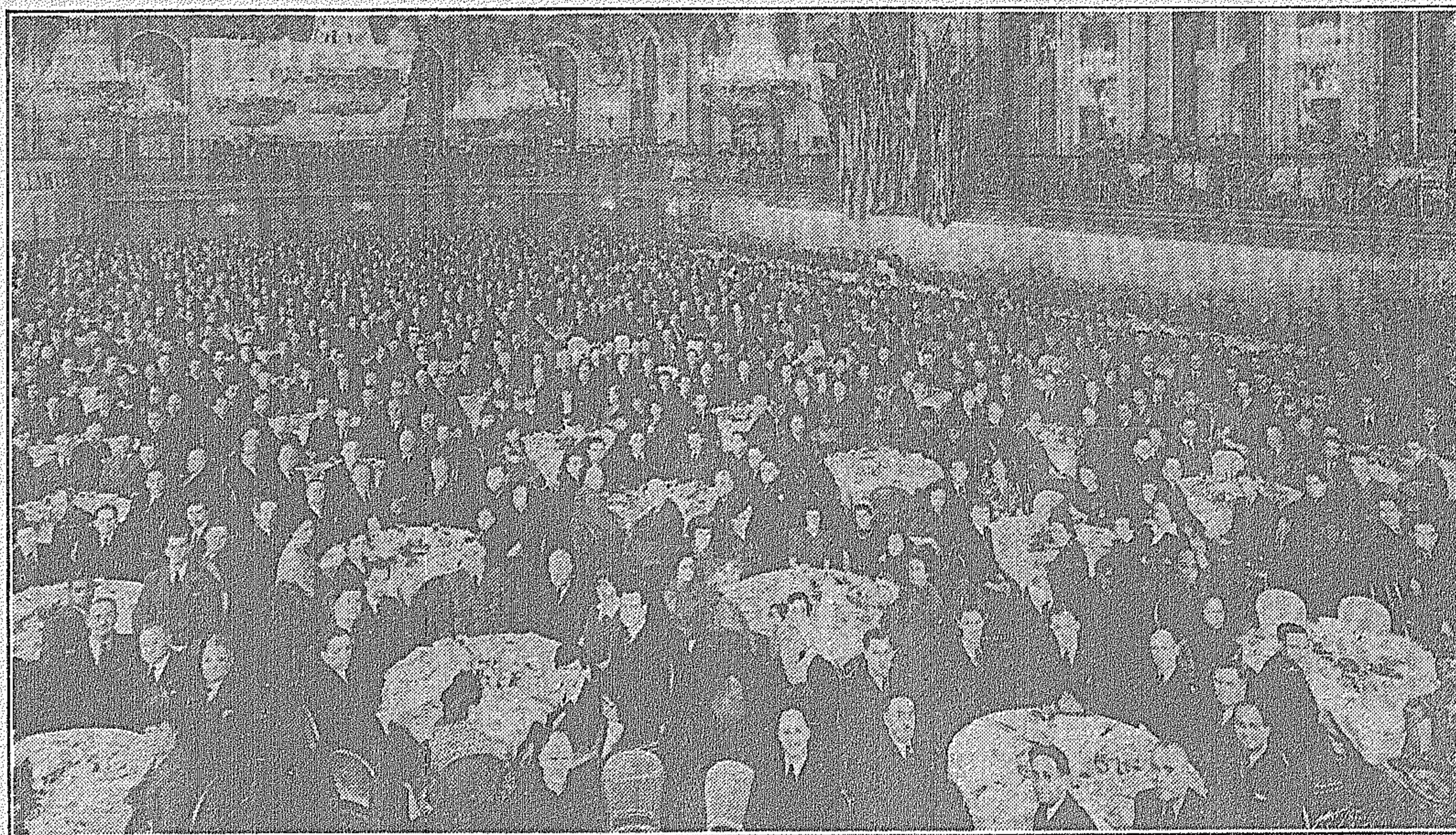

Alumni Organizations Unified At Banquet



VAGTBORG IN CONFERENCE

Dr. Francisco Joao Humberto Maffei, director of Chemical Research at the Instituto de Pesquisas Technologicas, during the past week has been conferring with Harold Vagtborg, director of the Armour Research Foundation, on its method of operation. He intends to visit other similar institutions and observe their procedure and equipment. He also intends to obtain equipment and trained men for research work while in the United States.

The Instituto de Pesquisas Technologicas is very similar to the Armour Research Foundation in general organization and size. It is the most important technological center in Brazil, and probably in all South America. Research is conducted in Chemistry, Geology and Mines, Civil, Mechanical, and Industrial Engineering. It is located at Sao Paulo, Brazil. The funds for the Institute are contributed by the state of Sao Paulo and by the Industrial sponsor. In comparison, funds for the Armour Research Foundation are contributed entirely by the interested industries.

