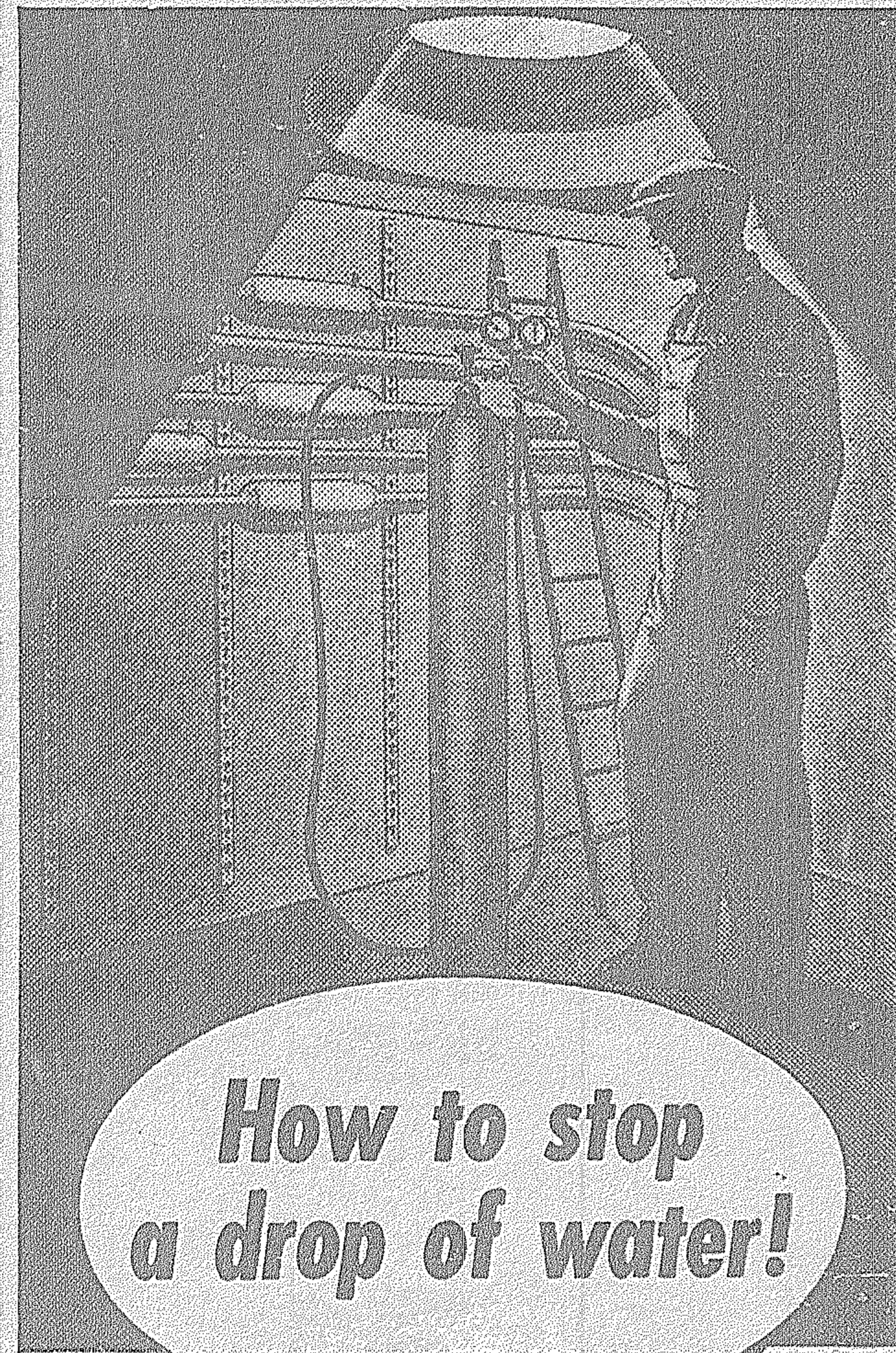
SIGMA BETA THETA
