"We are hoping to have students develop more pride for IIT, especially surrounding our athletics," he said.

Each year, students from IIT Stuart School of Business enter a variety of industry competitions, applying the skills they learn in the classroom to real-world business situations. Here are just a few highlights from the 2013-2014 academic year.

A team of IIT Stuart students placed first in the Chicago local-level competition of the Chartered Financial Analyst Institute Research Challenge in February 2014, besting teams from seven Chicago-area finance programs. At the Chicago-area final, competitors presented their equity valuation research to top executives at the featured company, Littelfuse, Inc., which is based in Chicago.

This year, over 385 teams from around the globe participated in the 2014 CME Group Trading Challenge, and a team from IIT Stuart finished in the top 10 percent of all competitors, advancing to the championship round. Student teams used a simulated trading environment to trade CME

Group products over the four-week electronic trading competition.

In addition, three M.S. Finance students from IIT Stuart School of Business were recognized as top performers in the 2013-2014 All-America Student Analyst Competition, sponsored by Institutional Investor magazine. One student was recognized as a top performer in the sector performance competition, ranking both 3rd in the Energy sector and 5th in the Capital Goods/Industrials sector. Another student ranked 18th in the long alpha ranking and 78th overall of the top 100. The third student finished 24th out of the top 100. More than 2,100 students from 82 schools participated. Illinois Institute of Technology was also recognized as one of only 30 schools with more than one student in the top 100.

IIT Stuart undergraduate students also can put their investing skills to the test in the student-run Undergraduate Business Council Online Investment Competition. The month-long stock trading challenge was designed to help undergraduates apply their financial expertise in a simulated, studentrun competition. More than 20 students entered, and three sophomores took home first, second, and third place prizes.

Students are also rewarded for their efforts. In a joint initiative with Chicago Innovation Awards, more than 100 IIT Stuart students entered to win \$10,000 in scholarship prizes for their innovative business ideas. Top winners were enrolled in IIT Stuart's dual-degree M.B.A. and Master of Design program, with additional prize winners representing the M.B.A. and M.S. Marketing Analytics and Communication programs. "When my team won the Rotman Design Challenge last year, I started thinking that the combination of the Institute of Design program and Stuart M.B.A. is more powerful than I thought," commented Thomas Gaskin, part of the team that took home the Gold prize. "This win reinforces the impact of design strategy and business." The awards event also featured a panel of entrepreneurs and innovators, including several former winners of the Chicago Innovation Awards annual business competition.

International Students in for learning experiences at Illinois Tech

Illinois Institute of Technology is a home for many international students. We leave our homes and families and come this far to begin the journey of knowledge for a better future. But how does it feel to be an international student here? It's way better than what you might have thought. I know when you are getting on the plane here you have many questions on your mind: What kind of place it? Is it safe there? Will I be able to make new friends? Will people accept me for who I am or I will have to change myself?

So, I have a simple answer to this question: IIT is what you make it for yourself. I am saying this because if you socialize and work hard, then you will never find a better place than IIT and if you don't, you might not like it as much as you should. I have been living in America since 2011 and I have been to many places around the States but I never knew that I will end up here in Chicago for my final degree because I simply didn't like the harsh weather here. But when I started living here last year, I became one happy girl.

I still remember my first day on campus; I was a short girl with a high ponytail and turquoise dress, carrying two big bags, one backpack, and a tired and worried face. I was trying my best to enter Herman Hall. Someone saw me and opened the door for me to guide me to the check-in point for orientation. After someone offered to help me with my bags, I checked in and got my HawkCard. Then the real struggle started for me; I had zero knowledge to help me navigate around campus. I had to go to MSV from Herman Hall and I seriously got stuck in MTCC for 10 minutes while looking for an exit.

As an international student, there are many rules and regulations that are different and unexpected. One thing that became irritating was the rules regarding working off-campus and volunteering; it is sometimes difficult to navigate. There are many immigration procedures that become barriers. You can, however, work as a student assistant on-campus which is really fun. Sometimes it's a bit of a struggle to get an on-campus job, but if you will work hard and show your leadership skills on-campus, you'll be rewarded.

Since for most of us English is not out first language, we might face some problems in getting used to the environment where we have to speak in English most of the time. You should not feel bad about not speaking like others because we all are learning here. Trust me, there have been times when I made so many silly mistakes while speaking English that I opted not to speak. There are many phrases which don't make sense in English but are funny and common in my native language. If you come across the same situation, please don't panic or give up; it's normal. Although I have been speaking English since I was three years old, at times it is difficult or I am just too tired to speak English.