It has been the policy of the Armour Research Foundation to co-operate with the countries of South America in the development of research. This is in connection with the government policy of hemisphere solidarity.

Iowa U. plans soldier subsidy

"Will they return to graduate?" is the question college authorities throughout the nation are asking as students leave their campuses to become soldiers.

Too often, after the last war, this question had to be answered negatively. Now, the University of Iowa is developing a plan to give financial assistance to former students who will return to study after they have been demobilized.

The program calls for gifts of not over \$200 to each returning student who needs assistance. The money will come from a fund made up of voluntary contributions of 10c a week from each student still in college. About \$10,000 could be collected in this manner each semester. This money will immediately be invested in U. S. Defense Bonds.

This plan to help post-war University of Iowa students was originated by Francis Weaver, 22-year-old law student from Mason City.

Returning students, in order to be eligible for the \$200 gifts, must have served at least six months in any U. S. armed force and have been a student in good standing at the University of Iowa on or after October 15, 1940.

Collection of the fund is being carried out on a group basis. Presidents of sororities and fraternities, leaders of dormitories and such groups are responsible for collecting their quotas.

Huge check given at Alumni Dinner

Last Friday night at the alumni banquet in the Stevens Hotel, Wilfred Sykes, president of Inland Steel and chairman of the trustees policy committee, handed President Henry T. Heald a check for \$1,100,000.

This money was raised as a part of the Illinois Institute of Technology's Building Program which calls for new buildings to be constructed at a total cost of \$3,100,000.00. The Illinois Tech development program calls for the raising of this large sum of money to construct and equip new structures, and for the addition of \$275,000.00 to current annual income through endowment or other channels.

Committee shows action

This is the first sizable appropriation of the committee to date and shows definitely that the program will be carried through as scheduled.

Further encouragement is indicated by Syke's announcement that the Institute's drive is ahead of its schedule for 1942 by a sum of money amounting to \$250,000.00. This additional sum was more than expected and marks the aggressive spirit of the policy committee and the men behind Illinois Institute of Technology itself.

All funds received up to date are represented in this check for \$1,100,000.00 which includes the \$750,000 previously reported as subscribed in the campaign.

1600 gather at Stevens

A capacity crowd of more than 1600 alumni of Armour, Lewis and Illinois Tech attended the Alumni Dinner Friday night. In order to accommodate this large number of alumni, it was necessary to use the Grand ballroom of the Stevens hotel. The three alumni groups, Armour, Lewis and Illinois Tech, merged together to form the new Illinois Institute of Technology Alumni Association and adopted a constitution for their organization, an action necessary to bring the alumni together in one unit as the schools were brought together in the merger of a year ago.

Armstrong gives draft views

Commenting on the position of engineering students in the present war situation, Lt. Col. Paul G. Armstrong, state director of the selective service, spoke on the draft laws exempting engineers in defense industries. "These men," he said, "must be kept on the home front fighting in the battle of production."

James D. Cunningham, who is chairman of the board of trustees of Illinois Institute of Technology, presided at the Alumni Dinner. Mr. Cunningham has long been associated with industry and is the president of the Republic Flow Meters Company.

