Tricia Berryhill will advise organizations with names starting with "#" through "G," as well as lead the following programs: Orientation, Parent Programs, the New Student Organization Process, Student Organization Recognition, and general programming for the Office of Campus Life.

Meanwhile, Alex Garrett will advise Union Board (UB), as well as student organizations with names starting with "N" through "Z." Alex will also lead the following programs: First Year Experience, Leadership Development, Outreach, and Women's Programming.

Ryan Miller will primarily advise the Student Government Association (SGA), as well as student organizations with names starting with "H" through "M." Finally, in response to Student Speak Survey feedback, Campus Life has dedicated a full-time staff member, Cathy Fuller, to student organization finance.

Student organizations that take advantage of all of these new resources will be recognized in increasing degrees of "Level III," "Level II," and "Level I" accordingly. In order to access all of the resources offered by Campus Life, student organizations must reach the "Level I" tier, which allows them to apply for office space in the Campus Life suite, priority space at the Student Involvement Fair, utilize the ticket sales system, apply for annual funding via a main account from Student Affairs, and many other benefits

In the spring 2012 semester, Campus Life is looking forward to working more effectively with student organizations and increasing the vibrancy of the IIT campus. With Stephen Colbert Super PAC." The solid waste then hit the fan. Colbert campaigned daily, and even held a rally on January 20th with Hermain Cain, asking voters to vote for him by voting for Cain, who had already dropped out of the race.

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FAFSA preparation tips

Happy New Year! Beginning a new year means it's time to begin a new FAFSA. Beginning January 1, 2012, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for the 2012-13 academic year became available for completion. The Office of Financial Aid encourages all students interested in receiving federal aid to fill out the FAFSA early.

Some forms of federal and state aid are limited, so all students are encouraged to apply by March 1. Even if you or your parents' tax return is not completed for 2011, families can use an estimate of their 2011 income to complete the FAFSA. Corrections to the FAFSA can be made later once taxes are filed. Complete the FAFSA early to avoid stress when you are busy with classes this spring!

Please note that some families who have filed their taxes may also be eligible for the IRS data pull on the FAFSA. This allows eligible families to pull their tax information directly from the IRS to the FAFSA instead of manually entered each item. This tool will be available beginning February 1 from the or finaid@iit.edu. IRS.

Just like in 2011-12, selected students must complete verification before their financial aid package is finalized for the upcoming year. Verification is a process that compares the FAFSA to tax information and is required for selected students; federal aid cannot be disbursed to the student's account until this process is complete.

For the upcoming academic year, the Office of Financial Aid will not finalize the award of federal aid to selected students until verification is complete. This means you will not have a finalized financial aid package until the requested documentation is submitted and reviewed by the financial aid office.

Students are encouraged to work with their parents to fulfill requirements for this process and be in touch with the financial aid office so you can be provided with your financial aid award as quickly and smoothly as possible. The Office of Financial Aid's goal is to avoid changes to students' financial aid packages once classes have started in fall 2012.

another major announcement. After a great deal of feedback from commuter students regarding their current lounge, the commuter lounge will be moved to the Bog.



Network infrastructure changes improve cellular service @ IIT

AT&T recently announced the deployment of two new cell towers in the South Loop to expand mobile broadband coverage across the area, including the IIT campus. The new cell towers, which were announced on January 18, are based on the 3rd Generation Partnership Project of wireless technologies which include GSM and UMTS - the most widely used cell network technologies in the world. By utilizing GSM technology as opposed

to Verizon and Sprint's CDMA technology, these cell towers are able to deliver the fastest 3G speeds available and allow cell phone users to utilize simultaneous voice and data capabilities. These towers represent AT&T's continuing investment in local wireless networks and the Chicagoland area.

With every week the world is getting increasingly wireless, and these network infrastructure improvements will allow IIT students and Chicago residents to continue to thrive in this world. These improvements

to AT&T's mobile broadband network further boost AT&T's footprint in the South Loop, which is quite large due to the recent activation of AT&T's 4G LTE network. This LTE network represents the most advanced in cell technologies, and delivers speeds up to 10x faster than existing 3G networks.

Chicago represents one of the most competitive markets for cell phone companies, and these enhancements step up AT&T's game in this area. With Verizon's 4G LTE network already completely deployed in the area,

T-Mobile's HSPA+ enhancements coming online, and Sprint's WiMax being available for years, these enhancements bring AT&T to the top of the pack and ensures that consumers are getting the best possible service.

Cold War period piece paints picture of espionage

I recently went to see Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy, since I've had this movie on my "Most-Anticipated" List for quite some time. I loved the movie.

