President Provost forum looks to future

A unique IIT tradition that has formed over the past few years has been that of the once a semester President and Provost Forum. Hosted by the Student Government Association (SGA) and put on shortly after the midterm, the Forum provides an opportunity for students and faculty members to ask any questions they may have about the university and its policies to the two staff members in charge of shaping those policies and assembling a staff to make those policies happen.

This semester's Forum took place in the Hermann Hall ballroom over the lunch hour on November 1. The forum had fewer individuals in attendance than past forums, but the Ballroom still found itself full of people as SGA Executive Vice President Raghav Girijala brought the room to order and opened the Forum. Questions were posed both by people in attendance at the Forum and through a web form that was set up by SGA.

The first question of the forum was posed via the online form, and asked how the administration of the university could help increase school spirit and athletic involvement. President John Anderson began by responding with a few possible ideas, bringing up the fact that he personally purchased pizza for the attendees of early basketball games as an example of a potential idea, citing the fact that attendance double when he did. Provost Alan Cramb then took a chance to respond, mentioning his belief that increasing school spirit and athletic involvement was not something that the administration could do, saying that issues such as this one needed to be driven by the student body. He explained that students should support other students who are athletes just like they support other students who are leaders in student organizations, and that this was necessary to create a true campus community at IIT.

The next question, also from the online form, asked if the university could begin promoting itself as Illinois Tech as opposed to IIT. This questions was answered by the Provost, who explained his personal preference for the name Illinois Tech due to the fact that it puts the

University in company with well-known schools such as Caltech and Georgia Tech. He went on to explain, however, that we promote ourselves as Illinois Tech and IIT because while Illinois Tech is a great university name for individuals in technical fields, students in non-technical fields, such as business or psychology, would probably have greater success in the job market referring to their university as IIT. The Provost concluded by saying that individuals should choose for themselves how they would like to refer to the university and which name they would like to call it.

The next question was the first question from a member of the audience, asking what the current status of the Innovation Center was. The Innovation Center is the proposed new campus building that would become the first new academic building on IIT's campus in over 40 years. The President responded by saying that there is still quite a bit of money that needs to be raised before the Center can be built. The Innovation Center will need \$45 million to be built, and only \$7 million to \$8 million of this had been raised. This amount has allowed planning to begin on the building, though. The President explained that five different architectural firms are currently submitting proposals for both the design of the building and the facilities the building will provide, and that the university will announce the final architectural firm chosen for the project in January.

This question was followed up by another question from the audience, in which a student mentioned a story that had been published in TechNews earlier in the semester. In the article, two students shared an anecdote about how their Resident Advisor had told them not to go south of 35th street; advice which they chose to ignore in order to visit a restaurant on 95th street. The student asked if it was the University's official policy to tell students not to go south of 35th street, explaining that the South Side is just as much a part of the city as any other part of the city, and not an area to simply ignore. The Provost took the lead on the question, explaining that this was not the official opinion of the University, and that the idea in and of itself is an old mentality, born 20 or 30 years ago and not relevant any more. The Provost advised students to stay smart and safe

no matter where they are traveling since IIT is in a city. He also brought up how many students at IIT give back to the city of Chicago in all of its communities, both north and south of 35th street.

The next question posed regarded many of the changes happening at the University currently, and whether or not the University had a roadmap for its future as all these changes were occurring. The President stressed that one of the biggest goals of the University for the future is to further improve its financial status, explaining that, "if your finances aren't in order, it's hard to do anything." The President also mentioned that goals for the future included increasing the total enrollment of undergraduate and graduate students to 9,000, and building a new recreation center for students, although he caveated that the recreation center was a very long term goal. The Provost further expanded on what the President said by mentioning that the University is working on becoming internationally known for what it does, and that it is investing in tech centers both on campus and in the city of Chicago in order to open up possibilities for students. The President closed by saying that the main goal of the University for the future was to take the advantages afforded to the University since it is small, and mitigate the disadvantages brought to the University by being small.

A follow up question was then asked by an attendee, who was wondering if newly renovated buildings would be made compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The President and Provost deferred to Bruce Watts, IIT's new head of Facilities and Public Safety to answer the question, who explained that all new and renovated buildings would be made ADA compliant, and that the University had hired one of the top firms in the city to do this. Watts also mentioned that capital funds were currently being spent to repair the crumbling handicap ramp into Hermann Hall in the upcoming weeks.