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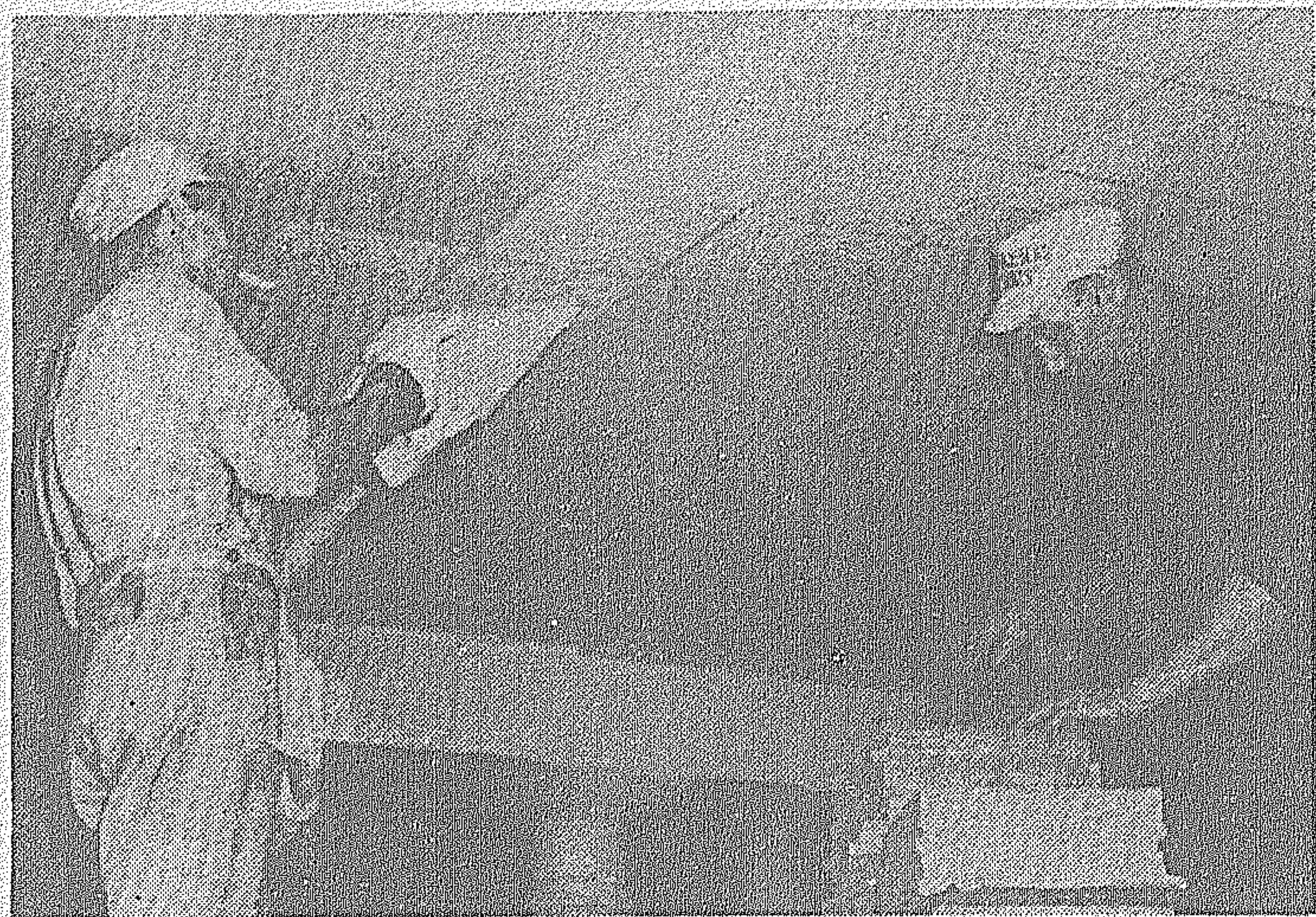

old W. Roupp, pastor of the Central Church of Chicago; and J. Warren McCaffrey, attorney at law and member of Illinois Tech's board of trustees.

The Illinois Tech development program has plans for seven new buildings. Next spring, the ground will be broken and construction will start on the new Metallurgical Engineering Building which will cost \$550,000 when completed and equipped. Soon afterwards, work will begin on new Mechanical Chemical, and Electrical Engineering Buildings which will cost, respectively, \$600,000, \$450,000, and \$500,000. A Humanities Building will be constructed to house both classrooms and laboratories for general use. The cost of this building equipped is \$400,000. Library and Administration buildings will be built at a cost of \$600,000 when completely equipped.

Dean Clarence L. Clarke announced today that a change has been made in the routine of publicizing student meetings at the liberal arts campus. Under the old system, students wishing announcement made of meetings would leave them with Miss Grace Prewitt, the Dean's secretary. From there they would proceed to the business office where they would be mimeographed and finally placed in the information office boxes of the faculty members, supposedly to be read to the classes. Notices would be read in inverse proportion to the volume.

Since the second semester program has been so arranged that practically everyone has the 10:10 hour free on Friday, the volume of notices has increased tremendously with a resultant reluctance on the part of the faculty to read them to classes. Consequently, students complained that their notices were not being read. Announcement of student meetings has now been placed entirely in the hands of students.

The new system, which has been worked out jointly by Dean Clarke, Miss Prewitt, and Activities Chairman Sylvia E. Wcislo, centers about a new bulletin board that has been attached to the door of the Publications and Activities Office, Room 313. Now to have a notice publicized, the procedure is as follows: Either hand the signed notice personally to Miss Wcislo or deposit it in her box in Room 313. She will check to see that it doesn't conflict with other meetings, insert it in her activities calendar, and post it on the board. If handed in far enough in advance, it will be published in **TECHNOLOGY NEWS** in "This Week at IIT."

