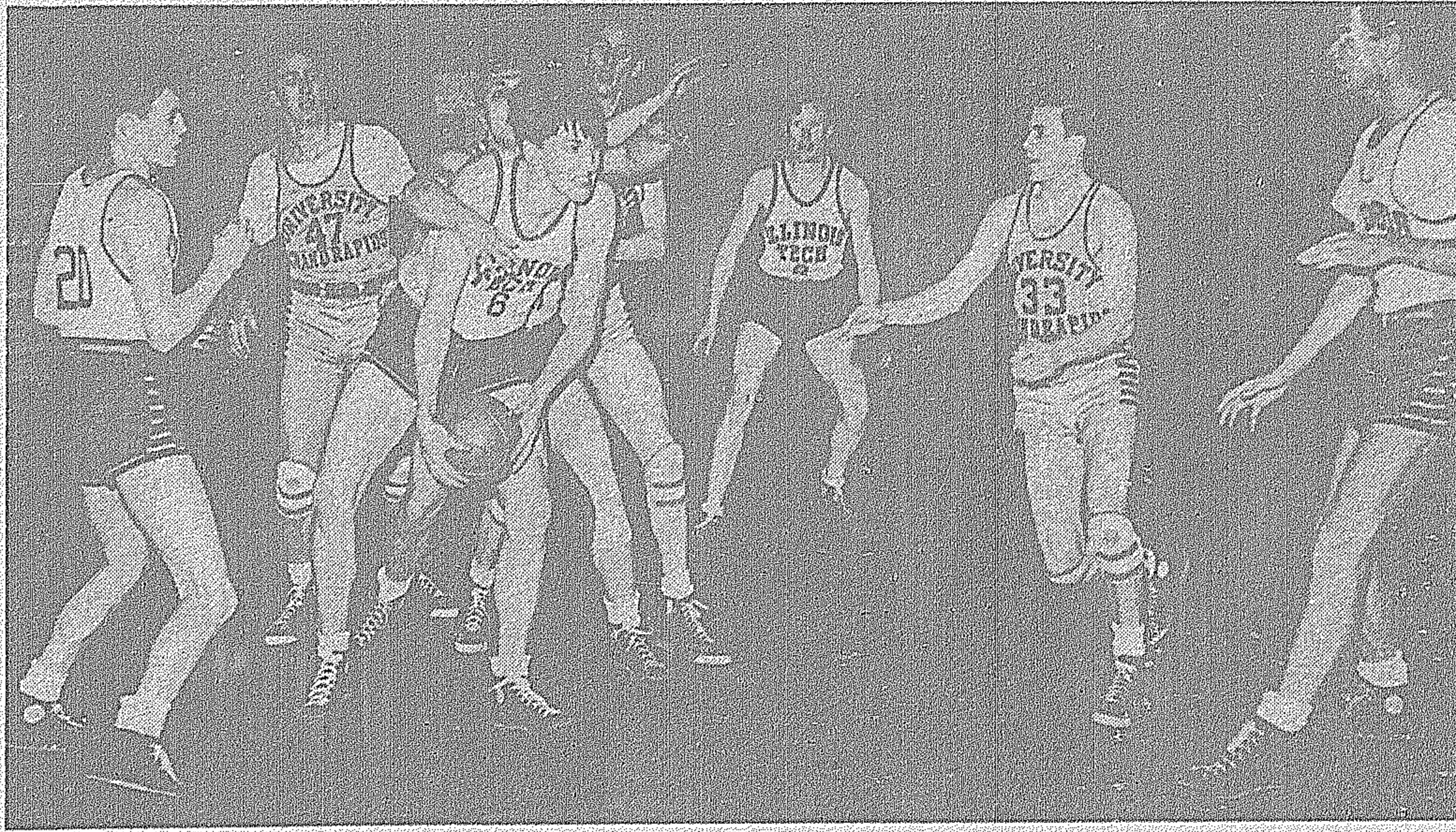

•The ragged defense of the Co-ops almost proved disastrous as the EDT's enjoyed a 15-7 margin at half time; however, the Elmer Lake-Mark Reinhardt combination took charge of the offense in the last phase of the game to spell defeat for the "G" boys.

•Led by the high-scoring trio of Bill Leonard, Don Casey, and Neil Pennington — which garnered 27 points—the 1A Co-ops smothered a weak Cuswecu team 31-14. A slow first half dominated play with the Co-ops holding a five point advantage. Then the fireworks came—a flurry of baskets by the above mentioned trio disheartened the losers as high man Leonard connected for ten markers on five field goals. Craemer paced the opposition with eight points on four long shots while his mates were almost helpless since Pennington mastered the backboard throughout the game.

Pendlebury gets player award

•Howie Pendlebury, captain of the basketball team, was elected the team's most valuable player for the past season. Ballots were cast by all team members, and the popular senior juicer was a unanimous choice. In recognition of Howie's outstanding playing, Coach Remy Meyers presented him with a trophy, a miniature basketball mounted on a pedestal.

•Smooth, fast floor play and consistent scoring throughout the season did much to win the award for Pendlebury. His competitive spirit and aggressive style of play led the team through a tough season. Scoring honors for the season went to this stellar basketeer for 144 points scored at crucial moments.

•Howie started his basketball career at Chicago's Lindbloom high school where he captained the team in his senior year. At Valparaiso university in Indiana, he spent the first two years of his college career, playing varsity ball during both years. In the fall of 1940, Howie came to Illinois Tech to complete his training in electrical engineering. Since his entrance, Howie has won many friends and become one of the more prominent students at IIT.

•Pendlebury's scholastic accomplishments combined with his athletic prowess has won him membership in two honorary societies. Last fall he was pledged to Tau Beta Pi, honorary fraternity for all engineering students, and to Eta Kappa Nu, honorary electrical engineering society. Honor I has recognized Howie's notable play on the floor and leadership in school activities by electing him a member.

Meyer announces hoopsters' letters

•Coach Remie Meyer has announced that eleven members of the Illinois Tech basketball team will receive major letters for their play during the past season. Also awarded will be three minor letters and one manager's letter.

•Captain Howard Pendlebury, recently elected the team's most valuable player heads the list of major letter winners. Four other seniors were nominated for the major awards; Mike Carey, Emil Galandak, Bob Neuhaus, and Harry Sieg. Pendlebury led the team in scoring this year with 144 points which gave him a 44 point margin over his nearest competitor.
