

BASEBALL TEAM WINS TWO GAMES

Nose out Concordia, 8-7; Whitewash Wheaton, 6-2

•Continuing their streak of three straight games and making it six out of eight, the Techawks bowled over Wheaton and Concordia last Wednesday and Friday. The IIT lads beat Wheaton to the tune of 6-2, while Concordia bowed in the last half of the last inning, 8-7. Ed Player hurled the Braves to victory in the first encounter while Bob Neuhaus and Austin McDonough combined to take the Concordia battle.

•Neuhaus got into trouble right off as Concordia tagged him for four runs in the first inning. This was not entirely his fault because Mueller had a bad day at short and fumbled five tries in the course of the day. The Concordia lads combined two hits with the four errors committed to tally the runs.

•After this they were held in check until the third when three hits and two walks allowed them to score twice more. In the first of the ninth Concordia scored once again for their seventh run of the game. Here a walk, an infield out, and a hit pushed the man across the plate.

•After Concordia's fast start the lads from IIT started things off in their half of the second inning. "Softie" Dambros was safe when the pitcher fluked his ball. Lagodney doubled, putting Al on third. Moe singled scoring Lagoose and Softie. Furst doubled and Moe romped home for the third run of the inning.

•The Techawks tallied two runs each in the fifth and the sixth to tie the score. Hackbarth flied deep to left field to start the fifth. Dambros walked but was picked off first base. Then Lagoose singled. Moe was safe on an error by the shortstop. Ray scored as Furst singled and Moe scored as the center fielder had a tea party with the ball. Shearer grounded to the pitcher to end the inning.

•In the sixth McDonough, who replaced Neuhaus, was hit by the pitcher. Skilla sacrificed him to second. Mueller walked and Hackbarth followed him via the gratis route. Dambros struck out, but Lagodney singled to right center and McDonough and Mueller scored. Ray stole second, Moe walked, but Furst ended things for this inning as he grounded to the pitcher.

•Going into the last of the ninth the IIT boys were tied with Wheaton seven and seven. Moe started the ball rolling as he singled sharply to center. Furst laid one down and pushed Moe to second. Shearer was safe as the second baseman missed the ball. McDonough walked to load the bases. Silla flied deep to left center and Moe romped in with the winning run after the catch.

•McDonough, the winning pitcher, allowed only three hits and one run in the four innings he pitched. He also struck out five and walked only two. Moe was the leading IIT batter as he collected three out of four for the day. Lagodney batted .600 and Furst had a .500 day at the plate.

•The Wheaton match was a dead affair until the fourth inning rolled around. After three innings of masterful pitching the Wheatonites touched Player for two straight hits and a walk to put a one in the score column. Player retaliated, however, in the fifth inning and set the boys down in order with two strike outs and a slow wobbler to the short stop. In the first of the sixth the Wheaton players combined a walk an infield out and a hit to tally once again. After this one splurge the boys were held in control by Ed and the IIT lads to end Wheaton's scoring for this day.

•The boys from the Institoot started things off in the sixth as "Lagoose" Lagodney smacked a ringing homer to left center. Then Wally Moe walked and Joe Gleason walked. Swanson popped to the first baseman. Then Player stepped to the plate and screamed one over the right field fence. This is only a single according to the Ogden field rules. Nevertheless, Moe scored and Gleason moved to third. Silla whistled a grounder at Doud, the Wheaton shortstop. Doud pegged to the plate but Gleason slid in under him for the third run of the inning.

•In the seventh IIT added three more runs to the day's total. Dambros was hit by a pitched ball and Lagodney walked. Then Johnson sacrificed the boys to second and third. Furst walked. Swanson was safe on a fielder's choice as the shortstop pegged to home and retired Dambros. Then Player walked and this forced Lagodney across the platter. Silla was safe as the Wheaton shortstop kicked the ball and Furst and Swanson trotted across the plate. Silla stole second but he and Player were left stranded as Mueller grounded out to the right fielder.

•Player, the winning pitcher, struck out eight, walked five and allowed seven hits. Hackbarth was the leading IIT batsmen as he collected three safeties in five times at the plate.

ALPHA SIGS COP INTERFRAT TRACK TITLES

•Alpha Sigma Phi added two more cups to their collection in the last two weeks as they annexed the interfrat track and relay marks. The Sigs triumphed over the fraternity field as they scored 62 points to the Delts' 26½. Ed Johnston was the most consistent winner taking three firsts.

•In the relay event the Sigs finished a half a lap ahead of the competition to walk off with the cup. Yandel ran a slow lap and finished a few feet behind his man. Arboe took the baton and dashed into the lead. Hackbarth and Johnston just lengthened the lead that Arboe gave them. Hackbarth ran such a hard race that he collapsed at the end of his leg.

Thinclads trim Wright and Morton in triangular meet

•The thinclads, on Saturday, April 25, won a closely contested triangular track meet with Morton and Wright junior colleges. IIT scored 63½ points as Wright and Morton, respectively, scored 50 and 49½ points in the meet held at Key Branch stadium in Cicero.

•Illinois Tech's strength in the field events won the meet for the Techawks. The team failed to score a first in the track events, but piled up 5 firsts in the field events.

