ILLINOIS TECH TAKES HONORS IN BOAT RACE

"She's coming about!" That was typical of the many cries heard Saturday, October 19 as Illinois Tech "sailed" off with top honors in the second Midwest Intercollegiate Sailing Championship, held at the Columbia Yacht Club. The local mariners had to best three Big Ten crews, Chicago, Michigan and Wisconsin, in order to gain this distinctive triumph.

I.I.T. was racing nip and tuck with Michigan until the fifth race when double trouble hit the Tech-hawk's dinghies. First, the crew of Parks and Paganis turned over, and then Kasman and Bonar cut a corner too sharp and fouled a marker while in the lead. This sudden reversal gave Michigan a big 10 point lead. With only three races left to make up this difference, the Engineers started to boom right along.

Parks breezed across the finish line three times for 24½ points, whereas Kasman took a second, a third, and a seventh. When the total points were added, it appeared at first that a tie existed between Illinois Tech and Michigan. However, a quick check-up on the figures indicated that Tech had won by the narrow margin of one point, with a total of 88½.

Many Return At Hockey Conclave

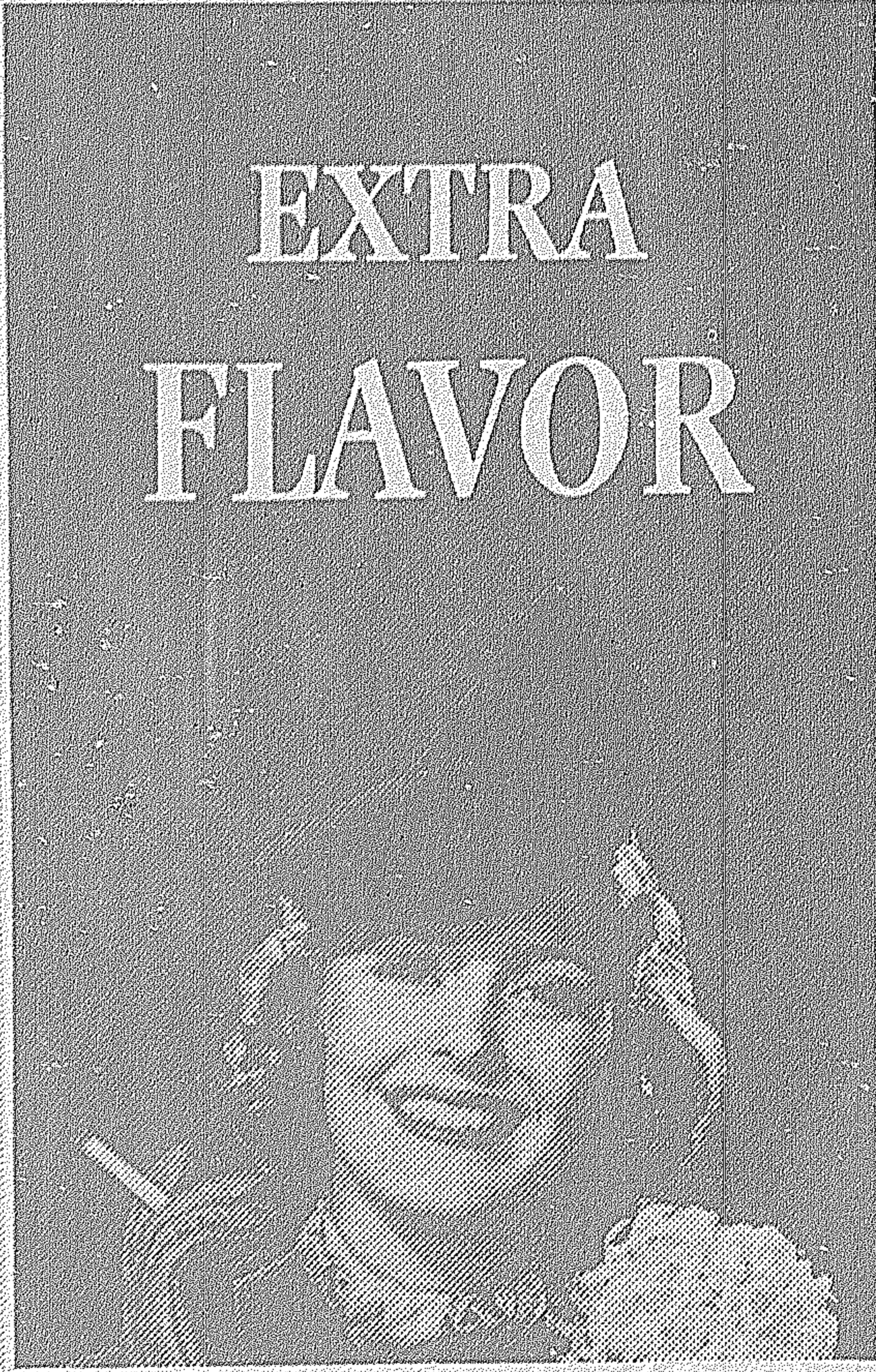
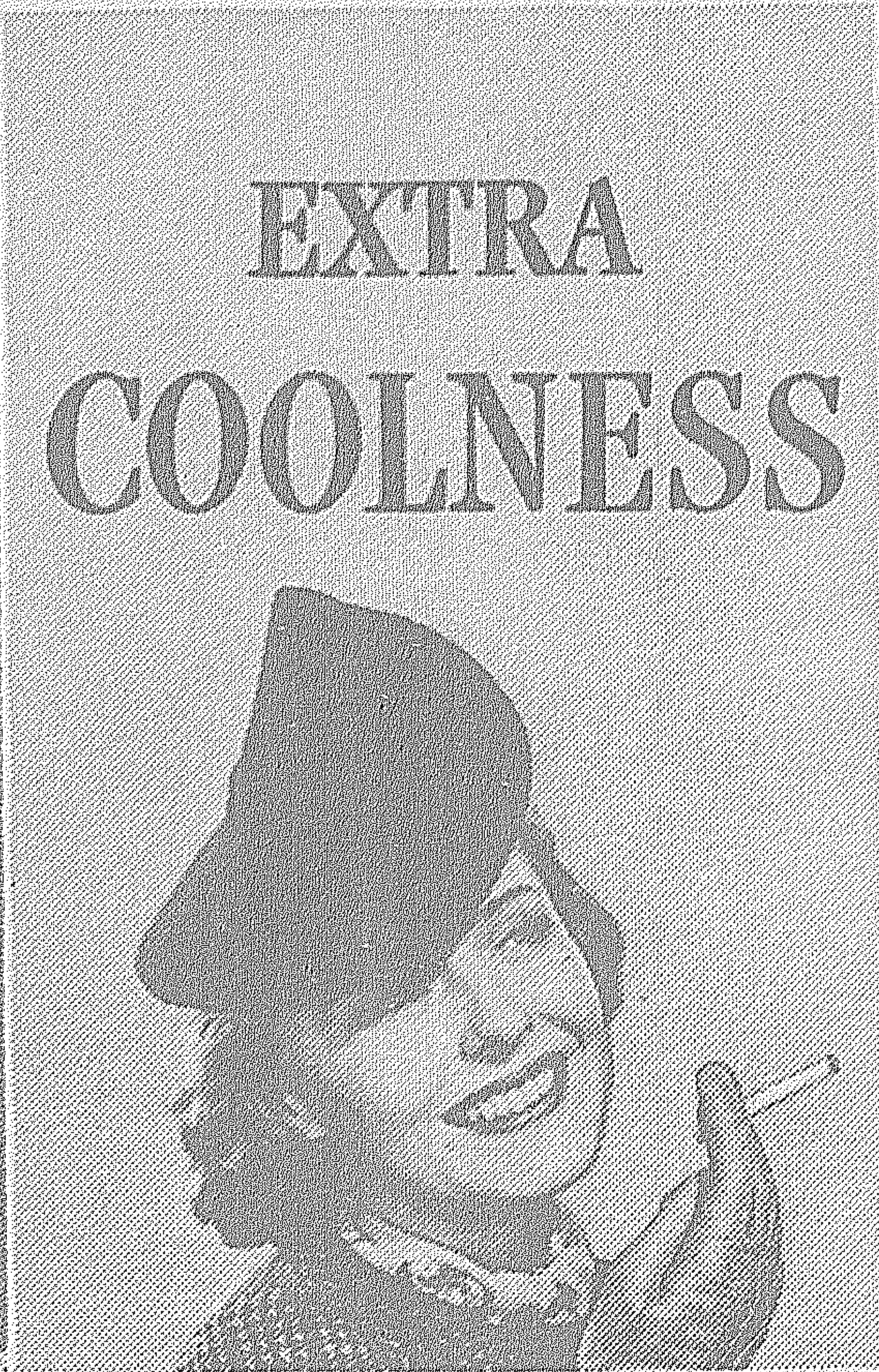
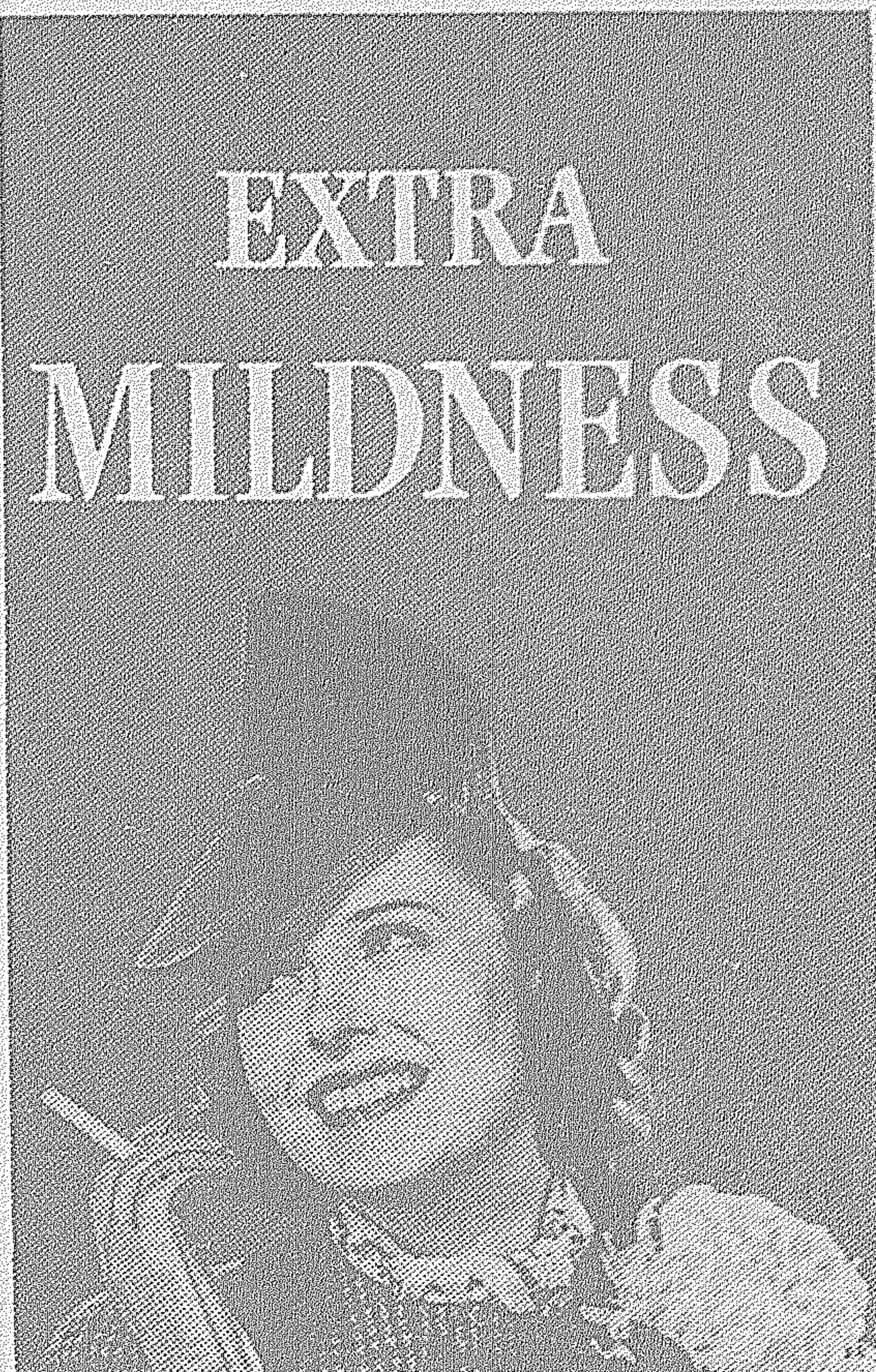