The next question again dealt with the upcoming renovations of campus buildings, asking if there was a timeline in place for these renovations. President Anderson explained that the first phase of the Engineering One renovations had already begun, and that they would be completed by August 31, 2014,

at which point in time the building will be renamed the John T. Rettaliata Engineering Center. He also mentioned that the renovation of the Life Sciences building was staggered a year behind that of Engineering One, so it would be complete by August 31, 2015.

One of the final questions was posed by an architecture student in attendance, asking how the administration could help with the frustration felt by many students in the College of Architecture regarding the many changes brought about by the new Dean of the College, Wiel Arets. The Provost answered the question, explaining that it was his belief that much of the concern felt by students within the College was due to lack of communication. The Provost stressed that, contrary to the belief of some architecture students, the Dean of the College was being held to the same standards as other Deans on campus, and that students should talk to the Dean and the Associate Deans of the College to learn all that is happening, which would help solve the communication problems that exist and alleviate student's concerns.

The final question posed was in regards to the IEEE Great Lakes Symposium, which was held on campus in September. The student talked about how exciting it was to have so many industry professionals on campus during the symposium, and asked if it was possible for things like this to happen again. Provost Cramb responded to the question by explaining that it isn't IIT that organizes conferences such as the Symposium, but the hosting organizations themselves and the departments at IIT related to the conference topic, ultimately saying that there is little we can do to decide whether or not a conference or symposium is to be hosted on campus.

With the end of the lunch hour approaching, the Forum was then closed. President Anderson finished the event by taking an opportunity to talk about the upcoming speakers that were a part of the Presidential Lecture Series. The series is currently focusing on the topic of Immigration, and the President shared that professors from both Princeton and the University of Washington were being brought to campus to speak, with the first lecture taking place on November 14.

Student fees fund campus activities

The last time you were billed from IIT, you may have noticed a line reading Activity fee, \$110. You probably paid your bill including that random fee and didn't think much about it. That \$110 may not seem like too much to you, but multiplied by the current student population of IIT of over 7,000 students, this sum of money is quite significant. Now you are probably interested what happens to this money. Each semester, it is deposited into the SAF, Student Activities Fund, that is, in turn allocated to student organizations.

In a 1932 issue of the Armour Tech News, we first find mention of the activities fee. Since that time, the fee has fluctuated but as far as can be told from TechNews archives, the student activities fee has been collected consistently over the years. Currently, this fund is allocated through a branch of the Student Government Association, Finance Board. According to the Finance Board Guidelines, "Finance Board aims to fairly allocate the [SAF] to promote student life and increase student involvement at Illinois Tech."

According to the SGA constitution and bylaws, "Finance Board shall consist of the Chair of Finance Board and nine members. Each member shall serve as an advisor to a number of student organizations, and shall advise them during the budget process of requesting funds from the Student Activity Fund."

This board of students is chosen after they are "nominated by a member of the student body, recommended by the Finance Board Selection Commission, and approved by a two-thirds vote of the Senate." The selection commission "shall consist of the Chair of the Finance Board, SGA Advisor, current members of Finance Board, and two to five student representatives, to be elected by the Senate."

This is a lot of information but we want you to fully understand the importance of both the Student Activities Fund and Finance Board. Because of the two, your college experience can be a rich and diverse journey.

From the Outside: Will

Unlike Miriam, I have not really dealt with Finance Board too much in my time here at IIT. I'm more familiar with the SAF and what it could do for me. From my various roles in different student organizations, I have come to rely on the SAF as a way to enrich my student organizations' mission and goals as well as provide something to IIT's campus and students. The SAF can be used towards four categories for student organizations. Those are programming, conferences/ competitions, operations, and capital.

Programming is the most important one; it is the one that students see the most. Did you know that Homecoming is funded mainly through the SAF? Or that Taste of IIT can happen because of the SAF? That Bill Nye was able to come to our campus because of the SAF? Even if you are not involved, student organizations are able to program events that appeal to you and hope that you will attend.

Conferences/competitions is the next category. Students organizations are able to fund some of the costs for heading to conferences or competitions. This means that professional organizations are able to attend networking conferences or career fairs. This also means that some student organizations are able to partially fund trips to compete against other schools in big competitions. As financially conscious students, this opportunity to travel without shelling out the full cost is underutilized but also something we need to be careful of; we need to advertise better these opportunities since everyone is paying into the SAF.

