Ryder Cup comes to Chicago

Golf fever has been sweeping across Chicago for weeks now in anticipation of one of the sport's most prestigious events. The biennial Ryder Cup, which sees Europe's elite golfers battle it out against their American counterparts, will be coming to Illinois' illustrious Medinah Country Club this weekend.

Dating back to 1927, the competition began as an exhibition tournament between British and American golfers. Samuel Ryder, an English seed merchant and amateur golfer, provided a gold trophy and £5 to each member

of the winning team.

The format of the competition has changed very little from the original tournament hosted in St Albans, England. Three different types of match play competitions between opposing players are held throughout the weekend. This means that points are awarded on a hole-by-hole basis. This is notable because stroke play, which awards points based on the cumulative number of shots over 18 holes, is more commonly used in major golfing tournaments.

Eight foursome matches over the weekend will see two golfers from each team play alternately on the same ball. The team with the fewest shots taken to putt the ball at each hole wins a point. Another eight fourball

matches will be held, in which two players from each team will face off, but each teammate plays their own ball. Each hole is won by the team whose individual golfer has the lowest score. Finally, there will be twelve singles matches, where one golfer from each team will play standard match play over 18 holes.

After a period of US domination of the competition following World War II, Great Britain was permitted to join forces with countries from Central Europe in 1979. The tournament has become much more competitive since then, with the United States and Great Britain/Central Europe each having won the cup 38 times.

Teams are selected based on prize money garnered in previous seasons by

competitors in all professional competitions. Europe also add two captain's picks to their squad, while the States' captain is allowed to select a further four players for their team.

The current holders of the trophy, Europe will be looking to World Number One and PGA Tour Champion Rory McIlroy to inspire the team, while an in-form Tiger Woods will hope to lead his team to victory in Medinah.

In any case, this is one of professional golf's most exciting and awe-inspiring events, and if you have spare time on Sunday afternoon, I strongly suggest tuning in as the tournament comes to what is expected to be a tight and tense finish.