•Osborne got a second in the 220 and third in the 100 for the only points in the sprints. In the high hurdles Barry, Keigher, and Clark finished second, third and fourth. Keigher was also fourth in the 220 yard low hurdles.

•Bagdon was a very strong third in the 440. Moeberg was fourth in a very slow mile. The Techawks failed to score in the 880 or two mile. In the former there was no Illinois Tech man available to run and in the latter after setting a blistering pace, Haberkorn collapsed with a pulled muscle near the half mile point.

•The weight events were a field day for the Techawks. Herzog and Tregay were one, two, in the shot, both with tosses beyond 40'. Tregay was second and Parks third in the discus. Heidenreich once more won the javelin, but Tregay and Parks were close to his throws for second and third.

•Parks added to his scoring honors by winning the high jump at 5'7" as well as getting a third in the broad jump. Mills won the broad

jump easily with a very good jump of 20'11½".

•The pole vault was another sweep for IIT as Cole and Heidenreich tied for first and Barnett slipped over the bar for a fourth.

•With this the final issue of **TECHNOLOGY NEWS** it is necessary to review the 1942 track season at Illinois Tech. The squad suffered many unfortunate setbacks during the course of the season. First Coach Root was unable to return, so basketball coach, Remie Meyers, was made guardian of the squad. Then "Rem" went to Annapolis for ensign training at the end of the indoor season. At that point, Senior Harry Heidenreich was delegated the coaching post. The team likewise suffered from the accelerated program, as well as hampered practice facilities. The meet schedule was through necessity revised and condensed as the season progressed. But withstanding these, the squad made a season's record only a little below that of last year's team.

•Indoors the team was beaten by Morton, Loyola, North Central and DeKalb. Outdoors Elmhurst won by a very close score, but the Techawks came back to beat LaGrange, Morton and Wright.

•This year's squad will lose a handful of veteran trackmen that will be hard to replace. Graduating seniors are Heidenreich, Co-Captains Barry and McCullough, and Bagdon. Juniors who won't be able to return next year because of the advance graduation are Keigher and Sauer.

•In the Beloit meet Al Bredlaw shot an 82 to lose, 2-1. Sunny Sundstrom shot an 87 and he won 2-1. Captain Adam Jemsek carded a 79 as he ran over his opponent, 3-0. Harry Sieg rang up an 84 but it was not enough and he dropped his games, 0-3. Sieg's competition was John Plummer who tallied a 78 for low score of the day. Pruzinski lost 3-0 as he got an 88. In general the course was very windy which accounts for the high scores.

•In the doubles Bredlaw and Sundstrom paired up to spilt with their opposition 1½-1½. Jemsek and Sieg knocked their men off, 2-1.

Net squad trims CTC, 6-1, lose to U of C "B" team

•A weary but fighting net squad scored their sixth victory in eight starts by trouncing a much improved Chicago Teachers team last Thursday. The 6-1 victory was an anticlimax, however, following an all out, losing battle against the University of Chicago's potent "B" squad. Lone Techawk to taste defeat in the Teachers match was Dick Larson, who fell victim to Nat Glickman in straight sets, 6-3, 8-6.

•Captain Mike Schultz started the victory march with a three set win over Adrian Hartl, blasting the ball with marked success in the final set to win 6-2, 4-6, 6-1. Jim Ferguson won his sixth match of the season when he turned back Harold Fitch by an 8-6, 6-2 count, and Don Schiller made Hayworth his seventh victim by outlasting his opponent in a 6-4, 4-6, 7-5 match.

•Joe Tompkin lost a marathon first set, 12-10, but after that it was all Joe as he swept through two sets while losing only one game to defeat Schwartz. Larson and Shiller teamed in the first doubles match and the experiment was moderately successful as the pair stumbled through three sets to defeat Fitch and Keafe 3-6, 7-5, 6-3. Ferguson and Schultz made short work of Glickman and Schwartz to wind up the match.

•Wednesday's invasion of the University of Chicago saw the Techhawk's hope for an upset, upset when the "B" squad was forced to draft Wally Michel from the "A" team in order to put five men in action. Wally turned back Dick Larson's bid in the third set to score a 6-2, 2-6, 6-3 triumph, and Mike Schultz fell victim to Jim McClure's wizardry for the third straight year, 7-5, 6-3.

•Jim Ferguson couldn't find his eye and he lost to Grover Daly 6-1, 6-1 as a result. Daly is the same lad he carried to three yets last season. Don Schiller's final stand proved futile as he dropped his only match of the season, 6-2, 8-6. Thiemier's smashing service providing the margin of victory. Joe Tompkin also fell victim for the first time, losing to Steve Lewelleyn, 6-3, 7-5.

•The inability to control the net play again paved the way to defeat, as both double combinations succumbed to their opponents in straight sets. Michel and Thiemier won 6-3, 6-2 over Schultz and Larson, and the McClure, Daly duo downed Ferguson and Schiller 6-2, 6-1.

•The Lake Forest match proved a breather as IIT walked off with a 7-0 victory. The netters now have a two week breathing spell before they wind up the season against North Central, as yet unbeaten, and holders of the only win over Chicago's "B" team in six years. Wheaton and Marquette will be followed after a one day rest. Earl Sherman is expected to be in top form by then and his return should strengthen the squad considerably.
