

# HAWKS FACE CARDINALS TODAY

## SENIOR CIVILS WHIP MECHS; REACH FINALS

### Hauswald Scores

The try for the extra point was blocked by a swarm of Mech players. Later in the first half Lykowski again pegged the ball into the end zone and Pete Zemaitis intercepted for the Mech's. However, before he could take two steps he was tagged by several Civils for a touchback. The Mech's protested the touchback but since the protest had no bearing on the final score it did not matter.

### Score in Second Half

The Civils scored for the second time in the second half when Lykowski again heaved a pass to Bob Olson in the flat for the tally. Eugene "D.A." Daley caught the point after touchdown pass.

Not to be outdone the Mech's bounced right back and scored a touchdown when George Martinek threw a pass to Pete Zemaitis. The point was blocked and the game ended with the score 15-6 in favor of the Civils.

## PI KAPS CHAMPS

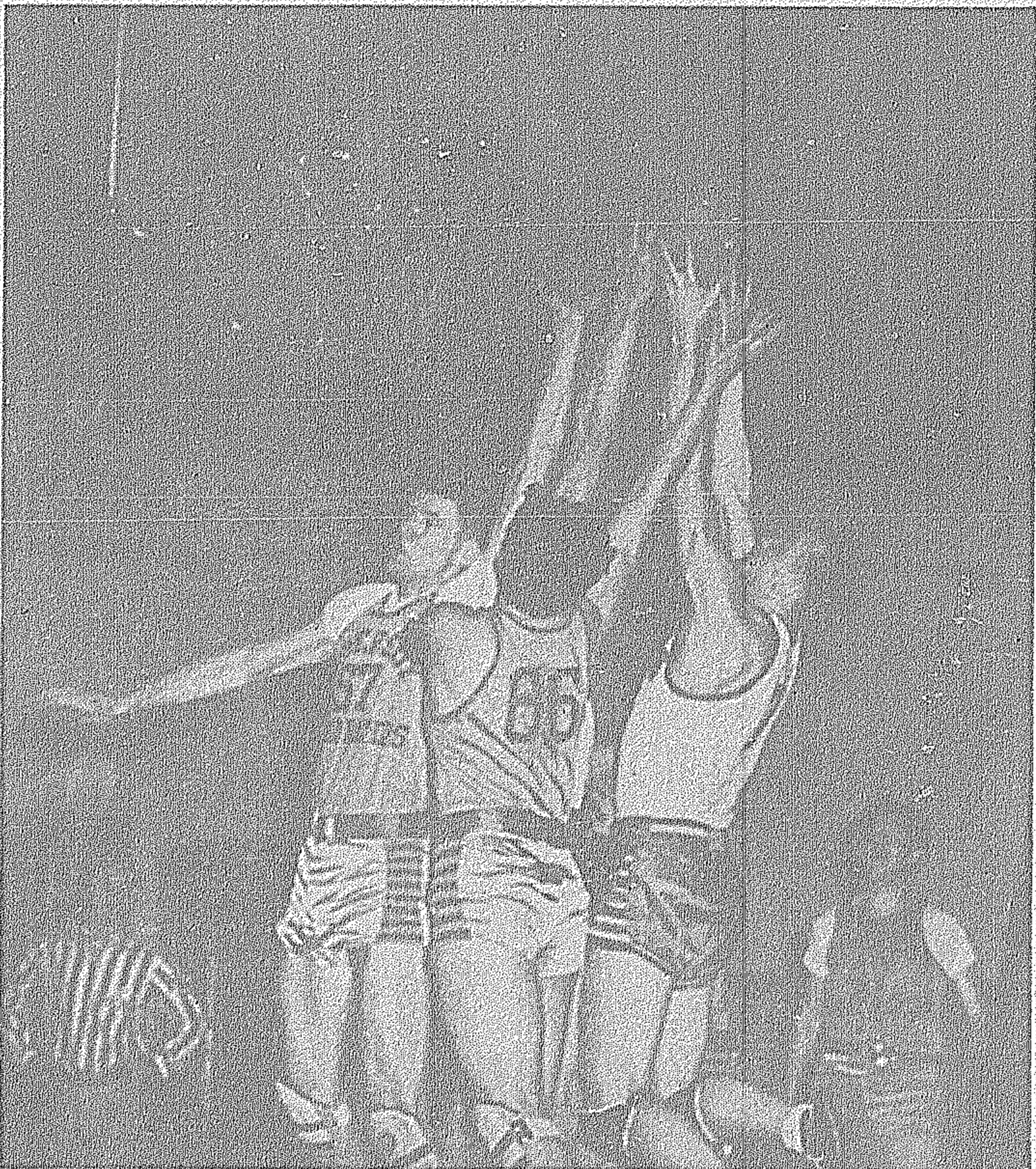

### Intelligence Considered In Selections

The team members were chosen on their abilities as football players, both offensively and defensively. Taken into major consideration were the intelligence and physical stability displayed by the gridgers during the season's play.

### All American Coaches of 1940

Clark Shaughnessy, Stanford University  
Carl Snavely, Cornell University

Shaughnessy is honored for his brilliance in rising from the depths of a poor season at Chicago to the towering heights of a brilliant football record at Stanford. Carl Snavely is singled out because he is the only grid mentor in modern history to relinquish a game to an opponent after a referee had made an error. The reference is made to the Dartmouth game in which Snavely gave the game to his opponent, when movies showed that Cornell's winning point had been scored on a fifth down.

Coach Remy Meyer has stated that the same five will start the game as has been operating together fairly efficiently in the past few games. ### TECH LOSES 40-32

Saturday, Dec. 7, Tech went to Lake Forest where a hard battle was fought. Tech lost 40-32 in the contest in which twenty-five fouls were called.

The Hawks with La Godney, Sliwa and Pendlebury overcame their opponent's lead by making their long shots and hooks good. As the half ended both teams were battering at each other's basket.

This lead soon vanished when Johnson and Harrison put on a scoring splurge which gave them a fairly comfortable lead with three minutes left to play. Another discouraging note was the inability of the Techmen to make free throws. In the first half they made only three out of thirteen. This weakness will probably cost the Techmen at least one game before the season is over—unless something is done about it.

In the first half, La Godney scored the first point on a free throw. Sliwa and Sieg teamed up to work two field goals and Grainger made a pot shot to make the score 5-2. Baskets by Byrne, Carey, and Newhaus put the Techawks ahead 11-2. Grainger, the Rapidiers sharpshooter then potted two more, and Bradfield put in a stepin shot, making the score 11-8. However, Byrne and LaGodney each scored twice while Grunhoe and Edson put in a basket apiece, making the score 19-12. Byrne's free throw, and a spectacular pivot shot by Mike Carey while Balzell and Balentine each scored a basket made the score read Techawks 22, Grand Rapids 16. Mike Carey made another spectacular shot as the gun went off the half. Score 24-16.

### Pendlebury "Steady"

In the last half Pendlebury, the Valparaiso flash and Bob Neuhaus went wild to score seven baskets between them. Galandek, a newcomer to the team, broke into the scoring column as he made the last basket of the game. The final score was 43-31.

The real scoring heroes of the game were those two "sophomore swishers," Jack Byrne, who made a total of ten points, and Ray "Slim" La Godney who tallied nine points. Howie Pendlebury was a close runner up with a total of eight points. Bob Neuhaus, who will be expected to play Capt. Sliwa's guard position, made six points as he tossed in three long baskets from way out in the floor.