Alvin Schneider reaches for wings

Aviation Cadet Robert Alvin Schneider, member of Illinois Tech's Class of '41, graduated from the Goodfellow Field basic flying school at San Angelo, Texas and will enter the final phase of his flight training before being commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Army Air Corps.

Class 42D, of which he is a member, is the largest class of aviation cadets to be trained at Goodfellow Field since it came into existence less than a year ago as a new, vital link in the Army Air Corps' pilot training program.

Cadet Schneider will be sent to Kelly Field, Texas advanced flying school for instruction in pursuit, bombardier or observation flying, after which he will join a fighting unit of the air force or become an instructor for the thousands of new cadets. While at Goodfellow Field, he was trained in aerobatics, formation, night and blind flying.

Two movies shown at AIEE meeting

Discussion of plans for its dance highlighted the meeting of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers Friday, February 20. The date of this event has been set for March 6, while the place and orchestra are yet to be decided upon. An admission charge of 50 cents will be made to non-members of the AIEE.

Two movies were viewed by the "Communications in the News" group, both bearing the title. The films pictured the progress made in developing a new type of radio transmission of telephonic conversations by means of very short waves, and showed tests being made where a machine was used across 25 miles of open water.

How to file an income tax

The Treasury department has released a circular clarifying the class of those required to pay income tax. It states that single persons or married persons not living with husband or wife, whose average earnings were as much as \$14.43 a week for the year 1941, and married persons living together who had aggregate earnings averaging as much as \$28.85 per week for the year, are required to file Federal income tax returns. However if the laws of the state of legal residence declares that the earnings of the minor do not belong to the minor, the parent or guardian is held responsible for the tax return.

A very valuable assistance in the filing of a tax return is the folder "How to File Your Income Tax Return the Simple Way" which is issued by the Treasury Department. It contains a facsimile of the simplified Form 1040A and illustrates the six steps required to prepare the return. Form 1040A may be used by persons who are required to file returns and whose gross incomes do not exceed \$3000. Copies of this pamphlet may be obtained from the nearest Collector of Internal Revenue.

LEWIS GRADS RANK HIGH

Two alumni of Lewis Institute have distinguished themselves by being promoted to high positions in their respective fields. Arthur B. Krock is now the head of the Washington Bureau of the New York Times, and Edwin G. Nourse has been elected President of American Economic Association.

Nourse edits annual

At Lewis Dr. Nourse excelled in public speaking, and in '05, he became editor-in-chief of the Lewis Annual. Upon graduation in 1905, he furthered his education by studying for advanced degrees at Cornell university and the University of Chicago. In addition to this important appointment as president of the American Economic Association, he is director of the Institute of Economics at Brookings Institution. He has taught at the University of South Dakota, University of Arkansas, and Iowa State college, being considered an accredited author and agricultural economist.

Krock praised by FDR

Membership in the Parnassian literary society at Lewis was one of the first steps toward a successful career for Arthur B. Krock. Upon graduation in 1906, he readily secured a reporter's job in Louisville, Kentucky, and as years passed he was assigned as Washington correspondent for the Louisville Times, during which time President Roosevelt rated him as the best correspondent in Washington. Mr. Krock had the honor of being one of the american members of the International Allied Press Committee of fourteen which induced an open session of the Peace Conference.

Amazing atoms amuse authority

How to count atoms traveling at a speed of 10,000 miles per second was the substance of the Physics Seminar, "The Discharge Mechanism of Geiger Counter," by Mr. M. H. Wilkening of the physics department, Friday, February 20.

The history and development of the various methods of counting atoms in the last twenty years were related by the speaker. The principles of the conventional counter tube with Neher received discussion from the group. The seminar concluded with the consideration of the discharge mechanism of organic vapor, with such sub-points as the electrical analysis of deadtime mechanics and the expression of the recovery of time.

An electrostatic generator (atom smasher) is the device to be used to produce a high voltage in order to accelerate atomic particles to extremely high velocities. Geiger counter is one instrument used to determine the number of bombardments produced. The experiments with the atom smasher, which is being built in the Physics Hall, may eventually have important scientific and industrial applications.

Defense Savings Stamps

3500 EDT's sign up at Illinois Tech

Enrollment for the eighth Engineering Science and Management Defense Training program took place during the past week, with about 3500 students registering. Fifty-six courses, with 160 sections, are being offered.

The fall evening program, which began during the week of October 20, 1941, has been completed with about 2400 men graduating. One of the students suggested an improved process for making airplane valves which has resulted in a saving of \$70,000 annually. This represents 60% of the cost of the entire sixth program.

200 to be junior inspectors

Other phases of the ESMDT program are also making rapid progress. Two groups of junior inspector trainees, totaling 200 men, are enrolled in a twelve weeks course at Lewis; while 14 more sections in Industrial Safety Engineering have been started at Lewis and in high schools cooperating in war training.