Though it was a little slow in the build-up, it nonetheless brought the viewer back to the main plot and pulled you in. I give major commendation on Gary Oldman's performance as well as the auxiliary performances of a few other notable stars; notably Colin Firth, Cirian Hinds, John Hurt, Tom Hardy, and Mark Strong.

To give a brief synopsis of the plot, it is the 1970s at the height of the Cold War. Britain's top intelligence agency MI6, sees the retirement of two top spymasters; Control (John Hurt), and Smiley (Gary Oldman). At the same time however, MI6 has been infiltrated by an unknown Soviet Agent, and when one of their top agents (Mark Strong) is killed on assignment, the suspicions rise.

Smiley is eventually called in to investigate Control's claim of a double agent within British intelligence due to Smiley's separation with the current internal politics, causing him to use some of MI6's own agents, as well as his wit and intuition, to ascertain the who the spy is before it's too late.

Overall, I found the individual performances of the actors contributed greatly to the suspicion and suspense of the movie. Plus the context of the West vs. Communism, the cutthroat business that is international espionage, and the backdrop of the 1970s definitely played well to the movie's plotline and characters. In short, an excellent spy thriller that I highly recommend if you enjoy spy games and international espionage. Overall I'd give this movie 4.5 out of 5 due to a slow start-up, which is greatly outdone by the twists and turns of the movie, leaving you contemplating the identity of the double agent until the last minute.



'Simple Song' complicates Shins' new album



After a five year hiatus, indie rock supergroup The Shins is back in action. The boys from Albuquerque were originally received with both critical and commercial success, with their last album "Wincing the Night Away", placing in both the US and UK charts. The Shins new album, "Port of Morrow", is set to drop in March, and to give anxious fans a teaser, they released





Swimming and diving shine at UofC Invitational

The Scarlet Hawks swimming and diving teams wasted no time getting the new semester started in terms of competition. Both the men's and women's teams have competed twice this semester, most recently at the University of Chicago Invitational. The meet consisted of three sessions spread out over two days, making for an exhausting, yet worthwhile, weekend for the teams.

The men's team finished 5th of 10 teams over the weekend, while the women's team took 8th of 11, with excellent performances across the board for both teams.

The women's 200 yard freestyle relay team finished 9th overall with a season best of 1:49:49 (seniors Melanie Koto, Andrea Zuniga, Morgan Curran and sophomore Abigail Mage), while the men's teams took 5th with a 1:29.18 (junior Eric Grunden, senior Dylan Maus, sophomore Michael Bodzay and senior

Max Ramminger) and 12th (137.60, freshman Igor Gryniv, seniors Michael Lutgendorf, Ryan Tapak and freshman Dan Sommerfeld). In the 500 yard freestyle, Maze finished 17th with a 5:56.02, while sophomore Felipe Bergh finished 6th for the men's team (5.05.04) and Tapak finished 12th (531.70), Junior Aimee Dewante took 11th overall for the women's team in the 200 yard IM, while Grunden nabbed 2nd for the men's team (2,0032) and Bodzay finished 8th (2.05.07). Sommerfeld and Gryniv finished 17th and 18th, with firal times of 2:18.06 and 2:25.99 respectively.

In the women's 50 yard freestyle, Koto placed 14th with a 26.86, and Ramminger impressed with a 1st place finish for team (2135). Sophomore Yoni Pruzarsky took 9th overall in the event with a 22.41 and junior Matthew Rosenfeld placed 16th (23.06). In the 400 yard medley relay, the women's team of Zuniga, Curran, Dewante and Koto finished 10th (4:27.72), while the meris team of Rosenfeld, Grunden, Bodzay and Ramminger took 4th (337.64) and the team of Bergh, freshman Billy Bafia, Gryniv and senior Tomasz Chojnacki finished 11th Ian McNair finished 5th with a final score of 427.70, senior Jeff Reilly finished 11th with a 304.85, and freshman Dane Christianson finished 14th with a score of 239.00.

In the 400 yard IM, Curran finished 14th with a final time of 5:13.38, while Bergh placed 9th for the men's team with a 431.71. Bodzay took 5th in the men's 100 yard butterfly with a 54,07, and in the woman's 200 yard freestyle, Koto placed 11th (2:05.14) while Chojracki finished 14th for the men's team (1:54.69).

In the 100 vard breaststroke, senior Julia Duarte placed 10th for the women's team with a 1:11.96, while on the men's side Ramminger and Grunden raced to the finish, placing 2nd and 3rd (1:00.23 and 1:00.24 respectively). Baffa finished 8th in the event (1.04.16), while freshmen Matt O'Rourke and Sommerfeld raced to a tie for 13th (1:07.33).

