

Molecules take Lewis basketball title from Turks, 28-24

•Last Wednesday the Lewis intramural basketball tournament came to a close with the Molecules copping the crown from the Turks by a 28-24 score. In the curtain-raiser the Wolves outfought the 2A Co-ops 22-20 after a heated overtime battle.

•Sol Fishman, Henry Sokol, and "Blue" Munday starred for the Wolves with Fishman guarding all-star Russ Komen and holding him to one lone basket. Midway in the extra period, Pete Brucci became the contest hero when he hit the hoop for the winning basket.

•Leading the Co-ops were Elmer Lake, Captain Bob Ebner, and Mark McAuliffe with Lake doing the scoring and the Ebner-McAuliffe duo working the ball in for him. Suffering from the absence of center Mark Reinhardt, who is being treated in a Gary hospital for a hernia, the Co-ops lost control of the backboard to Munday and Sokol. Although the game was close and fast, the unusual occurred in that the Wolves did not have any personals called against them.

•The high point men of the game were Lake for the Co-ops (12

points) and Sokol for the victors (6 points).

•To climax their undefeated season the Molecules staged off a Turk scoring splurge in the last quarter and went on to take the west campus basketball championship.

•With successive baskets by Henry Poile, Les Ziff and Ed Kilfoy, the Molecules built up a six-point lead at the end of the first quarter. In the second period the brilliant defense play of Bill Laut, Ziff and Kilfoy held the Turks scoreless, while the atomic wonders enlarged their advantage to 12 points on baskets by Poile, Laut and Ziff.

•Joe Dalton and Jack Jachimiec were the mainstays in the Turks fourth quarter defense, which held the mighty atoms to a lone basket. The scoring threat in the final stage was paced by Chuck Leary and John Schaffer, each hitting the hoop for six markers.

•Scoring honors of the game were held by Ziff with ten points, while Poile the league's leading scorer, followed his mate with four field goals. Schaffer led the losers with eight points and tailing him was Leary with six counters.

RIFLE TEAM PLACES FOURTH

•The Illinois Tech Rifle club entered the Midwestern Intercollegiate Dewar team championship that was held in the University of Chicago fieldhouse, Saturday, April 3. This event was sponsored by the University of Chicago Rifle club and is an annual event. Out of a possible 1600 points, our boys made 1561 and succeeded in placing fourth. First and second places were captured by the University of Cincinnati, who piled up a total of 1577 and 1572 points. Third place team was the host, the Maroon's Rifle club.

