the lecture "Back to Engineering Basics: The plastic soft drink bottle."

A long time ago, probably around the time our parents went to college, IBM had computers where you had to punch holes in 7x4 cards with digital information in holes with predefined positions. Now an obsolete recording medium, they were widely used earlier for input, data processing and storage. Those who developed them may not even have imagined the progress that has been made today.

What do we learn from this? That things now considered simple were complex once upon a time. To render them simple we had to resort to the fundamentals periodically. Mr. Mahajan frequently touched upon some secrets of his success - it's important to be imaginative, it's important to have a vision, and to take risks. Business will always have a say in engineering, and entrepreneurial changes will always be rejected initially if they aren't exactly sticking to the formula of raking in the profits.

Inhis presentation, Mahajan discussed how returning to engineering basics helped to develop a new petaloid base, which is found on the bottom of today's soft drink bottles. He also discussed the business component of developing new products, including the introduction of the half-liter PET bottle (since the challenge was to replace the 2 liter bottle that expanded and exploded after prolonged exposure to sunlight). Later challenges included ensuring

the bottle would hold pressure, not lose gas, not contribute to the taste/flavor of the liquid inside, not expand/shrink, not be carcinogenic, wouldn't contribute to leaching in the soil, be economical and recyclable.

Mahajan currently serves as president of Inter-Link Services Pvt. Ltd., an international consulting firm that helps companies become established in Asia and India, specifically regarding entry strategy, technology transfer, marketing, business development, and operations. For 17 years Mahajan ran the plastics businesses of Continental Group, which was the world's largest packaging company. In addition to his master's degree in mechanics and Ph.D. coursework at IIT, Mahajan received an MBA from Suffolk University as well as fellowships from Harvard Business School and IIT. He was the recipient of the 2000 IIT Distinguished Alumni Award. He holds 18 US patents.





Taqueria San Jose: authentic Mexican cuisine

It's well known that for every good Mexican restaurant, there are dozens of bad ones. Luckily one of the good ones, Taqueria San Jose, is mere minutes away from IIT. Located just north of the intersection of 33rd and Halsted at 3253 S Halsted, Taqueria San Jose is easily reached by taking the 35 bus west to Halsted, then walking north to the restaurant. The restaurant is open from 11 AM to 11 PM on weekdays and until 2 AM on weekends.

Taqueria San Jose serves up authentic Mexican affair that is both delicious and affordable. One of the best parts of the restaurant is that, unlike many late-night Mexican places, Taqueria San Jose's food is not very greasy. The menu is quite extensive, offering standard Mexican such as burritos and nachos, and more unique dishes like steak torta, tostadas, and cebollitas. I would like to personally recommend the queso with chorizo and the carne asada suizo burrito. The cheese used in the queso pairs really well with the spicy chorizo, and the carne asada steak in the burrito is seasoned really well.

Before you order the restaurant gives you chips and salsa and some tubs of pickled vegetables to much on. Make sure to try the pickled vegetables – they are to die for! Also ask if you could have some guacamole with the chips. They make their guacamole fresh every day, and it is excellent. As good as all this food is, it's surprisingly affordable. You'll find it difficult



to have to pay more than \$10 for your meal.

The physical restaurant itself is an interesting experience. The restaurant is clean, but always has an interesting crowd in it. Usually a mix of Mexicans from around the area, college students, and sports fans coming rolling in from White Sox games; the restaurant is a great place to people watch. One thing to note about the restaurant, though, is that there is a \$15 minimum to be able to use a credit card.

Overall, Taqueria San Jose is a great choice when it comes to Mexican food. Whether you're looking for a good dinner, a quick lunch, or a late night burrito run, this restaurant is perfect. The restaurant is available for dine in and take out, and can be reached at (312)225-7386.

St. Vincent's genre-eclectic album stirs surprise sounds

Strange Mercy is the latest effort by St. Vincent, an artist known for her combination of dark themes and lyrical matter, arrangements that swing between wildly eclectic and pleasantly poppy, and her captivating live performances. More than any of her previous efforts, it's deeply personal, incorporates a variety of sounds, and delves into very dark territory. Fortunately for listeners, these factors combine to form a deeply engrossing album that does not lose its luster after even several play-throughs.

St. Vincent is the brainchild of Annie Clark, who first gained notoriety as a member of

the Polyphonic Spree and as one of the backing performers for Sufjan Stevens on his tours.

During this latter endeavor, Clark released her first EP as St. Vincent, titled Paris is Burning. From this came her first album, Marry Me, which received critical success; following this was her sophomore effort, Actor, which gave her some commercial success, as well. After these releases, there followed a very dark period in Clark's life, details of which are scarce. Still, she set about writing music furiously as a form of therapy or catharsis, and the product of this was Strange Mercy - a very personal effort with sometimes jarring lyrics and instrumentation.

The album is full of contrasts and sharp turns. From the sunny pop (but dark lyrics) of the first single, Cruel, the material

immediately shifts to grungy, wall-of-sound elements in Cheerleader. The last note of that track morphs into the opening sound of Surgeon, with its mix of bombastic, sweeping orchestral sounds and funk-influenced guitar work, which then jumps into the seemingly indie-rock Northern Lights - which sheds any semblance of pop sensibility in its big, noise-laden finish. Yeah, that happens in four tracks

Lyrically, the album offers glimpses into Clark's personal battles of the past year. One needs only to listen to the title track's bridge, "If I ever meet that / dirty policeman / who roughed you up / No, I... I don't know what," all sung with cool conviction, to see just how much the album draws from Clark's own experiences.

My own first experience of St. Vincent was when she toured with the Arcade Fire; compared to the huge ensemble that band played with, the sight of Annie Clark on stage, alone, with an assortment of instruments and effects and loop-back pedals, was a strange but exciting one. Since that moment, years ago, I have been continually pleasantly surprised by St. Vincent, and Strange Mercy is no exception. With all these varied influences, and the rapidity with which they change, Strange Mercy can be a challenging listen. Fortunately, it's also a rewarding one, at once aloof and personal, mysterious and relatable, and intriguing to listen to throughout. For an artist whose sound has been compared to David Bowie and Kate Bush, it's a fantastic effort and well worth a listen.



Going into the game with a 1-4 record, the Scarlet Hawks definitely needed to up their game, and the team didn't disappoint, as straight from the kick off the Hawks attacked the visiting side. It wasn't long until a cross found its way to freshman Veronica Torres' foot, with the winger calmly placing the ball past the visiting keeper. Just seven minutes later the Hawks doubled their lead, when junior Diana Otero received a ball on the edge of the area before she rifled a shot into the bottom right corner of the net. For the remainder of the half the home side continued to create chances, with the team recording a total of 11 shots for the half.

The second period of play started off just as well as the first, with IIT holding onto the ball and using the wings well. Senior Kay Durbin had a fantastic game on the right wing and just three minutes into the second half she slotted the ball through to Diana Otero, who crossed the ball to junior Lauren Capuano, who placed the ball into the near post for the Hawks' third goal. Despite the team creating a number of other chances the score remained 3-0 at the final whistle.

The Hawks travel to Indiana on Wednesday to face Taylor College, then the team returns to Stuart Field to play their homecoming game (Kick-off at 2 p.m.). The team greatly appreciated the support this past weekend, so on Saturday afternoon, take a break and get down to the game to cheer the Hawks on.



Cross country finishes first in Kenosha