In the 100 vard backstroke, Zuniza finished 19th for the woman's team (19823) while Rosenfeld finished 8th for the men's team (56.06) and Bodzay finished 13th (57.10). The men's 800 yard freestyle relay team of Grunden, Bergh, Chojracki and Bodzay finished 6th with

Tapak and Baffa finished 11th (820.86). Tapak also finished 12th in the mile with a 20:03.63.

For the men's 3 meter diving the divers placed consistently, with McNair finishing 5th (45930) and Reilly in 11th with a score of 254,90. In the 200 vard backstroke, Rosenfeld. finished 13th with a 2.05.87, while Ramminger finished 3rd in the men's 100 yard freestyle (4737), Pruzansky finished 17th (50.73) and O'Rourke finished 18th (5092).

Duarte finished 10th in the women's 200 yard breaststroke with a time of 2:39.05 while Curran took 17th (2:48.25), and Grunden placed 3rd in the men's event with a 2:1454. Bergh took 10th overall, with 2.21.82, Bafia 12th (2:25.24) and Sommerfeld 15th (2.28.14). In the women's 200 yard butterfly Dewante finished 7th with a 2.23.75.

The men's 400 yard freestyle re-lay saw finishes of 5th overall \$\cap{3}\$:19.32, Pruzansky, Maus, Chojnacki and Ramminger) and 11th (3.29.12, Rosenfeld, Lutgendorf, O'Rourke, and Sommerfeld).

Indoor track and field starts off strong in second meet

Last Friday, Illinois Tech's In-door Track and Field team competed in their second meet as a varsity sport. The men's and women's teams trav-

eled through the mounting blizzard to Lewis University, and did not come away empty handed. School records were set and many of the Scarlet Hawks set new personal records.

The most successful Lady Hawk was freshman Whitney Theisen, who set both school and personal records in the Jump (9.69meters) and High Jump (156m), while placing 1st and tying for 2nd in those events respectively. In the 1000m. event, the women found even more honors.

Freshman Abby Jahn won the race with a newschool record of 3.04.75, followed in 3rd and 4th by fellow freshmen Courtney Rouse 0:12.22) and Anne Crotteau (3:29.18), who also ran an indoor personal best 5:55.18 mile.

Hailey Kunkel, also a freshman, ran a personal best in the 55m dash with a time of 836 seconds, and a solid 200m dash in 3059 seconds. Sophomore Jordan Kelch placed 3rd in the 800m race, running an indoor college best of 2:30.45. Senior Maddy Jensen and junior

Kira Vincent competed in the 5k race, taking home 2nd and 4th place with a 1935.89 and indoor personal best 20:14.79, respectively.

The Lady Hawks in the 200m dash were led by sophomore Veronica Hannink with a 29.89, followed closely by Hailey Kunkel (3059) and Alex Songer (32.63)

Junior Natalie Mitrovic placed 4th overall in the shot put with a distance of 9.86 meters, accompanied by senior Emily Kraemer (835m), senior Emily Tilton

(7.92m), and junior Alex Songer (636m). Emily Kræmer also jumpeda personal record in the long jump with a distance of 3,42 me ters, and ran the 400mdash in 71,13 seconds.

To wrap up the night for the ladies was the 4x400m relay of Abby Jahn, Courtney Rouse, Jordan Kelch, and Emily Kraemer, running a solid time of 437.95.

The men had an almost equally excitght, sweeping the 1000m race with senior Phil Theisen in 2:41.11 and junior Ethan Montague with 2:43.70, both personal records, and junior Kenny Murphy taking 3rd in 2:47.76.

Junior Zach Gates took 3rd in the mile with a time of 437.64, followed by Phil Theisen (4:45.05), Kenny Murphy (4:57.05), and senior Peter Lau with a personal record of 5.22.48. Sophomore Phil Cano placed 5th in the 400m dash with a time of 54.4 seconds, and junior Brian Lyles and freshman. Kraig Van Wieringen competed in the 800m with times of 2:13.88 and 2:15.18 respectively.

In the distance events, the 3k race saw Zach Gates (9:33.52) and sophomore John Pasowicz (11:06:12) competing well, and junior Felipe Prada ran the Hawks' first official indoor 5k with a time of 19:41:10 placing 5th.

Junior Izydor Radzik competed in the long jump (4.72m) and the shot put with a distance of 7.80 meters. The mens' might was rounded out with the indoor school record 4x400m relay in a 3rd place time of 3:44.93, run by Phil Theisen, Brian Lyles, Kraig Van Wieringen, and Phil Cano. With a good portion of the men's team either injured or on the mend, a solid effort was put forth by those competing Friday night.

The Scarlet Hawks' next Indoor Track and Field meet is this Saturday at the University of Chicago's annual Chicago Duals, set to begin at 1130 pm in the Henry Crown Field House