Training in micro-wave techniques is under way in both day and evening classes. About 50 men are enrolled in the day group, while 60 men will be included in the evening section. Drs. Sarbacher and Edson, and Professor Moreton have done a magnificent job in building the new radio lab and equipment.

U. of C. cooperates

A satisfactory arrangement has been made with the University of Chicago regarding a mapping course to be taught jointly by professors of the two schools under the guidance of IIT. Courses in topographic mapping, elementary and advanced surveying, plane table surveying, and photogrammetry will be offered.

IIT is also supervising the Job Instructor Training program. Sixty five-session, ten hour training units have been scheduled, reaching more than 500 supervisory employees of 39 companies.

HUGH McDONALD TAKES A WIFE

Dr. Hugh McDonald, assistant professor of chemistry, married Margaret Taylor last Saturday in the University of Chicago chapel. This romance began in the halls of the International House on the campus of the University of Chicago. Miss Taylor's home is in Maywood, Illinois.

A reception was held after the wedding in the Du Bonnet room of the Lake Shore Hotel on Chicago's south side.

A cousin of Dr. McDonald, McDonald Sheehan served as best man. Others at the ceremony and reception include Dr. Longtin, Dr. Murray, and Dr. Bicek, all from the chemistry department.

As yet, nobody knows where the couple spent their honeymoon. The two disappeared after the reception and were not heard from until late last Wednesday when Dr. McDonald straggled into the chemistry department.