Now comes the most sensitive issue for me. Yes, this girl is talking about food. When I came here and I would see people eating the food served at the Commons (which I wasn't a fan of at first) I felt guilty thinking about all those times when I skipped any meal back home or would leave some food in plate because I was too full to finish it all. But guess what? Now our this problem is also solved because the staff of the Commons make authentic ethnic food every day! You'll get used to the food on campus and grow to love it in no time.

When any international student comes here they face a lot of problems adjusting to the educational system here because it's quite different from most the countries. I would personally suggest you to talk to your professor beforehand to get an idea that what is his grading criteria and his expectation from his coursework. Another thing that amused me is the practice of not addressing your professors as Madam and Sir. In fact, you generally call them by their last name; some might ask you to call

them by their first name. As I said earlier it's all about time and soon you will get used to it.

It will also take some time to get to know the neighborhood and make new friends but it won't take a lot of time because 46 percent of the students here are international students. Soon you might meet many people from your own country. I would still suggest you make as many international friends as possible because that will not only make you a global citizen, but it will also give you a better vision of the world we are living in. It will help us to compare and contrast different cultures, religions, and traditions and bring us to the conclusion that we all are not that different.

Remember, there will come time when you will feel homesick and might feel like quitting, but remember that it can be the same time you will learn how strong you are and how far you can go. Skype with your family or call them; after you are done with talking to them, go out and meet your friends from school. Your friends here can be your family here. I remember when I was ill last semester and was laying alone in my bed thinking of how lonely I am here and how I have no one to look after me--suddenly there was a call on my cell. I picked it up and my friend heard my voice before I could tell him that I am not feeling well. He came along with my other friends to my room with hot tea, cookies, and medicine. They were there with me until I fell asleep and would keep a check on me every few hours. That was the time when I knew how blessed I am and how much I am loved by my friends here.

There are going to be a lot of things to enjoy while at Illinois Tech, and many things you will come to know by the end of the academic year. There's some important information to share about the resources that we have around campus. The best part about these resources is that one can access most of them online; you don't have to go to their office to get any kind of information.

The first and most important resource is the Academic Resource Center, mostly known as the ARC. IIT has really great tutors there who are ready to help students throughout the day. To look for the subject or tutor you want, all you have to do is visit www.iit.edu/arc and look up the subject you need help in and the schedule will pop up.

If you need help in your research paper or any writing, then you will can visit the writing center; it is located in Siegel Hall room 232 and 233. For this you will have to go there physically and sign the sign-up sheet for an appointment.

A second important resource a student should be aware of is our awesome library, Paul V. Galvin Library. This is a place you can find most of your books, and, just in case it's not available, you'll have the ability to check it out through I-Share, a book-sharing program that our library participates in. To

find out about book availability visit www. library.iit.edu and click on find books.

If you are looking for some research articles or journals, there's also a great database server where you can find most journals and research papers for free. In case you are not sure how to use them in your paper, there's a research office available throughout the day.

After academic safety comes your own personal safety. For that, all students should sign up for IIT Alert, a service that will notify you via text or email if an emergency occurs on campus. In order to do that, simply visit www.iit.edu/iitalert/signup and get yourself signed up for all the important alerts.

Then, make sure you know how to contact IIT's Public Safety Department if you need their help. If you are on Main Campus, the non-emergency number is 312.808.6300 and the emergency number is 312.808.6363. If you are on IIT's Downtown Campus, then the non-emergency number is 312.906.5030 and the emergency number is 312.906.5030.

Lastly, if you are living on campus and have a meal plan, then you can always keep a check on your remaining meals and bonus points on www.get.cbord.com/iit/full/ login. If you want to check out the Commons menu in advance then you can always find that on www.dining.iit.edu. You can also find much other information regarding the food provided around campus.

First Year Experience Program welcomes new students to campus

IIT SAE projects develop student skills

We've all heard it time and time again - college can be the time of our lives. For me personally, it was a combination of the international culture at IIT, and the fantastic interdisciplinary projects that students can get involved in. Our collegiate chapter of the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE), and its auto racing team, IIT Motorsports, supports one of these mammoth projects: Formula SAE (FSAE).