Operations is a category that funds printing money or supplies that will expire after a year and are needed to keep the student organization running.

Capital is a category that funds permanent item that other students will then have access to after purchase. For example, a grill has recently been purchased through a student organization and other student organizations are allowed access to this capital item per stipulations created under the capital category outlines.

Through the SAF, we have access to a lot and I wish the general population of IIT students would use it more. You don't have to get involved necessarily but attend events hosted by the school. There are so many that are free because of the SAF. You're paying \$110. Why wouldn't you want to make sure you're getting your money's worth?

The Insider: Miriam

I have learned a lot about Finance

Board. I started out as a Finance Board representative giving three Saturdays a semester to 14 to 16 hour hearings and deliberations to allocate funding. I became President of Union Board, which receives significant funding from Finance Board. I then spent two years on Judicial Board (one as Chief Justice) hearing more than 25 petitions regarding Finance Board and SAF funding. I have allocated SAF funds, I have received SAF funds, and I have made decisions regarding contested allocations.

From these experiences, I have come to realize is that Finance Board is the most important piece of student life at IIT. While some may question the rationale of allowing a board of students to manage this amount of funding, I believe that is exactly why student life continues to grow and reflect the interests of the students at IIT. This allows for more flexibility, adaptability, and investment of the students into student life.

As Chief Justice, I spent hours hearing from student organizations, which were dissatisfied with Finance Board, their processes, and funding decisions.

While I believe that there are Finance Board has room to improve, I believe the best way for organizations and students to work effectively with Finance Board is through a greater understanding of the history and role of Finance Board, but more importantly playing an active role in the selection of new Finance Board representatives. In order for Finance Board to function at its best, students like you have to take an interest into 'who' is placed on the board before complaining about Finance Board.

The next time that you meet with your Finance Board representative, take some time to thank him or her for all of the work that he or she puts in. From experience, Finance Board is likely the most underappreciated position a student can have at IIT despite being one of the most critical to student life on campus.

My challenge to all students is this. Next time nominations are open for Finance Board, make sure that you are nominating strong candidates who are responsible and can fairly make decisions in the best interest of all the students at Illinois Tech.

Working together we can ensure that this awesome opportunity of funding from the students, by student, for the betterment of student life is maintained at Illinois Tech.

Under new leadership, the IIT Rock Climbing Club has been up to a lot this semester, with events every week and bigger events planned for the future.



Vi'Paino's Italian cuisine complements atmosphere

Since winter is here, Chicago won't be treating us friendly anymore. It can get angry and start weeping (raining) like a teenage girlfriend anytime it wishes. So we'd better be prepared for rain anytime. Last Wednesday was a fateful day when I was telling everyone around me to carry an umbrella as it will rain, but I forgot mine.

I was one happy girl, doing her winter shopping when all of a sudden rain started to pour. The nearest place for me to rescue myself was this Italian and German restaurant Vi'Paino. I am glad I didn't bring an umbrella along or else I would have been never able to come across this little wonderland in the town.

I have been around the city and tried many restaurants, but for me currently this is the coolest restaurant in town. A hip, interesting atmosphere with great tasting but inexpensively priced food. It's a self-service style place, which means you don't have to give tips. They make everything fresh, right in front of you, and then buzz you on a beeper when it is done. The bar is also self-serve and has everything any normal bar would, it's nice, but a little troubling how fast you can get a drink. If you don't drink then they also have lemon-mint fresh water, which is also self-serve. They have it in a big glass cooler, the only drawback about this complimentary drink is that there is no ice and a slow pour on the water.

I was there with a friend. I ordered Chicken Alfredo Pasta (\$9.95) and my friend ordered a Chicken Barbeque Pizza (\$9.95). The pasta bowl was gigantic and cheesy and creamy and what-not. It was really tasty, had lots of fresh flavors especially the taste of garlic and green chili. It was 'happiness in bowl'. The pizza was okay, I would rate it 3 out of 5 because there was very little cheese and the sauce was too sweet for pizza-I thought would be a bit spicy. They have only one size for pizza and you can take your leftovers in a bag.

I will recommend you to go there and try their pasta and salad, as they are so delicious. I read many online reviews about it, they said the taste is bland and uninteresting, but again, they make your dish the way you ask them to make it. If you will ask them to put more flavor in it they will do it without taking extra charges.