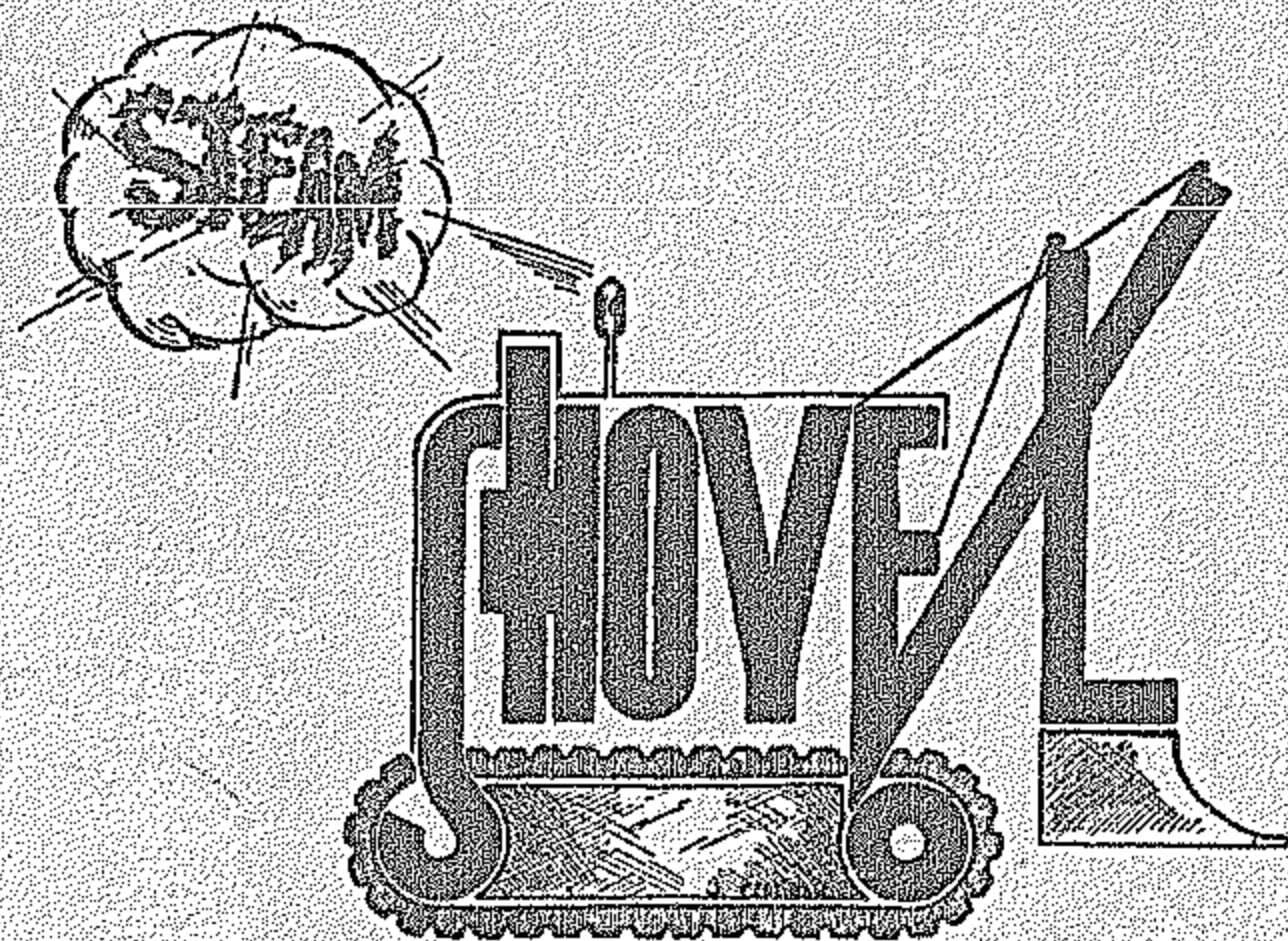

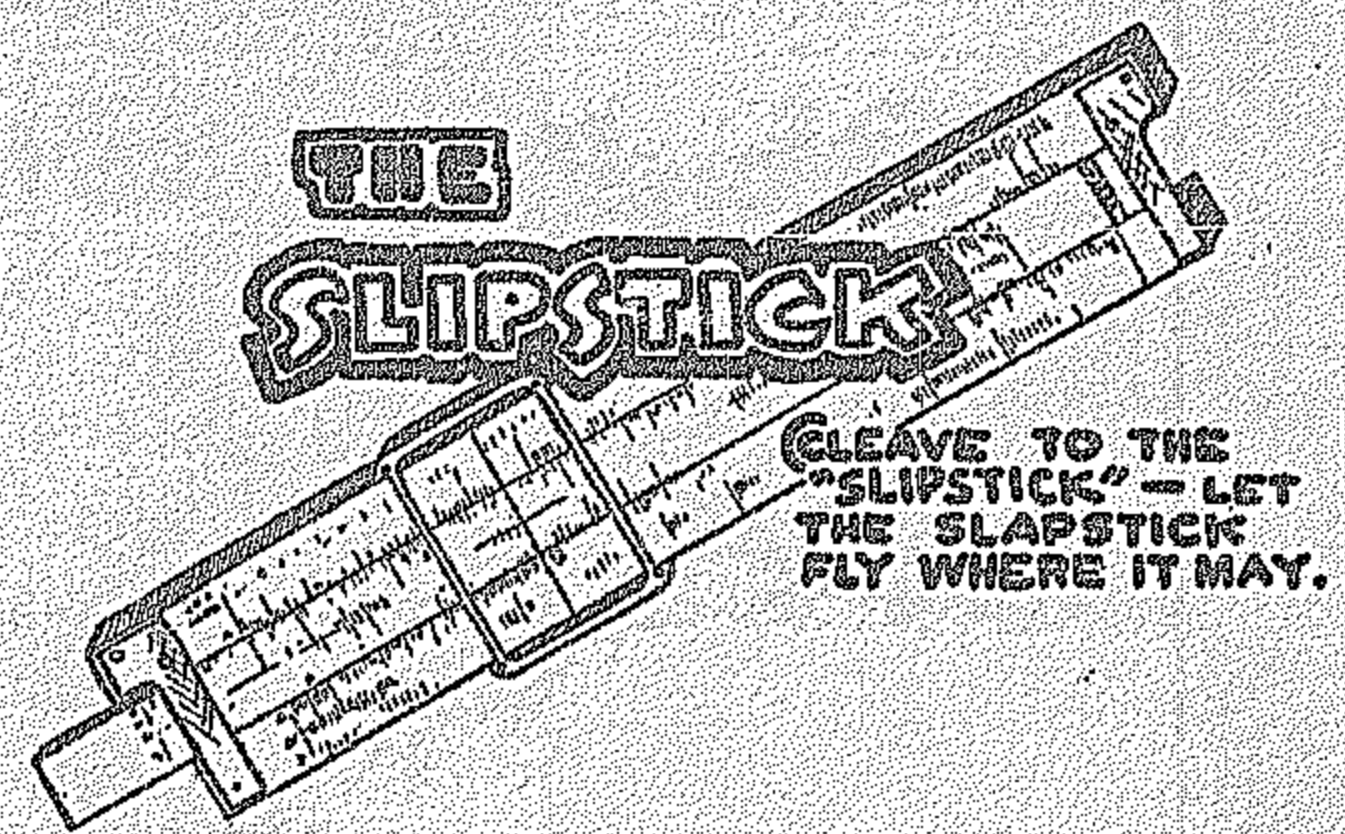

At Beloit, the Techmen won five decisions to score 14 points. The lightweights displayed more power than the heavyweights, scoring 11 of the 14 point total. Ozimek, Eulitt, Dunlap and Butkus, chalked up three points each, while Daly garnered two points on a draw. Al Glassgen, 190, fought hard against his 240 pound opponent, but he could not quite handle this mobile mountain, and he lost on a fall in 4:52. Zemaitis and Jahnke also lost falls. These three falls gave Beloit 15 points, which together with two points for the draw, contributed to a 17 point total, making the final score Beloit 17, Illinois Tech, 14.