The competition consisted of firing 20 shots at 50 yards and 20 shots at one hundred yards, prone. This is called the Dewar course. 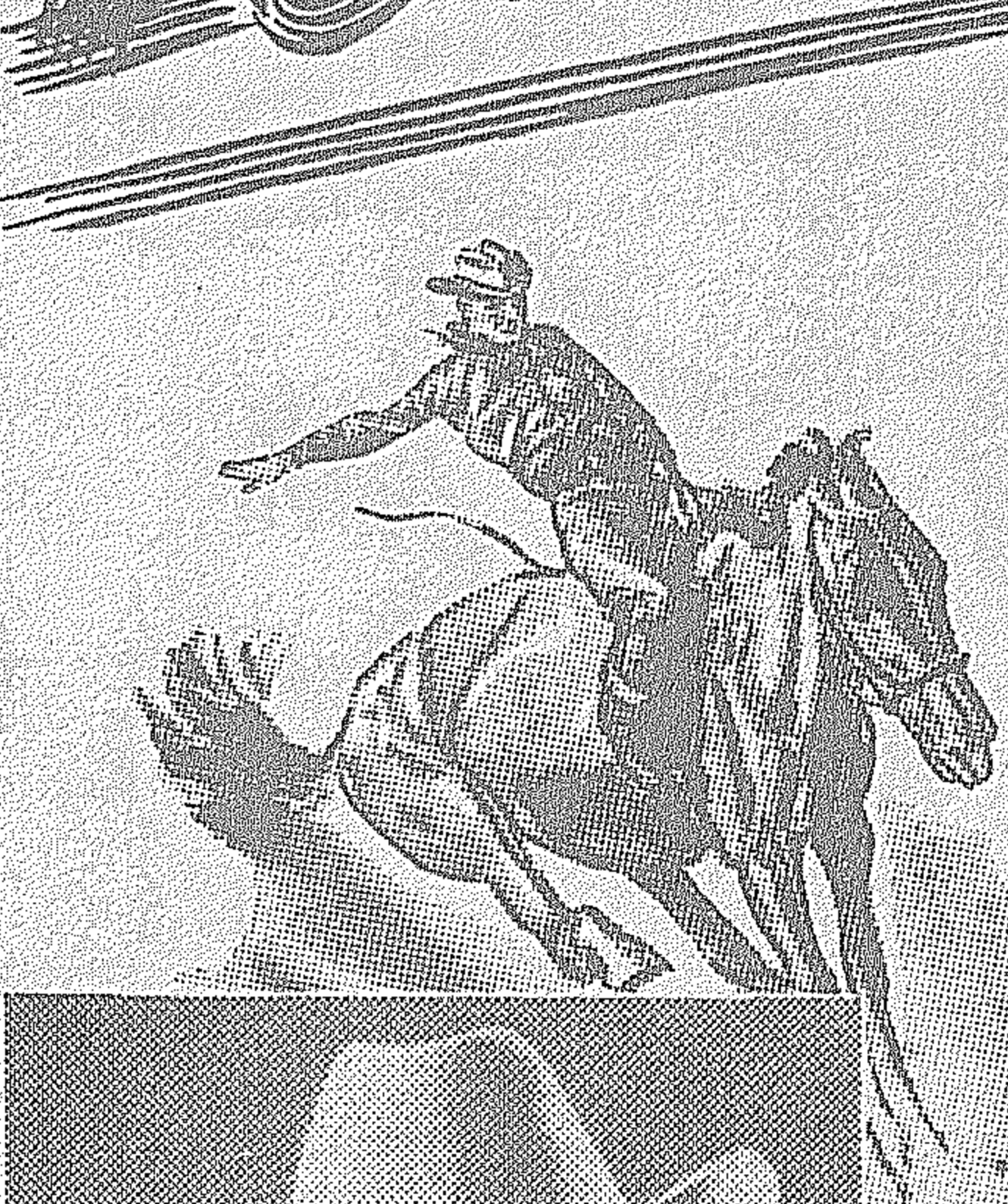
•The ball team travels to the Joliet pen this week to play the inmates. The boys should feel right at home there, leaving Armour penitentiary in lieu of the State conservatory.

