Arx Motorcade Visits Home Of F. Lloyd Wright

A motorcade of fifteen Arx left Chicago at crack of dawn Saturday, Oct. 19, for the Wisconsin Lake country. The purpose of this pilgrimage, sponsored by Scarab, was to visit Frank Lloyd Wright's school and home at Taliesin, the "Mecca" of American architects.

At Madison, the group went through the Forest Products Laboratory. This laboratory is maintained by the Government, in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin. It is a scientific and technical research institution whose business is to aid in protecting and enhancing the value and utility of forest products.

In the afternoon the Arx inspected Wright's \$5,500 Jacob's house in Madison and later had a taste of night life in Madison.

The Arx spent Sunday at Taliesin as the guests of Architect Wright and his apprentices in the Taliesin fellowship. Mr. Wright talked informally on architecture and showed the Armour students "Broadacre," a model of an ideal city. He also explained the plans for a \$10,000,000 residential and entertainment center for Washington, D. C.