Lose to Concordia

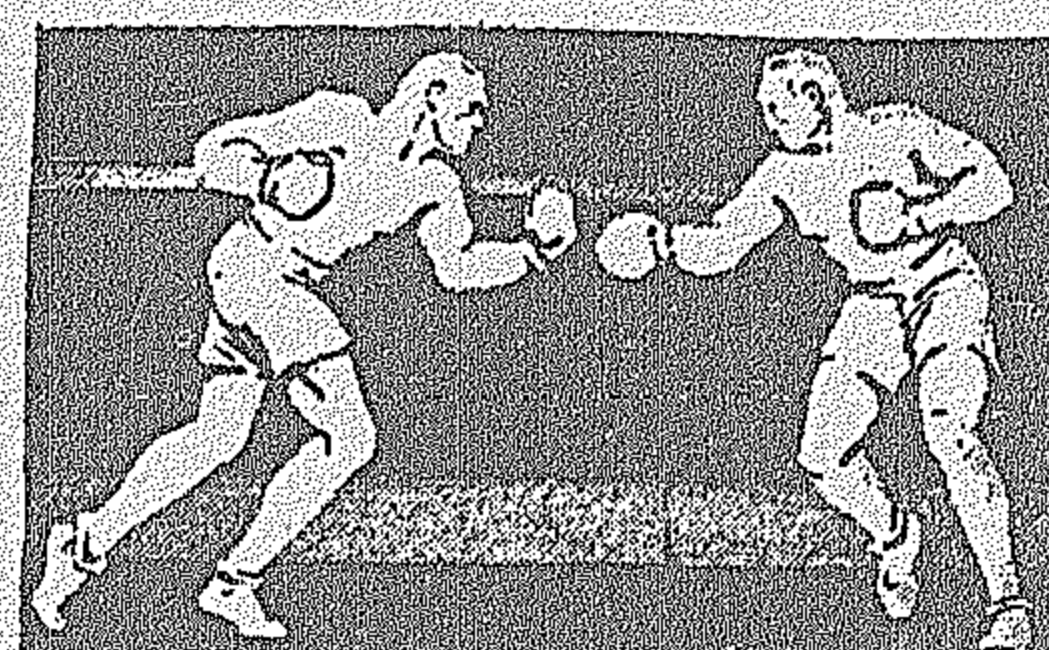
The Techawks lost to Concordia last Thursday in one of the most ragged showings to date by either team. Concordia had been previously beaten by a 44-34 count.

Now it is possible to be given credit in gym by belonging to the rifle team. This latter is a worthy club but it does not take the place of a workout twice a week.