Walter Eichenberger, freshman, is an up and coming candidate at center, having formerly played in practice with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

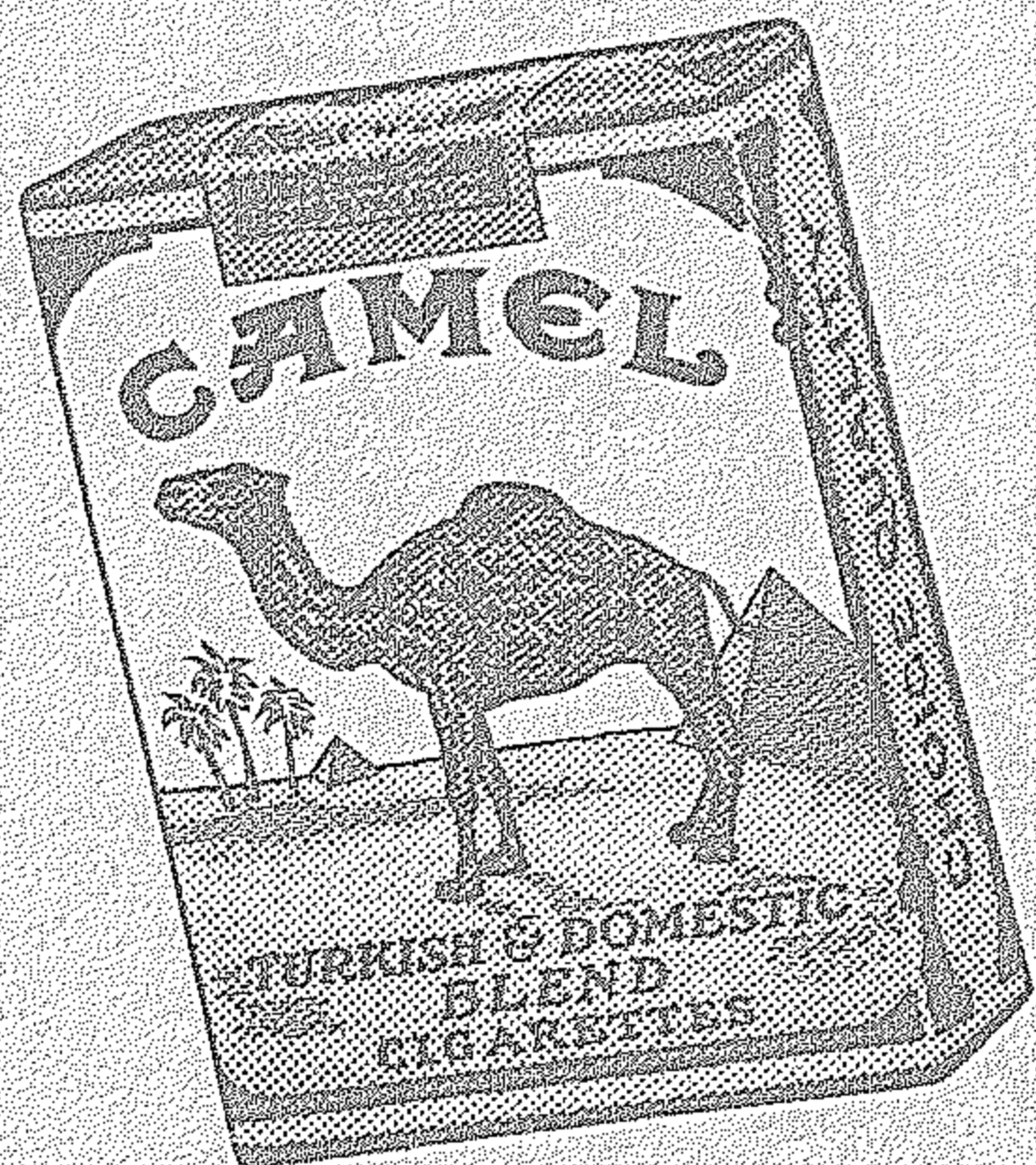
The team schedule is not made up yet, but games will be played with Chicago, Beloit, and Notre Dame.