Every year the students in SAE design, build, and race their own formula style, open-wheeled, electric race car for the FSAE competitions held around the world. The team has been working feverishly to complete it's latest design. They've put in hundreds of hours this summer completing our carbon fiber chassis and brushless hub motors. The ThunderHawk, their last car, weighed a scant 604 pounds while pushing out 180 horsepower and 1000 foot-pounds of torque. This year, the team looks to drop the weight, but maintain performance to really blow away the competition.

This year a new project was introduced: a gas-powered off-road vehicle for Baja SAE. The Baja vehicle is all about reliability through simplicity with its single cylinder motor, steel tube frame chassis, and long travel suspension. It also serves as a perfect introduction into competing as part of a racing team. The FSAE project, on the other hand, utilizes lightweight carbon composites, complex control circuits, and high-voltage electric hub motors.

Through this project, team members and those that preceded them have acquired incredible expertise in their areas of focus and have gone on to work for companies such as GM, Chrysler, Honda, Dallara Automobili, and NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. However, it all starts with incoming students. No matter the major or what experience one has, everyone can contribute. There is a niche for everyone from those in the fields of business, to computers, to engineering of all types, the artistically inclined, and anyone who loves cars or racing. Every facet is needed to build a team that can create and field competitive vehicles.

To many, Chicago is the City of Big Shoulders. A dazzling metropolis on Lake Michigan typified by tall skyscrapers, roaring L trains, and the bustle of the Loop and the Magnificent Mile. While this view of Chicago is an impressive one, it provides only a small glimpse of what makes Chicago so unique and amazing. Chicago isn't just the City of Big Shoulders - it's the city of neighborhoods. Chicago is home to over 200 neighborhoods that house the city's 2.5 million residents. Each of these neighborhoods has a unique culture and history that makes each one like none other. Bridgeport

Located directly to the West of campus, across the Dan Ryan Expressway, Bridgeport is a sleepy, working-class neighborhood that is home to the Chicago White Sox and multiple former Chicago mayors. Many IIT students call Bridgeport home due to it's many restaurants, parks, and affordable apartments. Bridgeport Coffee Company

Located at 3101 S Morgan Street, Bridgeport Coffee has been roasting beans and serving coffee for ten years. Bridgeport Coffee is consistently rated as one of the top coffee shops in the city, and offers many different drinks and sandwiches that are reasonably priced. The shop is located in a quiet, old storefront that makes a great place for studying and socializing. Bridgeport Coffee has recently opened new shops on

Chicago's Home of Chicken and Waffles




31st Street Beach



Pequod's Pizzeria worth the commute

Pequod's Pizzeria is a bit off the path from Illinois Tech, but is what I would crown as the best Chicago deep dish. I had the opportunity to go there at the start of this summer and I was quite impressed. Before coming to IIT, I did not eat a lot of deep dish, but after touring the city and trying lots of the mainstay places, I can definitely say that Pequod's was the best.

The restaurant is nothing flashy, just a 2 story building on the corner of Clyborne and Webster in Lincoln Park, not too far from the Lincoln Park Zoo. There is no parking lot,

so just find some street parking not too far away. Luckily, I was able to find a spot right on the street in front, plus the area does not have parking meters, making the experience that much better. They do have a priority seating system set up, more like a virtual line than making a reservation, but the lines should not be too bad if at all. I called ahead but found out it was unnecessary.

After being seated, I started off with a few sides, jalapeño poppers and wings. Both were good, but nothing to write home about. The pizza is what was amazing. I got a medium 12" with sausage for 3 people and it was too much. We had enough leftovers for a forth person. The crust was crunchy on the outside and soft on the inside. The cheese

melded into the crust making a soft chewy blend that was fantastic. The sausage and sauce were prepared to perfection, spicy but not overbearing.

Pequod's features a bar on the first floor and regular seating on top. The atmosphere is modern and laid back. There were some TVs around the place playing the current Chicago sports games, but not enough to consider it a sports bar. It is casual dining, so don't put on anything fancy to come here. The service was quick and efficient with the pizza arriving just as the final appetizers were finished.

To top that all off, the price was just right. Unlike most Chicago pizza places, Pequod's prices are very reasonable. We paid

just under \$17 for our pizza, easily beating most other places in value per person.

I strongly recommend a visit out to Pequod's. While it might be out of the way for most IIT students it is defiantly worth it. They do deliver, but IIT is not within their delivery zone. However, if you own an apartment a little further north then you might just be in luck.

8. Play Ball Outside




9. BBQ at the Quad