For those of you who haven't been there yet, this is how it works: upon entering the front door, the host gives you a card and asks

if you have been to this place before or not. If you say "no," then the host will explain how it works. Then you go to different food stations and tap your card to purchase what you want: Salad, Pasta, Pizza, Soup, Dessert, etc. Then you go and sit, and wait for the buzzer to beep (which hardly takes 6-8 minutes.) When you are done eating, someone comes and takes your dirty dishes with a smiling face. You pay your bill, which has been charged on your credit card and you are good to go with free gummy bears waiting for you next the cashier.

Two things I really enjoyed, the flavored water and the gummy bears by the cashier. I LOVE gummy bears and fresh water! The restaurant is located on 2577 N Clark St. Chicago, IL 60614 and the times are 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. on weekdays and 11:00 a.m. to midnight on weekends.

Retro Review:

Find an honest-to-goodness romance in 'Before Sunrise'

The best of movies remind us of life's beauty: they not only communicate the human condition but lift our spirits above the morass of daily life to show us a glimpse of hope and love. Richard Linklater's "Before..." trilogy—"Before Midnight" being the latest are exceptional examples of just such movies, and over the next three weeks I will review each in turn.

"Before Sunset," the first of the trilogy, premiered in 1995. It follows Jesse and Celine (Ethan Hawke and Julie Delpy) over the course of less than a day: from their first meeting on a train in Europe, to the early

morning the following day. The story itself as "plot"—defies concise synopsis because the story is not a "happening" or series of events, but merely an extended encounter between these two strangers. Ordinarily, this might raise concerns, on account it leaves a tremendous burden upon dialogue and character development—two elements most Hollywood films notoriously lack serious concern for.

Fortunately, "Before Sunrise" is not a "Hollywood" movie. Linklater and Kim Krizan—the screenwriters—craft an exceptional script that translates beautifully in Hawke and Delpy's performances. The movie is virtually 90 minutes of Hawke and Delpy on screen talking and walking around Viennaand, yes, they're falling in love (more on this below).

What do they talk about? Everything: life and death, sex and marriage, gender and identity, the past and future, family and friends—their conversations lack nothing of substance. The remarkable part of their conversations is that they are sincere and heartfelt—totally absent of the typical superficial Hollywood tropes and clichés. And what this amounts to is absolute committal on the part of the viewer: you fall in love with both of these characters because you actually come to know them-not in a sentimental schmaltzy way, but in a romantic way and with a surprising intellectual intimacy.

Moreover, what truly captivates you is the unmistakable chemistry between Hawke and Delpy. Unlike Hollywood "Romances" where you must abandon reality in a fantasy world in order to believe the "love" between the

characters, "Before Sunrise" requires no such sacrifice; rather, Hawke and Delpy literally woo you from the screen, until, at the end, you find yourself pining—pining! —For their love and its endurance.

I have never experienced a romantic love, and for long want of it, I dare say many (myself included) doubt its very existence: perhaps it's all but a fancy, paraded before us to capitalize (literally) upon our longstanding fantastic delusions!

But—no! "Before Sunrise" gives me hope. With its honest dialogue and unpretentious portrayal of human interaction, I revive my faith and hold out hope for just such a romance. "Before Sunrise" is romance portrayed in actuo.

Eclectic Theatre's 'All My Sons' a faithful, impressive performance

With a poster exhibiting a grayedout, bisected apple and three planes as pits, even before their impressive performance, Eclectic Theatre manages to capture the jaded disillusionment of Arthur Miller's "All My Sons."

The war is over for America, but for the Kellers the loss of their son Larry still hovers over their conscious. At least that is the case for Kate (Julie Partyka), who refuses to acknowledge her son's death, choosing instead to desperately put her faith in both astrology and God. Meanwhile, Joe (David Elliott) and Chris (Jeff Kurysz) accommodate her monomania as they try to move on. Three years have passed since Larry's death when the issue is unavoidably raised by a visit from his ex-girlfriend Ann (Tracey Green) and her brother George (Charlie Rasmann). Last night lightning struck down Larry's memorial tree, and this signifies a bad omen for all involved.

Eclectic Theatre's rendition of "All My Sons," to my great surprise and appreciation,

adheres to the realism of Miller's text, eschewing the seemingly all-too-popular trend of "updating" classic texts in attempt to reach contemporary audiences. Artistic Director of Eclectic Theatre and director of the production David Belew, while addressing this issue in the playbill, through his staging shows the audience that the context of a play does not need revision because it is the universal themes of the play that carry its relevancy through time. And who cannot relate to the themes of disillusionment, cowardice, and family lie's?

