

FACULTY BRIEFS

•Mr. E. C. Paustian, assistant professor of sociology at Lewis, has been invited to teach at the University of Colorado for the second term of the summer session which begins July 20. Professor Paustian will offer courses in Introductory Sociology, Social Disorganization, and Urban Sociology.

•Norman Kharasch, of the Lewis chemistry department, is taking a year's leave of absence to complete his work for the doctor's degree. He will do research work pertaining to national defense in the new organic chemistry laboratory there as an assistant to Professor J. W. Hurd.

•Harold "Doc" Davey will report to Washington, D. C., June 1, to assume the position of personnel officer in charge of recruiting for the National War Labor Board. This new job will last for the duration of the war.

•The National War Labor Board is an agency for settling disputes in defense industries. Thus Dr. Davey is entering a field which is closest to his heart, namely, labor relations.

•Dean Dutton attended a meeting of the National Association of

Manufacturers last week in New York. The topic under discussion was the methods by which organized labor and capital could best cooperate with the government to aid the war program. There were representatives from each of these groups present at the meeting. Dean Dutton is also chairman of the Chicago Association of Commerce committee to raise employee morale in the Chicago area.

•Dean Dutton Dr. Davey, and Professor W. Goetz will give a series of speeches before the Junior Association of Commerce on a variety of subjects including Process of Analysis, Plant and Physical Facilities, and General Accounting.