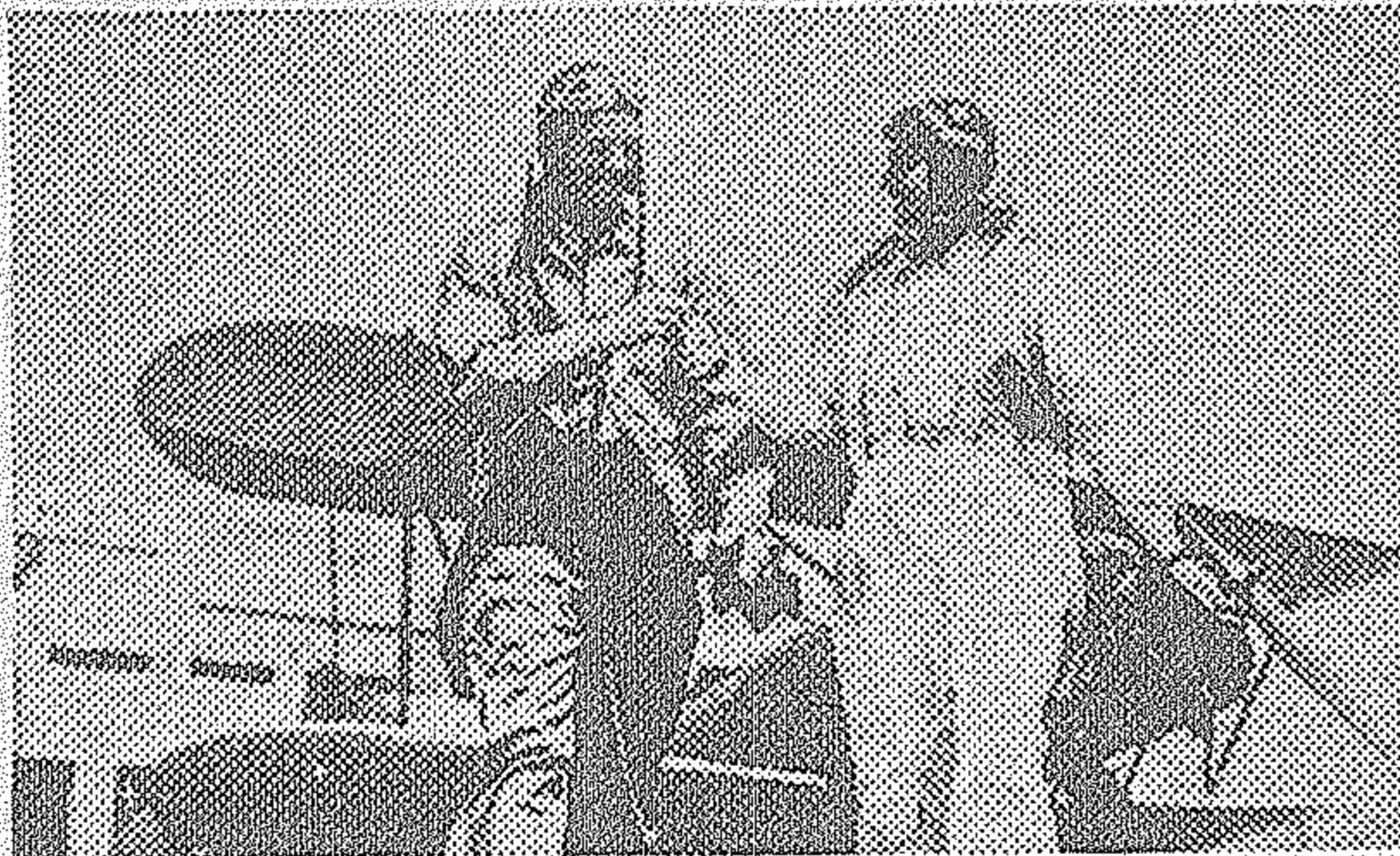

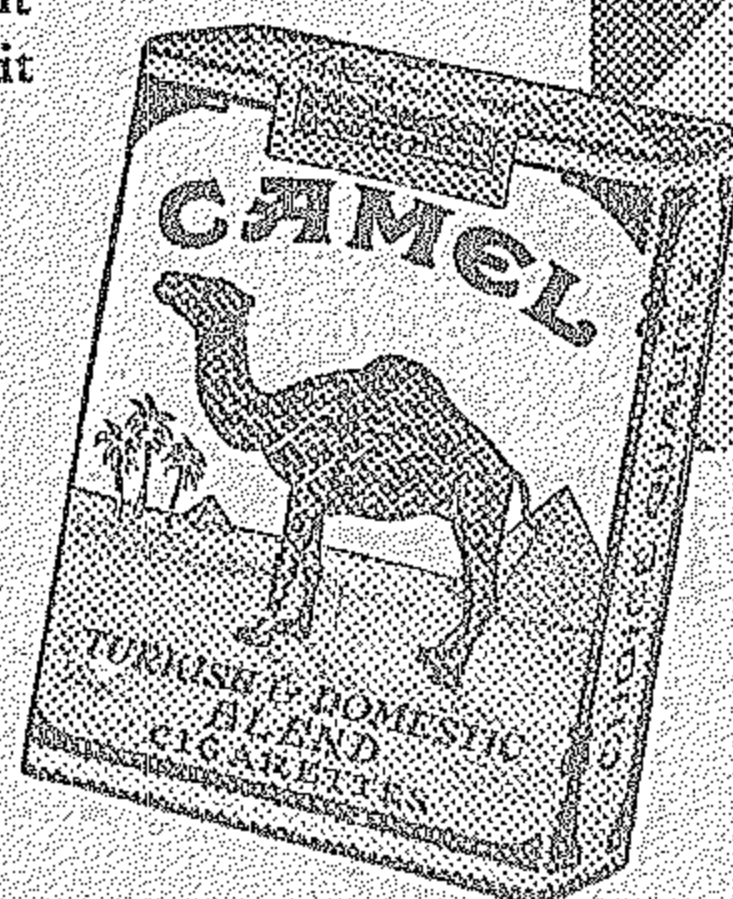