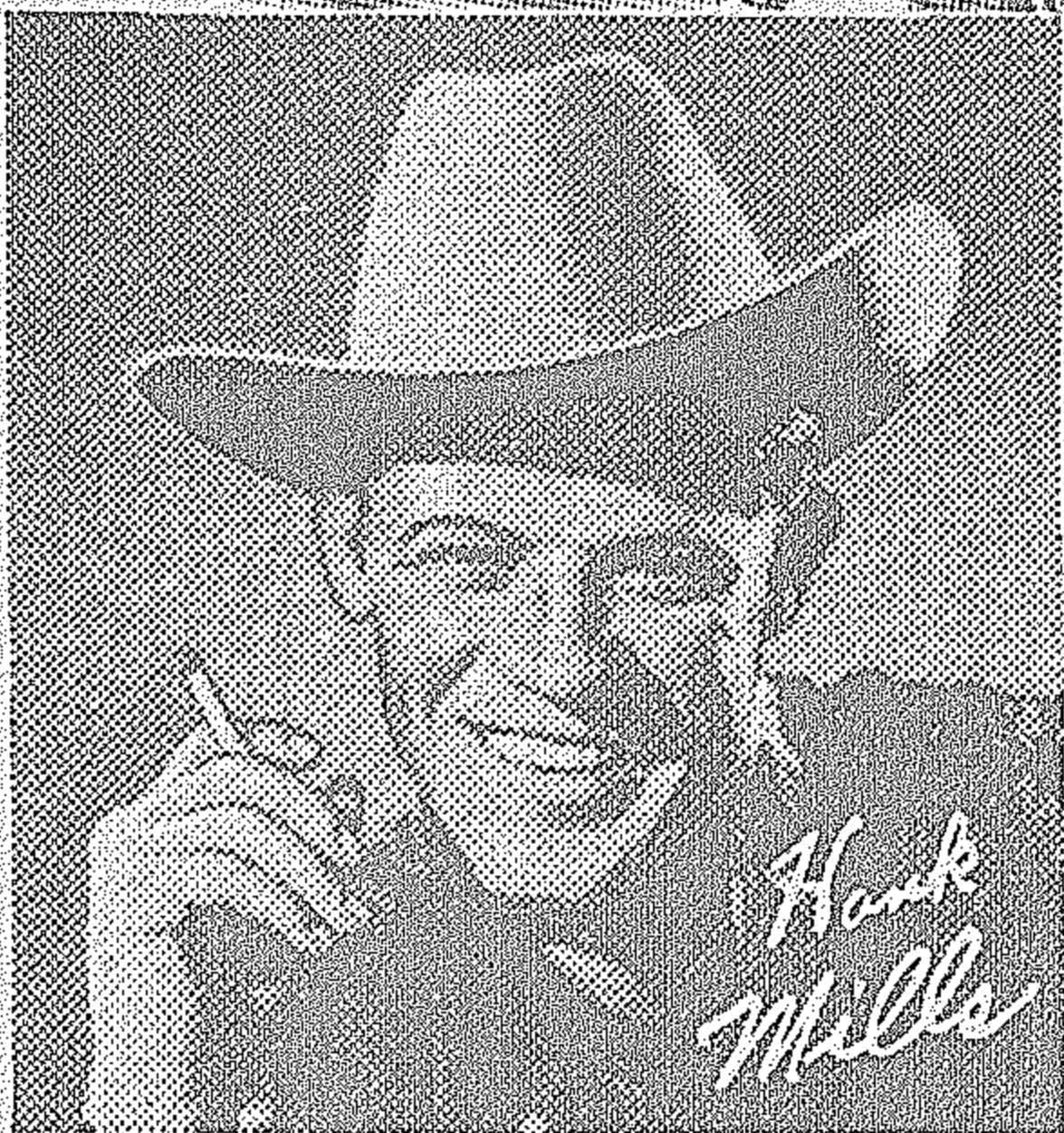

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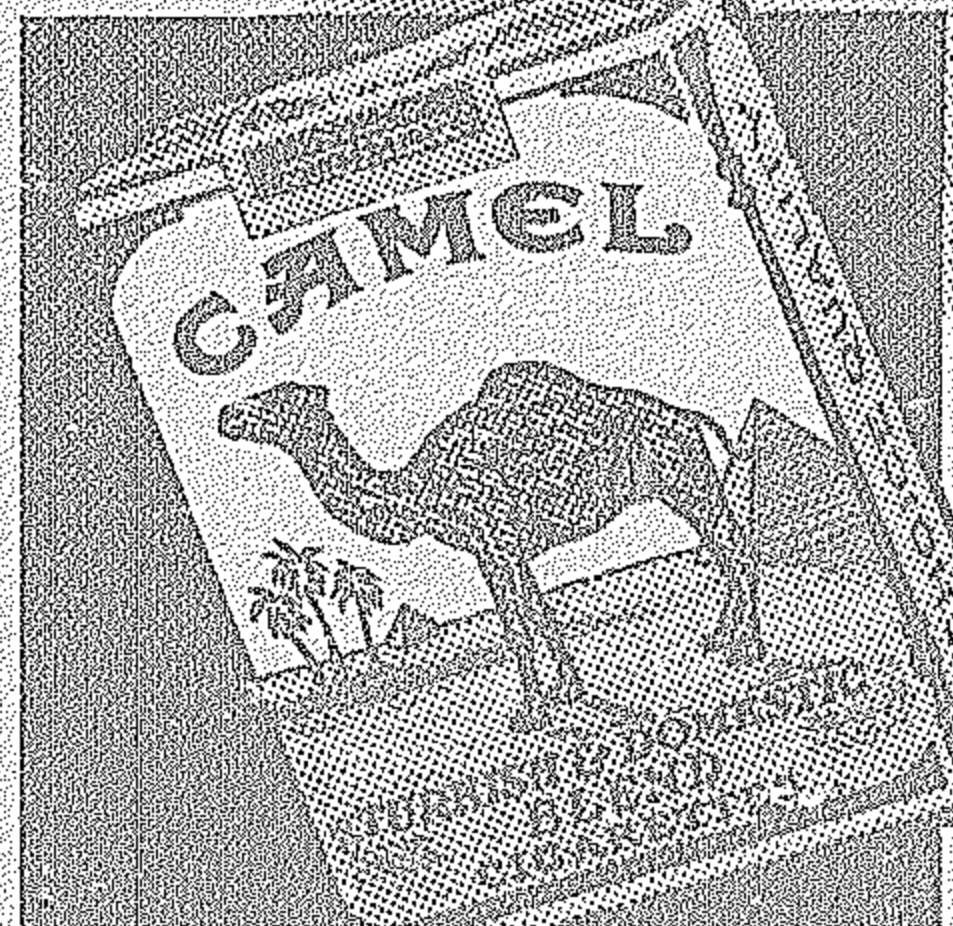