But a play and its themes is nothing without the players to actualize the conception on stage: and Eclectic's cast of "All My Sons" does just that with great success. The star of the show—without a doubt—is Julie Partyka, who plays Kate. From the moment she enters the stage, hounding Joe about her potato bag, we see her haggard appearance weighed down by years of grief and hear that same exhaustion in her weary voice. Her performance is terrifyingly beautiful to behold.

What comes out most in Partyka's performance is just how much control she

wields over the family. Reading "All My Sons," one is inclined to see the orchestrator as Joe (Elliott), but Belew's staging shows him as a hollowed-out husk of a man from beginning to end. David Elliott's lack of dynamic may perhaps be a stylistic choice, but as Joe Keller is a man desperate to keep the past in oblivion, his apparent lack of urgency registers discordance to the piece as a whole and renders his character arc rather flat and uninteresting.

Jeff Kurysz and Charlie Rasmann as Chris and George, respectively, the most opposing character-types in the play—the all-American golden boy and the emotionallybeleaguered son—capture the antithetical essence of their characters and work well together to turn the plot in the second act.

The supporting cast ought not to be overlooked, either. Beautifully subtle performances abound, especially with Patrick Iven and Kevin Webb; the former delivering the most understatedly poignant moment of the play in his monologue on lost idealism. Amy Gorelow and Nancy Kolton are no less impressive, although their presences are quite

fleeting; Gorelow as Lydia and Rasmann as George share a superb moment in the second act in which Gorelow's facial responses are remarkable in their genuineness. And—one cannot forget little Bert, played by Connor Boyle, who, of course, steals the stage whenever he's on it.

By the end of the second act, I found myself more moved by the expectation of what was to come than by the actual staging, which might be due to Elliott's low emotional arc and how quickly Kate and Chris seem to recover from the shock of the horrifying event. Nevertheless, Eclectic Theatre's "All My Sons" is filled with powerful moments of impressive acting and is well worth seeing: Highly Recommended.

New improvements, issues with Windows 8.1

Windows has recently unveiled their newest release to the Windows 8 line. 8.1 is an update, not an upgrade. Almost all of the previous features unique to Windows 8, such as the Metro start screen and app store have been updated, and now includes Bing Smart Search. Apps can now be snapped to have up to 4-way multitasking, compared to the limit of 2 from Windows 8. Windows 8.1 introduces many new customizable features lacking form the original Windows 8 release.

First off, I have been using Windows 8 since its first developer's release. It has certainly come a long way since that first buggy release, but it is still far from what I would consider perfected. Microsoft has done a great job improving the boot time over older versions of Windows. An added solid state drive makes it possible to cold boot in a matter of seconds.

The direction that they are taking Windows is much more mobile, with touchoriented hardware. Unfortunately though, the shift toward mobile takes away from some of the features appreciated by the desktop crowd. One of the features that desktop lovers could not stand about the old Windows 8 was the lack of the start button, and even beyond that the lack of the Windows 7 style start menu.

The 8.1 update put the start button back, but it only opens the Metro interface and is thus merely a cosmetic change. On a desktop, this screen is hard to navigate with a mouse alone. The only way to scroll through all the apps on this screen is to either grab the slider bar at the bottom and move the screen over or use the keyboard. For heavy mouse users this is more of a hassle than it should be.

With this new tiled start screen, users lose the option to directly open recently saved documents. Along the same lines, Windows 8.1 has many menus activated by moving a mouse into a corner. However, for multiple monitor setups, this becomes a problem. With multiple monitors, if a mouse is moved toward a corner, then the curser might jump to the next screen and the corner menu won't be activated. For most of these screens, there are keyboard shortcuts, but to be honest, most people can't recognize shortcuts beyond cut and paste.

This is not to say that 8.1 is without great improvements. The start time is amazing compared to 7. Plus, it is a bit faster overall. This is done by optimizing the operating system, especially because the operating system is also made for lower powered and slower mobile systems.

Compared to the initial release of Windows 8, 8.1 has many updates that make it faster and more secure, therefore it is a nobrainer to upgrade.

In the future, I hope that Microsoft will consider some of the problems brought up, even if they are very minuscule, and that might be enough to get me to make the switch from Windows 7.
