On Sunday, May 3 at 11 a.m. Professor S. I. Hayakawa will speak at a meeting of the 57th Street Society of Friends on the subject of semantics. Professor Hendricks, who is a member of the society will introduce Dr. Hayakawa. The meeting will be held in John Woollman hall in the rear of the First Unitarian Church at the corner of 57 street and Woodlawn avenue, and is open to the public.

President H. T. Heald of Illinois Institute of Technology and Miss Kathryn Judkins, business coordinator on the Institute's Lewis campus, addressed a vocational education conference sponsored by the Union League club and the Altrusa club Thursday, April 23, at the Morrison hotel.

President Heald spoke on "War-Time Trends in Higher Education." Miss Judkins' topic was "Opportunities and Preparation for War-Time Jobs."

The conference was the first of its kind sponsored by these organizations. Ten selected seniors, five boys and five girls, from each high school in Chicago attended the conference and then reported back to their respective schools on the information presented by the featured speakers.

Dr. Victor Jones of the history department of Lewis Institute of Arts and Sciences has recently finished a book entitled "Metropolitan Government."

Dr. Jones' book treats the problems of the government in the metropolitan areas in the United States and is structural, legal, and political aspects.

Mr. Jones was featured on the program, participating in a discussion panel on "Public Utilities Based on Natural Resources."

Dr. Fred Warburton, physicist from the University of Kentucky, was appointed to the physics faculty of Illinois Institute of Technology, on April 20.

Dr. Warburton has been on the faculty of the University of Kentucky and previously taught at Cornell university and the University of Oklahoma. He has done research work in X-ray and radio fields for Cornell and for Westinghouse and General Electric corporations.

The new Tech physicist attended Houghton and Oberlin colleges and was graduated from Cornell in 1922, receiving his Doctor of Philosophy degree in physics there in 1927.

He is a member of Sigma Pi Sigma and Sigma Xi academic fraternities and of the American Physical association, American Association of Physics Teachers, American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Association of University Professors, and the Kentucky Academy of Science.

He has written and published at last 15 scientific articles.
